

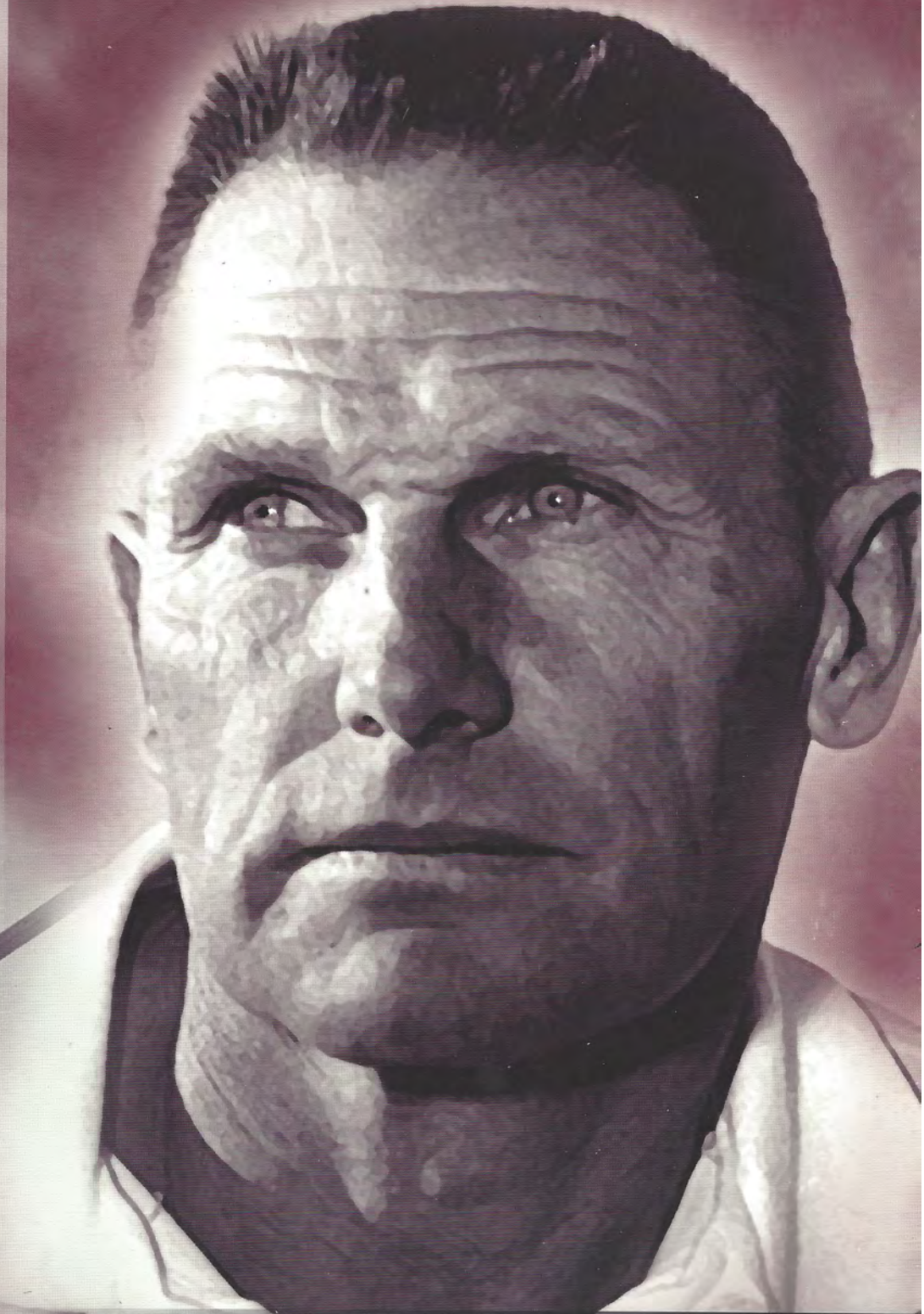

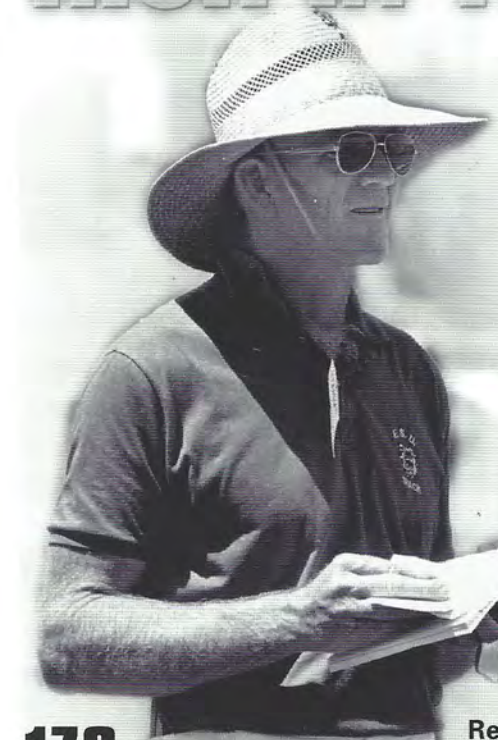

Former head track coach Red Estes and the new Director of Track & Field, Bob Fraley, led the Fresno State men's and women's track and field teams to eleven conference championships. The two legendary coaches have guided

230

Fresno State men and women to indoor and outdoor conference champion titles, produced

99

indoor and outdoor all-Americans and have seen several school records fall. Estes was named Big West coach of the Year nine times in a ten year span and Co-WAC Coach of the Year in 1995. In 1992 Estes was awarded with Region 8 Coach of the Year honors and WAC Coach of the Year in 2000. Fraley has also accumulated an abundance of accolades being named Women's coach of the Year after leading the women to their first indoor WAC championship in 1994 and being named Region 8 Indoor Coach of the Year five times.

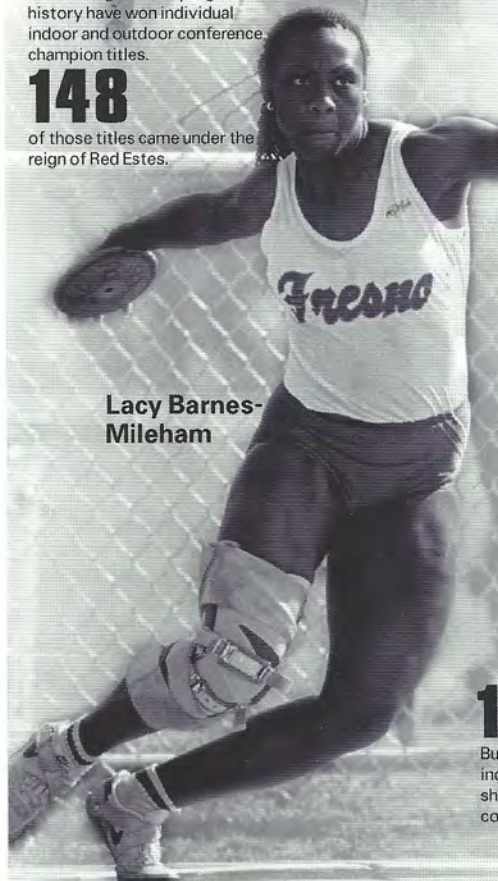

Dutch Warmerdam

In 1940 Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam shocked the track world by clearing 15 feet with a bamboo pole, surpassing the then pole vaulting world record of 14-11 set in 1937. Warmerdam continued to dominate the event, clearing 15 feet

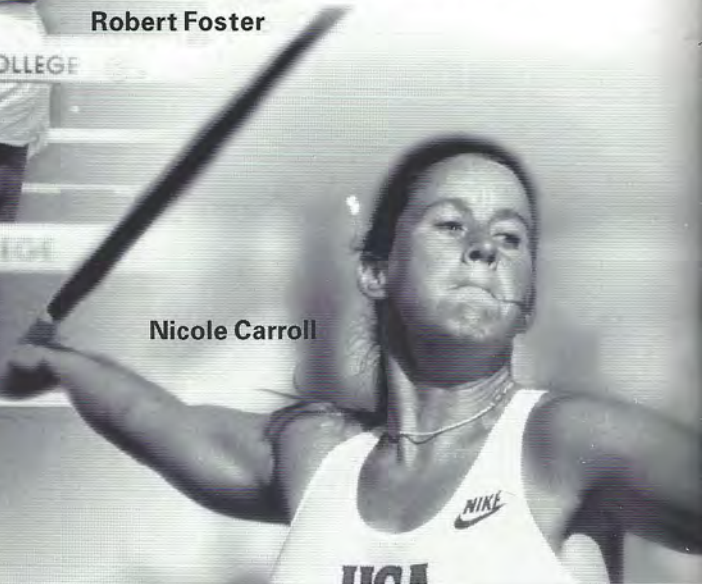
times before any other vaulter could clear the height once. Warmerdam's outdoor best of 15-7 3/4 stood as the world record for

15


years before Bob Gutowski broke it with an aluminu pole in 1957. Warmerdam set the standard in 1940 and 20 years later Erki Mustakar was keeping it alive becoming the first Bulldog in Fresno State history to clear 17 feet. Doug Fraley, a Fresno State product of the 1990s, continued the pole vaulting tradition becoming a three-time NCAA champion. Now in the 21st century, women's pole vaulting has emerged as yet another dominating branch of the track and field program here. Melissa Price won the 1999 NCAA championship title, becoming the first women's pole vaulter from Fresno State to ever accomplish such a feat. In all the excellence, 11 Bulldog vaulters have soared 17 feet or better, with four of those having broken 18 feet.

FRESNO STATE'S POLE VAULT HISTORY

Fresno State has established a rich tradition in the pole vault that spans five and a half decades. It all began nearly 60 years ago when Fresno State College pole vaulter Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam shocked the track world by clearing 15 feet in University of California's Edwards Stadium in Berkeley on April 13, 1940, to eclipse the world record of 14-11 set in 1937. At that time, 15 feet was thought to be impossible. Since then fiberglass poles have replaced the bamboo Warmerdam used, and the aluminum that Erkki Mustakari used in the late '60s and fluffy foam rubber pits have taken over for the old piles of sawdust.

Warmerdam continued to dominate as he cleared 15 feet or better 43 times before any other vaulter could clear the height once. His outdoor best of 15-73/4 stood for 15 years before Bob Gutowski broke the record with an aluminum pole in 1957.

His indoor best of 15-81/2 stood for 16 years.

Warmerdam set the Bulldog vaulting standard, and Mustakari built on it by becoming the first vaulter in Fresno State history to clear 17 feet.

Three-time NCAA champion Doug Fraley continued it in the '80s.

In all, 14 Fresno State vaulters have soared 17 feet or better, with four of those having broken the 18 feet. The Bulldog vaulting corps was never better

than in 1986 when it featured Fraley, Mark Heppner and Kelly Rodriques. Heppner and Fraley finished second and third, respectively, at the NCAA Championships while the trio captured the top three spots at the PCAA Championships. The 1-2-3 conference sweep was mirrored in 1990

with Todd Sprague, Jim Drath and Jeff Coppock, and again in 1992 with Jim Drath, Derek Oliver and David Cox winning the top three pole vault spots at the Big West Championships.


David Cox, a six-time All-American placed second at the 1996 NCAA Outdoor Championships.

Known as a pioneer in women's pole vaulting, Melissa Price currently has the second-highest vault record for indoor and outdoor NCAA competition (14-3 1/2)

Dutch Warmerdam, who was recently named "Pole Vaulter of the Century" by USA Track & Field, set a world record of 15-7 3/4 in 1942. The record stood for 15 years.

Doug Fraley, a five-time All-American was the first Bulldog to clear 18 feet.

Kelly Rodriques was part of Fresno State's trio that swept 1-2-3 in the pole vault at the 1986 PCAA Championships.

Director of Track & Field (Men's and Women's Jumps, Men's Sprints)

Bob Fraley is a proven coach at the high school, college and international levels. Over the last 20 years, Fraley has consistently given Fresno State highly competitive indoor squads as well as many international-caliber athletes. And in 2001, after the retirement of former head coach Gene "Red" Estes, Fraley began a new era of coaching an entire track and field squad as the director of track and field.

Three times in the last 11 years, Fraley's men's indoor squads have finished among the top 15 teams in the country at the NCAA Championships. Since he took over in 1980, the Fresno State men have finished 26th or better seven times.

The women's squads have been strong as well, capturing 15th-place finishes in 1985, 1987 and 1998, and tying for 26th in 1988.

The 1994 season was especially successful for Fraley and his athletes, as he led the Fresno State women to their first indoor WAC championship and was named as the men's Outdoor Coach of the Year for his part in guiding the Bulldogs to their first outdoor WAC title. The Bulldogs finished second both indoors and outdoors in 1996.

With all of the success Fraley has had indoors, his greatest contribution has come coaching the highly successful Fresno State pole vault, jump and sprint corps. Fraley has produced some of the finest athletes in the conference and the nation in his specialties.

Overall, Fraley has guided athletes to 37 all-American honors, including three NCAA titles by his son, Doug, in the pole vault. On the conference level he has coached 59 league titleists, including a 1-2-3 sweep in the pole vault in 1986 and 1992 and a 1-2-3-4 showing at 1994 WAC Outdoor Championships. Athletes have achieved heights and distances competitive with the finest in the country, and the world, under his direction. He guided the men's and women's teams to third- and second-place finishes respectively in Fresno State's first indoor conference meet at the WAC Championships in 1993. And in his first season as director, Fraley guided his squads to a perfect 8-0 record, with the men's and women's squads each winning three multi-team-meets.

In the pole vault, Doug Fraley skied 18-11 and 12 other Fraley-coached vaulters have gone 17 feet plus, including David Cox's 18-6 1/2 effort in 1996. He has coached two 26-foot long jumpers and seven triple jumpers who have posted bests of 52-feet-or-better, including U.S. Junior National champion and four-time All-American Reggie Jackson, who soared a career-best 54-9 3/4. Cox earned his sixth All-America honor under Fraley during the outdoor 1996 season, as he placed second at the NCAA meet at 18-2.

More recently, Fraley guided former Bulldog standout and All-American, Jim Davis to an outstanding 19-0 1/4 in 2000. The vault was record-breaking as it was the highest in all of the WAC for 2000 and still remains as the WAC Championship record.

The women under his tutelage have also done well. Tamara Compton leaped to personal bests of 20-3 (long jump) and 41-11 (triple jump) under Fraley's direction. Those numbers established the 1960 Fresno State graduate and former letterman as one of the premier field event coaches in the country.

Fraley has been named the Region 8 Head Indoor Coach of the Year five times and is the President of Division I Track Coaches, as well as the chairman of pole vault development in the United States. He has a great deal of experience on the national level. The Athletics Congress appointed him to be an assistant coach on the U.S. Junior National team in 1986. He also coached the top U.S. juniors at the Pan American Junior Games in a dual meet with Romania, and at the Inaugural World Junior Games in Athens, Greece, that year.

Before joining the Fresno State staff, Fraley won 13 league track titles in 15 seasons at Lemoore (Calif.) High School, losing only two dual meets during that time.

A 1956 graduate of Laton High School, Fraley competed in football, basketball and track.

Fraley was born on Nov. 30, 1937, and he and his wife, Elaine, have three children: Tammie, Jill and Doug.

TANYA EHLERT
Women's
Assistant Coach
Sprints
4th season

Assistant Tanya Ehlert is in her fourth season as a coach for the Bulldogs. However, she has been a veteran of Warmerdam Field for 10 years. She competed as a student-athlete for four years before serving as a graduate assistant for two years. Now Ehlert gives of her time, experience and knowledge full-time to the track and field program. Ehlert's main responsibilities include working with women sprinters and jumpers. Last season, she directed senior Jynette Grayson-Reed to a provisional time in the 400 meters (53.30).

Ehlert, a three-time NCAA All-American, is one of the top sprinters in school history. When she competed as Tanya Dooley for Fresno State from 1990-95, her name rapidly moved up the career leaders lists. In 1994, Ehlert ran the 400-meter in a time of 52.80, a mark that still stands as the best by a Bulldog. She ranks fourth all-time in the 200-meter with a mark of 24.00, just .34 seconds slower than leader Angela Daigle, a sprinter Ehlert coached last season. She earned her all-American status with solid performances at NCAA indoor and outdoor meets. In 1994 she placed third in the women's indoor 400, took seventh in the outdoor 400 in 1993, and finished seventh at indoors in 1992. In 1993 Ehlert won the Western Athletic Conference outdoor championship in the 400 and was named as the Bulldogs' most valuable track performer.

Ehlert also brings experience in international competition after having competed at the Pan American Junior Track and Field Championships in 1991 and with the U.S. Junior National Team in Jamaica. Ehlert received a bachelors degree in physical education and a master's degree in kinesiology from Fresno State. She and her husband, Gregory, reside in Fresno.



CHRIS CAMPBELL
Assistant Coach
Throws
3rd season

Chris Campbell enters his third season as the throws coach for both men and women. Since his arrival at Fresno State, Chris has played a major role in the success of 2000 WAC Champion and Outdoor All-American Decathlete, Scott Wenholz, and guided April Wiechmann to the 2000 WAC Discus Championship. In 2001, Campbell coached junior Kayla Russum to the Cal-Nevada Championship and a NCAA provisional qualifying mark in the javelin and tutored senior Ryan Beckenhauer to an eighth place finish and All-American honors in the shot put at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. Along with his coaching duties, Campbell was elected Vice-President of the California-Nevada Coaches Association, serves as Men's and Women's Development Chairperson for the Central Valley Chapter of USA Track and Field, and is currently pursuing a master's degree in kinesiology at Fresno State.

From 1996 to 1999, Campbell served as the field events coach at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind. During his tenure at Ball State, Chris coached student-athletes to qualify for the NCAA Championships in the hammer and high jump, establish four new school records, and win a Mid-American Conference championship in the hammer throw. With his assistance, the women's team at Ball State was conference champions two of three years.

Prior to Ball State, Campbell served as a volunteer coach at the U.S. Naval Academy for three years while completing an M.S. in Education at Johns Hopkins University and fulfilling his military active duty obligation. Campbell has completed USATF Coaching Education through Level III and holds the National Strength and Conditioning Association's Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist certification.

A 1989 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, Campbell was a four-year letter winner on the Midshipmen's track and field team. A javelin thrower and former school record holder, he was elected team captain his senior year. Immediately upon graduation, he was assigned to the San Diego-based naval warship, USS COPELAND, where he served as Damage Control Assistant and Navigator. Campbell resigned from the Navy after six years of service with the rank of Lieutenant.





SHANNON LIEDER

**Assistant Coach
Women's Distance
2nd season**

After coming off of her first season as a head coach for the women's cross country team, Shannon Lieder is entering her third year as an assistant coach with the track and field staff. Lieder, a former student-athlete at Fresno State from 1989-92, will work with the women's distance runners during the track season. She guided Fresno State's first-ever WAC Champion, Kara June, in the women's steeplechase to a personal-best and NCAA provisional qualifying time of 10:53.83 at the 2001 WAC Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Lieder, an All-American in the 800 meters, still holds the school records for the 800 (2:07.03) and the 1,500 meters (4:24.68). She also ranks ninth on the Fresno State women's all-time 5,000-meter list in cross country. Lieder assisted former coach Red Estes as a cross country manager for two years and she also ran for the Reebok Aggies.

Lieder earned a Masters Degree in Kinesiology and was a member of Strategic Planning Committee in which she worked closely with Fresno State President, Dr. John Welty, regarding Title IX issues.



JOE GONZALES

**Assistant Coach
Men's Distance
2nd season**

Joe Gonzales returns for his second year as an assistant coach on the track and field staff. Gonzales will handle the men's distance events. In addition to his duties with track, coach Gonzales serves as the head coach for men's cross country. This past season, Gonzales guided junior transfer Roosevelt Cook to a 12th place finish at the 2001 WAC Cross Country Championships and a second-team All-WAC honor. Prior to entering his coaching career at Fresno State, he served as a coach at Exeter Union High School in Exeter, Calif. Gonzales began his coaching career at Exeter, where he began as a volunteer assistant for the cross country team in 1990. In '95, he became the head cross country coach for both boys and girls. Gonzales then served as the head track and field coach at Exeter from 1998-2000.

In his ten years at Exeter, Gonzales led the girls' cross country team to five league championships, and one section championship. He guided the boys' cross country team to two league championships and the girls' track and field team to two league titles.

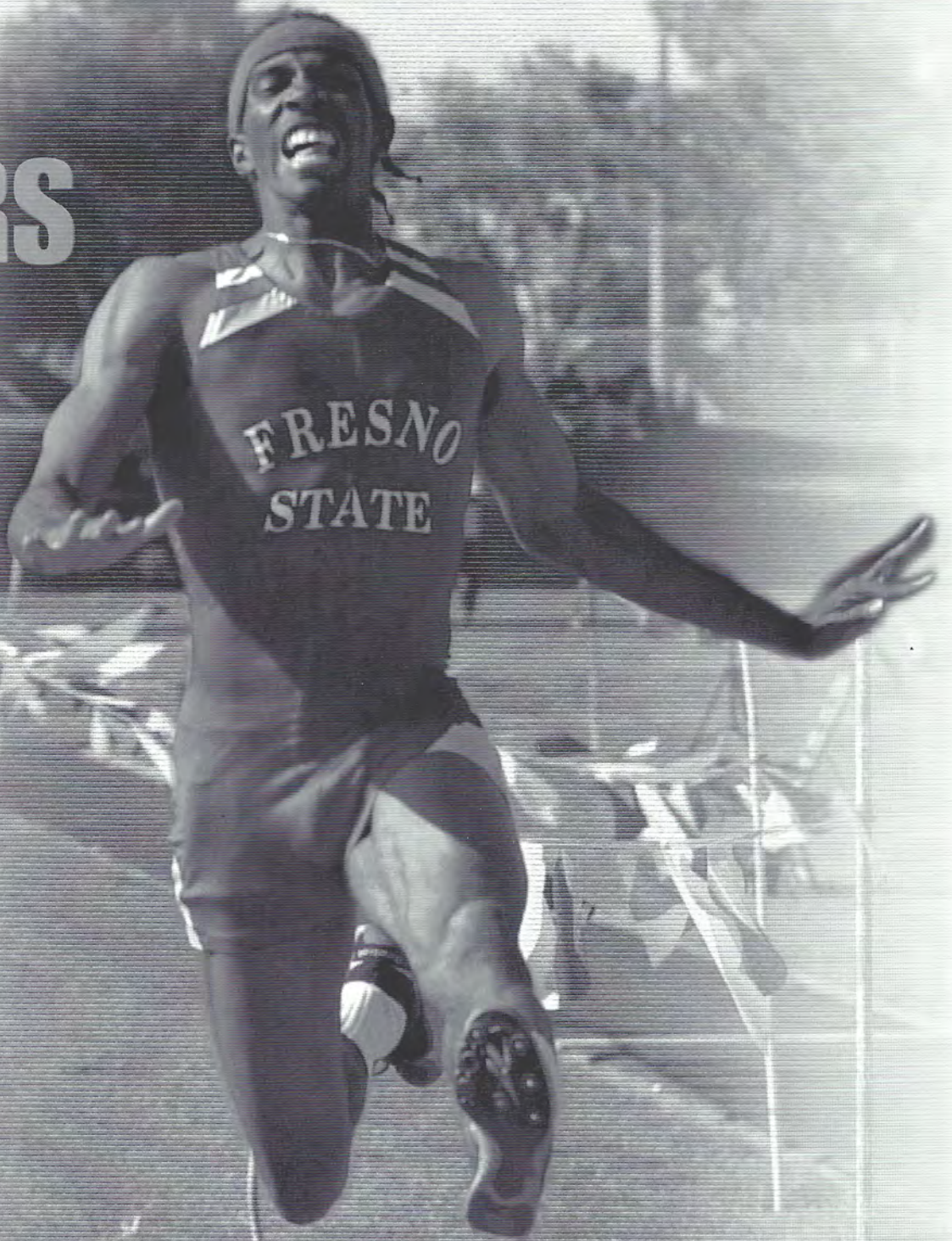
Gonzales graduated from Exeter Union and went on to College of the Sequoias before graduating from Fresno State with a degree in Liberal Studies.

Stephanie Maugham Part-time Assistant 2nd Season

The Bulldogs will also have the aid of second-year graduate assistant, Stephanie Maugham. Entering her second season with the coaching staff, Maugham also is an instructor at Fresno State while studying to finish her masters degree in Kinesiology. Her track and field responsibilities include heading a gymnastics program for the pole vaulters, in addition to her contributing efforts in all aspects of the administration of the track and field program.

Maugham graduated in spring 2001 from the University of Rhode Island. There she received a full athletic scholarship for track and field. She competed in the pole vault and heptathlon. Prior to college, she attended Shaunee High School in New Jersey, where she grew up in Medford.

Bulldogs Measure

Lords of the Sand

Second-year Director of Track and Field, Bob Fraley, says the triple and long jump events will be the two strongest events on the entire track and field team. A bold statement, certainly, but the reasoning lies within the numbers. The 'Dogs enter the 2002 campaign with a veteran arsenal teamed with two seniors and two juniors. Seniors **Duran Archie** and **Kyrah Ayers** and junior twin brothers **Kevin** and **Kyle Carano** form the quad. Archie and Ayers are the two leaders returning for the long jump. Last season Archie jumped 24-7 1/4, while Ayers topped out at 23-11 1/2. In the triple jump, Bulldog fans can expect to see Archie, Ayers and the Carano brothers. Kevin Carano leads the way with a personal-best 51-2 1/4, Archie follows closely 51-1, while Ayers and Kyle Carano round out the top four.

"These two events will be very good for us," said Fraley. "We should be very competitive at the conference meet."

Rising Above the Rest

The pole vaulting crew welcomes two veterans and one newcomer this season. Two-time WAC Champion, senior **Mark Unzueta**, senior multi-event specialist **Justin Schwartz** and freshman **Russell Weaver** will have the task of running the runway for the 'Dogs. Unzueta won both the indoor and outdoor event last season, vaulting to a height of 16-6 1/4 to win. He reached a NCAA provisional height of 17-4 1/2 for the season. Schwartz and Weaver will provide additional points as the two, three vaulters. Schwartz finished last season with a PR of 15-5.

Senior **Josh Alfaro** has the task of being the single returner for the high jump event. Last season he heighted at 6-8. Along with that role, Alfaro will contribute himself to the hurdle events where he leads the team with a time of 15.64 in the 110 and 57.27 in the 400-meter hurdles. In addition, he will join Schwartz in the decathlon.

"Josh is a better asset to us as a multi-event athlete," stated Fraley. "He has the ability to spread his athleticism to numerous events."

Stride by Stride

Unlike last season, the sprint events will be the toughest for the Bulldogs in 2002. Top returners, junior **Darnell Hammock** and sophomore **Chad Seiler** have the responsibility this year of bolting out of the blocks. Joining them are freshmen **Chris Berrian** and **Rico Morales**, who have yet to compete against one of the top sprinting conferences in the nation. Seiler and Hammock will toe the line in the 100 and 200-meter sprints, while Berrian and Morales are penciled in for the 400 meters. Seiler clocked in at a team-leading 21.66, while Hammock was second at 21.58.

"Our sprint team has a major task ahead of them this season," said Fraley. "I am confident they have that ability."

Moving on to the distance events, Fresno State returns a crew of six and adds one for a total of seven distance runners. Among those is senior **Roosevelt Cook**, a runner who will be relied on to perform in both the 800 and 1,500 meters. Cook led the 2001 squad in the 800 event, clocking in at 1:50.88. He is the top returner in the 1,500 with a time of 3:56.29. Running alongside Cook are three juniors, including **Alex Mason**, **Robert Vaca** and **Philip Ogilvie** and senior Gabe Orosco. Vaca is the number one runner in the steeplechase, an event in which he led the Bulldogs in last season, clocking 9:35.09.

"There are a lot of good distance runners in the WAC that our guys will have to compete against," said distance coach Joe Gonzales. "They will have to step up and have the confidence to get it done, which I know they can do."

The hurdles will showcase Alfaro, senior **Cameron McClure** and Schwartz. Alfaro is the leader in both events, while Schwartz clocked in at 16.27 in the 110 hurdles and McClure rejoins the squad after not competing last season.

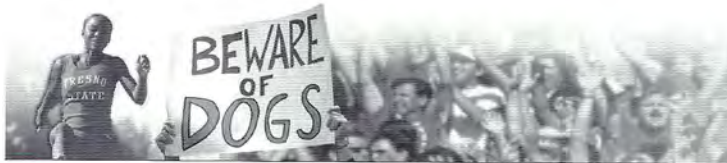
Weighing In

The Bulldogs have senior **Ryan Beckenhauer** for one more season, only this time it's only for the indoor. The All-American shot putter expired all of his outdoor eligibility. He finished in eighth place at the NCAA Championships last season. He recorded a personal-best 64-2 1/2. However, the Bulldogs will have plenty of athletes to score in the event. Sophomore **Joe Vasquez** is the top returner, while sophomore **Shlomi Ben-Shushan** and senior redshirt senior **Mike Guidry** are the

chosen ones. Vasquez threw at 50-3 1/2, and the other two are capable of throwing over 50 feet says throws coach Chris Campbell.

The discus is in good hands with Guidry, who threw 177-0 two years ago. Vasquez and freshman **Javon Kemp** will be backing him. Throwing the hammer this season will be Ben-Shushan, who had the entire fall this season to prepare. Ben-Shushan has thrown 189-9 in the event. The javelin will showcase two juniors, **Allen Mendrin** and **Ryan Burgess**. Burgess won the event at the weight pentathlon in the fall with a mark of 185-11, while Mendrin was second on the team last season with a PR of 168-10.

"Burgess sets very high standards for himself," said Campbell. "Together with Allen and Kemp, the trio will score for us."

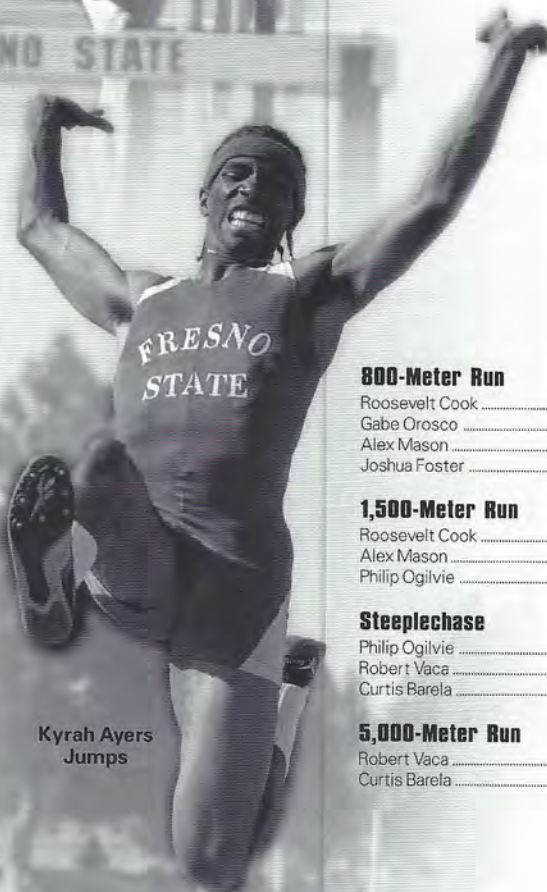
What's In Store

Fresno State track and field has just three home meets this season, but all three are big-time events. Beginning with the Cal-Nevada Championships in late March, the Bulldogs will compete against the best athletes from California and Nevada. 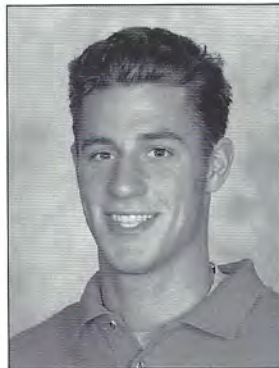

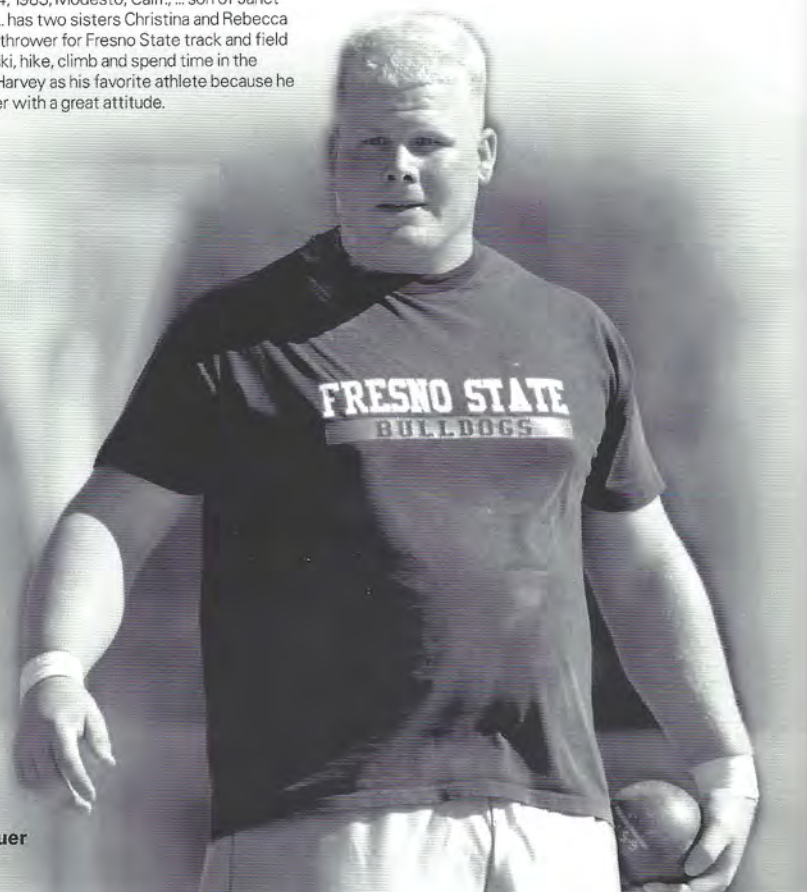

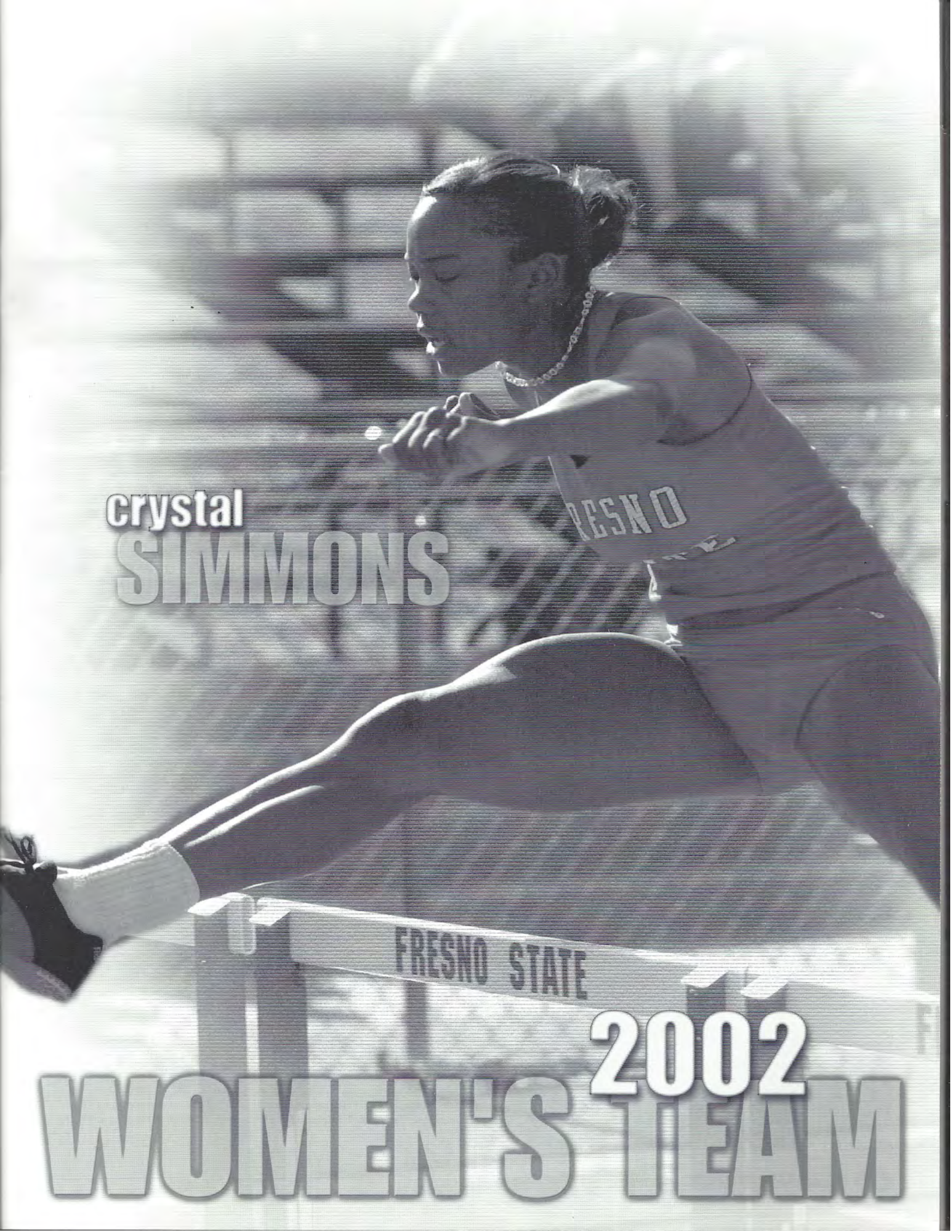

Leaders of the Pack

Building Castles in the Sand

Using the words of head coach Bob Fraley, "The triple and long jump events will be the two strongest events on the entire track and field team this season." A legitimate rationale, considering he returns junior **Crystal Simmons** and sophomore **Jenny Moore** to his arsenal of athletes. Simmons was the only female track and field athlete to earn a trip to the NCAA Outdoor Championships last season. Her provisional mark of 42-10 1/4 made her eligible to compete. She is the returning leader in both the triple and long jumper, posting the NCAA mark in the triple and turning out a 19-6 1/4 in the long, a mark good for seventh in the Fresno State record books. The triple jump mark is the best mark thus far in Fresno State history. Moore holds her own in both events as well, posting PRs of 39-9 1/2 in the triple and 18-0 1/2 in the long jump.

"Crystal Simmons is a very, very competitive athlete," said Fraley. "She has the potential to return to the NCAA meet and her versatility to compete on both the track and field is irreplaceable."

Raising the Bar

Fresno State didn't pursue a high jumper this season. However, both Simmons and Moore have proven themselves worthy of the task. Last season Simmons posted a second-best height of 5-3 1/4, while Moore was right behind her at 5-2 1/4. This year, for indoor, Simmons and Moore marked 5-5. Senior April Wiechman leads with 5-5 3/4.

Known for its pole vaulting tradition, Fresno State will again showcase several top WAC athletes in 2002. Leading the way for the 'Dogs is senior **Bergann Hernandez**, who vaulted to a personal and team-best 11-9 last season. Joining her are sophomores **Lexine Lesser** and **Sarah Merino** and freshmen **Katharine Pacheco**, **Leah Horowitz** and **Veronica Garcia**. Lesser finished third on the team in 2001 at 11-6 1/4, while Merino vaulted to 10-6 before sustaining an injury early in the year.

"The vaulters are a good, strong group of athletes," stated Fraley. "The newcomers have performed surprisingly well."

Keeping Up the Pace

According to women's sprint coach, Tanya Ehlert, the sprint team is a talented group. One example in particular is the 400 event, which will showcase one athlete, freshman **Raynisha Bragg**. Simmons will lend her legs to the event at times. As well as junior Tiffany Simon, who last season clocked a 5.4 sprint.

"As a freshman Raynisha is going to have to get to know the race quickly," said Ehlert. "She has high school experience, it's just a matter of going through the motions."

The 100 and 200 events have a little more depth and for the first time in several years the team has the potential to be final qualifiers in the WAC. Freshmen **Ocie Parks** and **Crystal Phillips** will have the team on their shoulders and both have posted solid times early in the season.

"I look forward to seeing the two race," said Ehlert. "They have posted times mid to high 11s." The distance events return American Junior record holder, sophomore **Kara June**. June, who also set the Fresno State record in the steeplechase last season, returns to defend her WAC crown. After one season of having the steeplechase as a NCAA event, June will have to shave time off of her season-best time of 10:53.83. June is also an 800 and 1,500-meter competitor. She led the team last season in the 1,500 at 4:38.10.

"She's ready to take the next step," said distance coach Shannon Lieder. "Kara has the ability and the will to reach the NCAA meet whether it's this year or next."

Joining her in the lanes will be sophomore **Olga Gutierrez** and senior **Stacy Esquivel**, and freshmen **Jennifer Tyler**, **Nicolin Neal**, **Courtney Stewart**, **Stacy Aurit** and **Megan Netzel**. Gutierrez is the top runner in the 5,000 meters and she is coming off of a successful cross country season. Last year she clocked 17:51.99 and according to Lieder, will be the reigning force in the long distance events.

Once again Simmons is in the mix as she will be a top competitor in the hurdles. The all-around athlete had a team-leading time of 14.36 in the 100-meter hurdles. Junior **Mandy Hollister** is the leader in the 400 hurdles, coming off a successful season with a PR of 1:02.00. The two women are not alone, as freshmen **Joni Landau** and **Dominique Harper** will be etching their place in Bulldog history.

Queens of the Ring

Back in action for the Bulldogs is senior **April Wiechmann**, who redshirted the outdoor season last year. She, along with senior **Andrea Stelter**, junior **Jamie Farley** and sophomore **Kristin Schelir**, will provide the shot put arsenal.

"All four shot putters have the ability to throw 45 feet or more," said throws coach Chris Campbell. "They have put a lot of work into their off season workouts."

The discus event welcomes back the 2000 WAC Champion, Wiechmann for her final season. Schelir was the team leader last season with a mark of 153-1. Farley wasn't far behind with a personal-best 151-2. In the hammer, Stelter leads the pack after she posted a distance of 175-1, which is third in Fresno State history. Farley backs her up with a fourth ranked Fresno State throw of 170-6. Finally, the javelin will feature NCAA provisional qualifier, senior **Kayla Russum**. She posted a personal and team-best distance of 155-4 last season.

"Kayla has the potential to win the WAC in the javelin," said Campbell. "All three, including Wiechmann and Schelir are able to score at the conference meet."

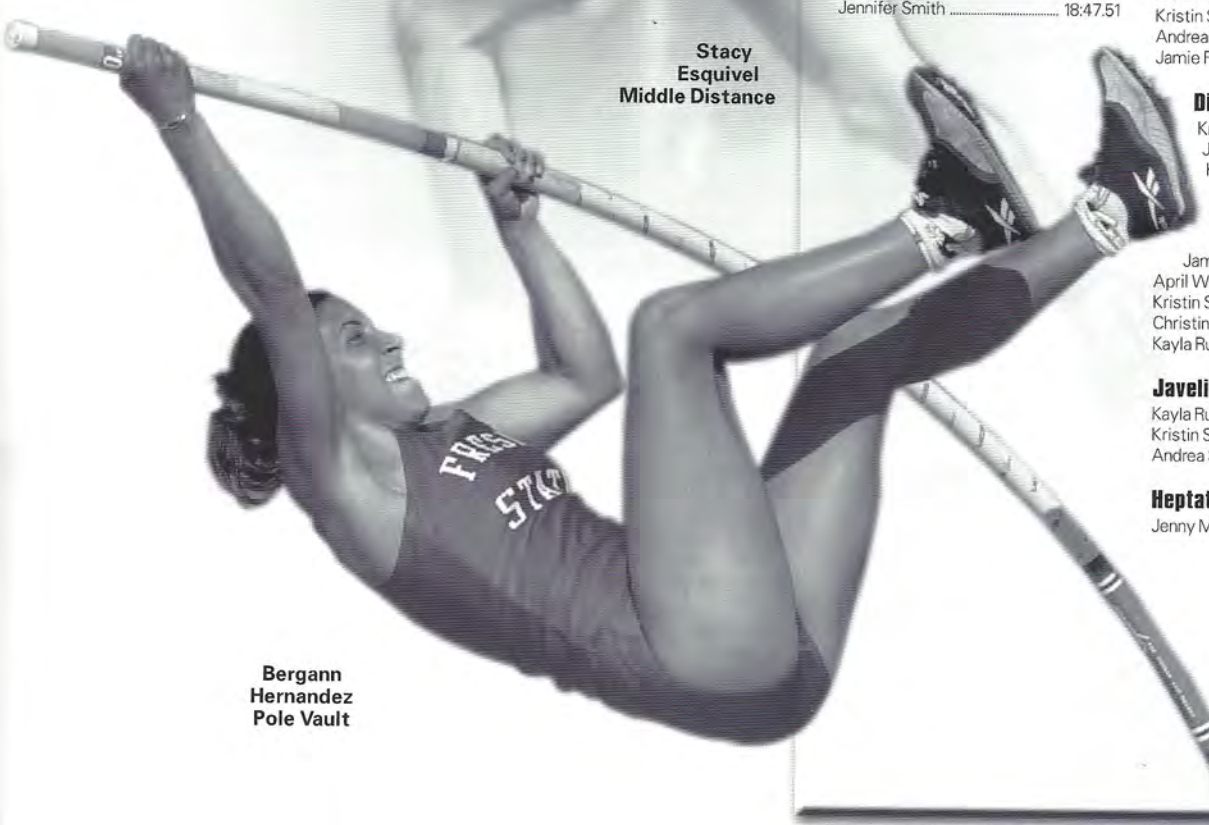
What's In Store

Fresno State track and field has just three home meets this season, but all three are big-time events. Beginning with the Cal-Nevada Championships in late March, the Bulldogs will compete against the best athletes from California and Nevada. Last season members representing UCLA, California, Stanford, Humboldt and Fresno State were among the participants from 13 teams. Next up for the 'Dogs at home is the Fresno Relays, which is the following weekend, April 2-6. This spectacle is always an experience, one that showcases the stars of the future. The final home meet of the season is a quad-meet with Sacramento State, Cal State Bakersfield and UC Riverside, Saturday, April 27.

The Outdoor WAC Championships will be held at Rice University in Houston, Texas, May 15-18. The NCAA Championships will be held in Baton Rouge, La., May 29-June 1.

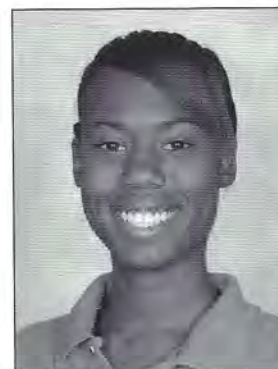

Season in Review



2001 Track & Field Review

What a season for the Bulldogs. The men's track and field team finished with a perfect 8-0 record versus multi-meet opponents and a 3-0 overall multi-meet team record. En route to this successful journey, the Bulldogs tallied 602 points over Cal Poly, Cal State Northridge, Air Force, Sacramento State, Cal State Fullerton and Cal State Bakersfield.

For the first time since 1994, Fresno State hosted the Western Athletic Conference Outdoor Championships at Warmerdam Field. The 'Dogs finished in third with 117 points. Vaulteer, Mark Unzueta complimented his Indoor WAC crown with an outdoor vault title, jumping at 16-6 3/4. The men's 4 x 400-meter relay team also earned a WAC Championship title after Reginal Allen inched past the University of Texas - El Paso anchorman.

The Bulldogs also sent two field performers to the 2001 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore., from May 30 through June 2. Beckenhauer was granted his ticket after he threw an automatic qualifier in the shot put of 64-2 1/2. He ranked seventh of 19 on the performance list entering the four day meet. The thrower finished in all-American style as he inked an eighth place finish with a toss of 60-7 1/4. Beckenhauer became just the second Bulldog to earn all-America honors in the shot put. A feat achieved in both 1987 and 1988 by John Bender. Beckenhauer also ranks second in the career leaders list with his personal-best.

The women were equally successful, walking away from the year with a sweep of all dual-meets. The team went a perfect 8-0 record. The Bulldogs had four women provisionally qualify for the 2001 NCAA Championships. Sophomore Crystal Simmons in the triple jump, Kayla Russum for javelin (155-4), Jynette Grayson-Reed for her 400-meter time (53.30) and Kara June in the steeplechase (10:53.87). Simmons was the only woman selected to attend the championships. She finished in 20th place of the 22 competitors with a distance of 38-9 1/2.

June became the first woman in Fresno State history to earn a WAC crown in the steeplechase, which made its appearance as an official NCAA event this season. She also now owns the Warmerdam Field and WAC Championships record as well with her first place time. At the 2001 WAC Outdoor

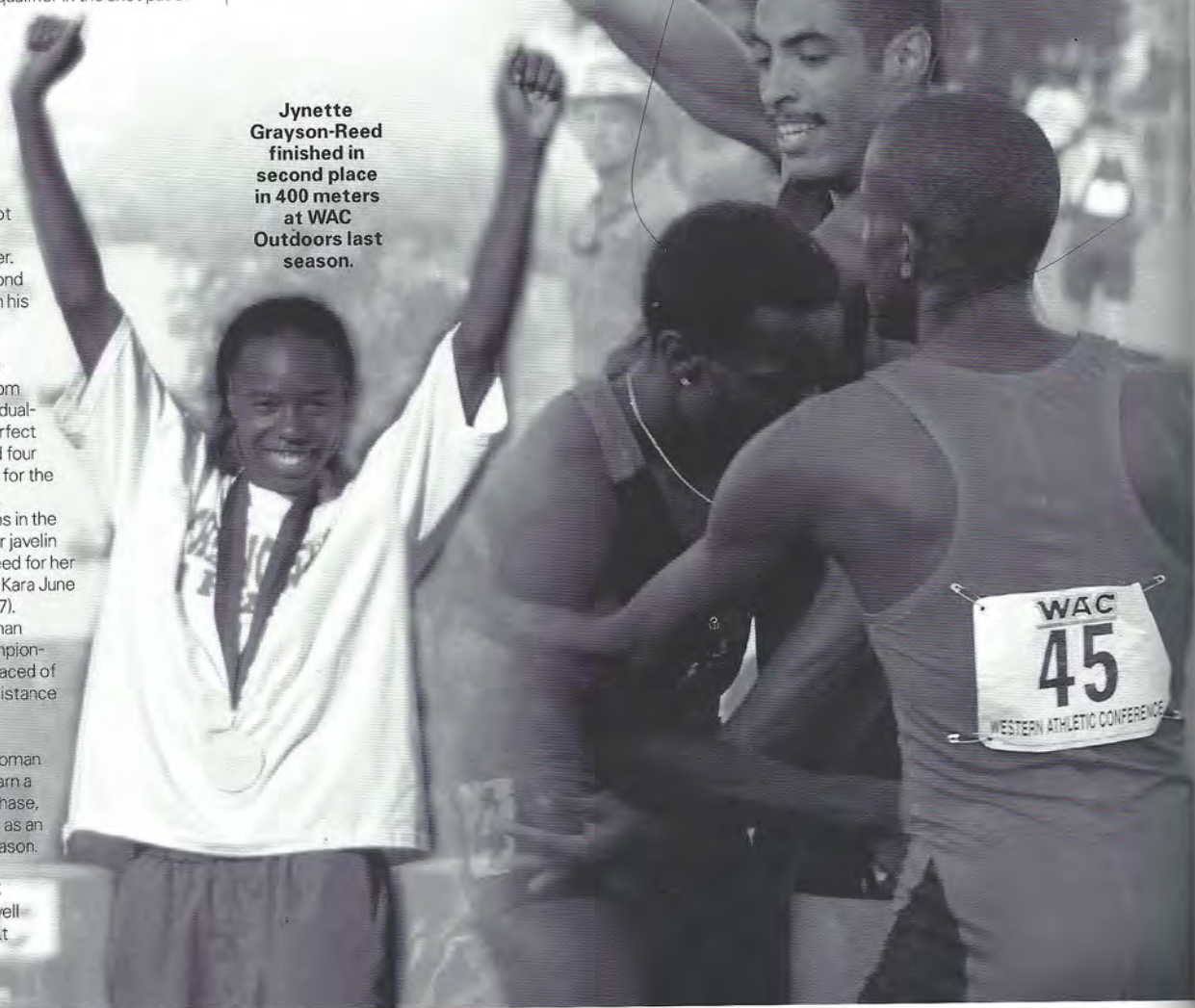
Championships the 'Dogs finished in a tie at third place with TCU (110 points), just one point away from second.

Let this season be a lesson that Fresno State is a squad to be reckoned with next season. After all, the teams quickly displaced the other central valley teams by sending Cal Poly and CS Northridge packing. The 'Dogs own the bragging rights of the big three after defeating the two schools in the final meet of the season. The Bulldogs return to the 2001-02 season, fully loaded after losing just eight student-athletes to graduation. Granted, the team will feel a low blow with the loss of one of the greatest sprinters to pass through Warmerdam Field, Jynette Grayson-Reed, not to mention, the hurdling skills of Tamisha Allen and Brandi Jenkins. The high jump pit will seem a little empty without Erin Boothe who has made quite the home at the south end of the field and who can forget the numerous laps logged by distance runner,

Brianna Denley. For the men, it will be a tremendous feat to fill the space left by C.J. Nakayama. Nakayama came in and as a freshman won the WAC decathlon in 1998. He returned after injuring his shoulder to play an intricate part in the success of the Bulldogs as a relay team member and in the sprinting events. Joining him is Ron Fox, who filled the blocks next to Nakayama in the sprinting events. Yes, the 'Dogs lose some tremendous athletes, but they return Beckenhauer, Unzueta. The women look forward to seeing June, Simmons and Wiechmann making their marks in the history books.

Jynette Grayson-Reed finished in second place in 400 meters at WAC Outdoors last season.

The men's 4 x 400-meter relay team also earned a WAC Championship title

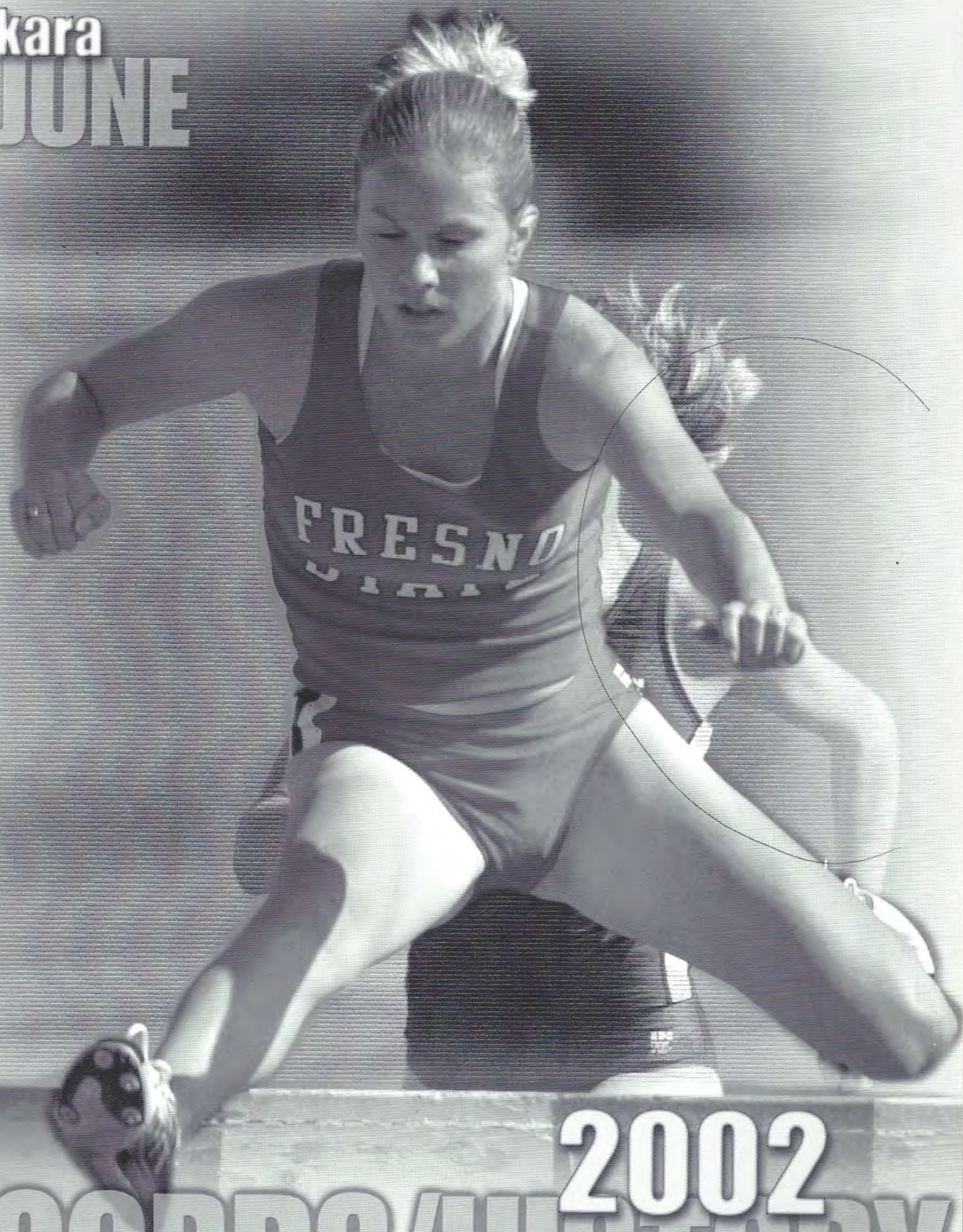

World Record. These two words and the Bob Mathias Fresno Relays have become synonymous for well over a half decade. In what has become an annual rite of spring in the San Joaquin Valley, the West's most visible meet has long attracted some of the world's finest athletes onto the hallowed ground at Ratcliffe Stadium until continuing its success at Warmerdam Field. Along with its predecessor, the West Coast Relays, the Bob Mathias Fresno Relays has had 40 world records broken or tied in the 73-year history of the meet. The greatest athletes of the valley — Bob Mathias, Dutch Warmerdam, Rafer Johnson, Tommie Smith and Lee Evans — began competing in high school at the West Coast Relays.

The meet has also seen the spawning of some top stars outside of track and field circles. Baseball great Jackie Robinson, football stars O.J. Simpson, Ollie Matson, Henry Ellard, Willie Gault and Ron Brown and basketball's Bill Russell received some of their first claims to fame at Ratcliffe Stadium.

But the Bob Mathias Fresno Relays is not just for the world class athlete. Since its inception in 1927, the meet has included grammar school, high school and junior college events, tying the valley and the local community into one of the most successful track and field meets in the nation. A fan can watch and cheer for the local athlete, and at the same time view some of the finest athletes the world has seen. This diversity is what makes the meet so unique, and why the tradition has carried on and grown for so many years.

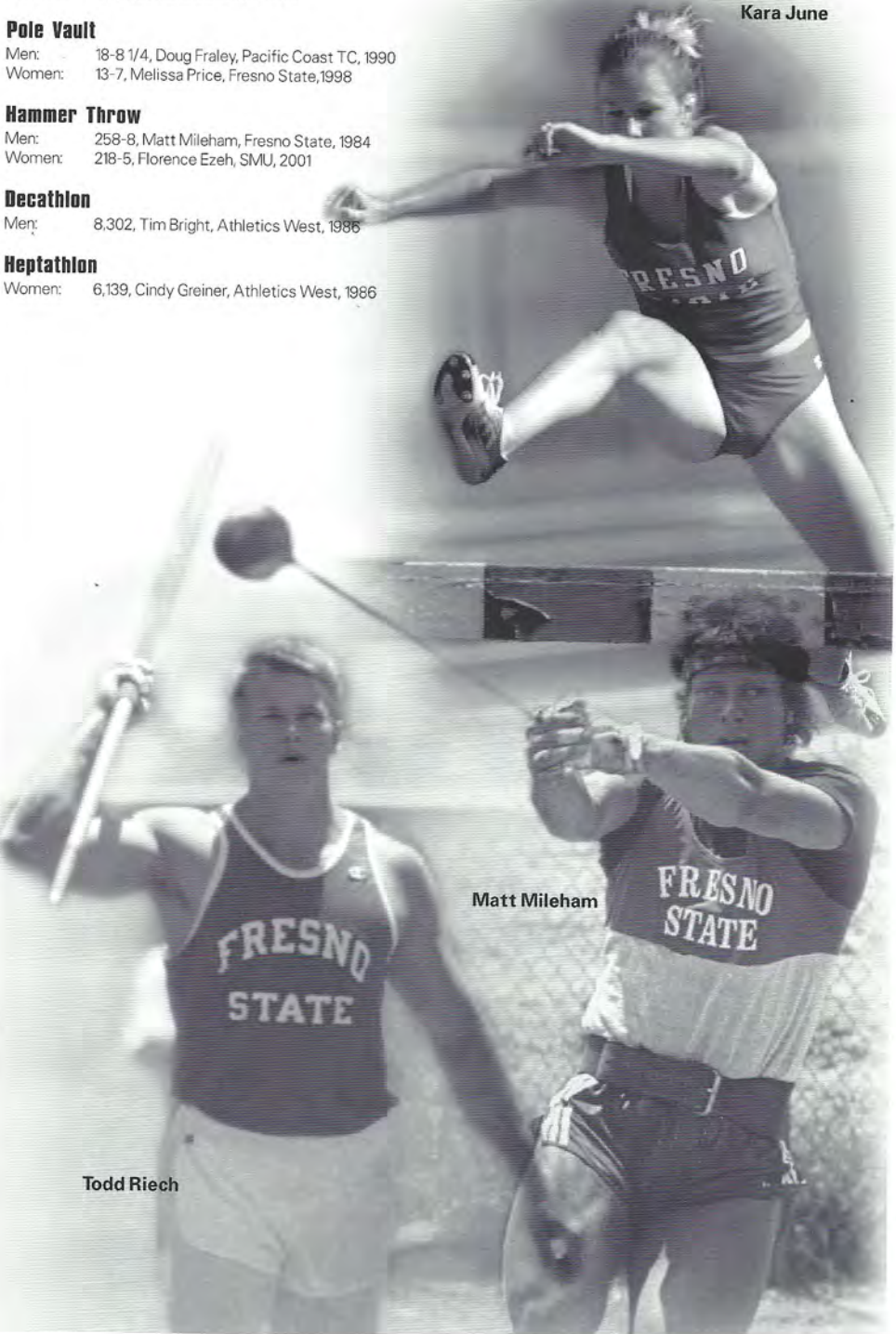

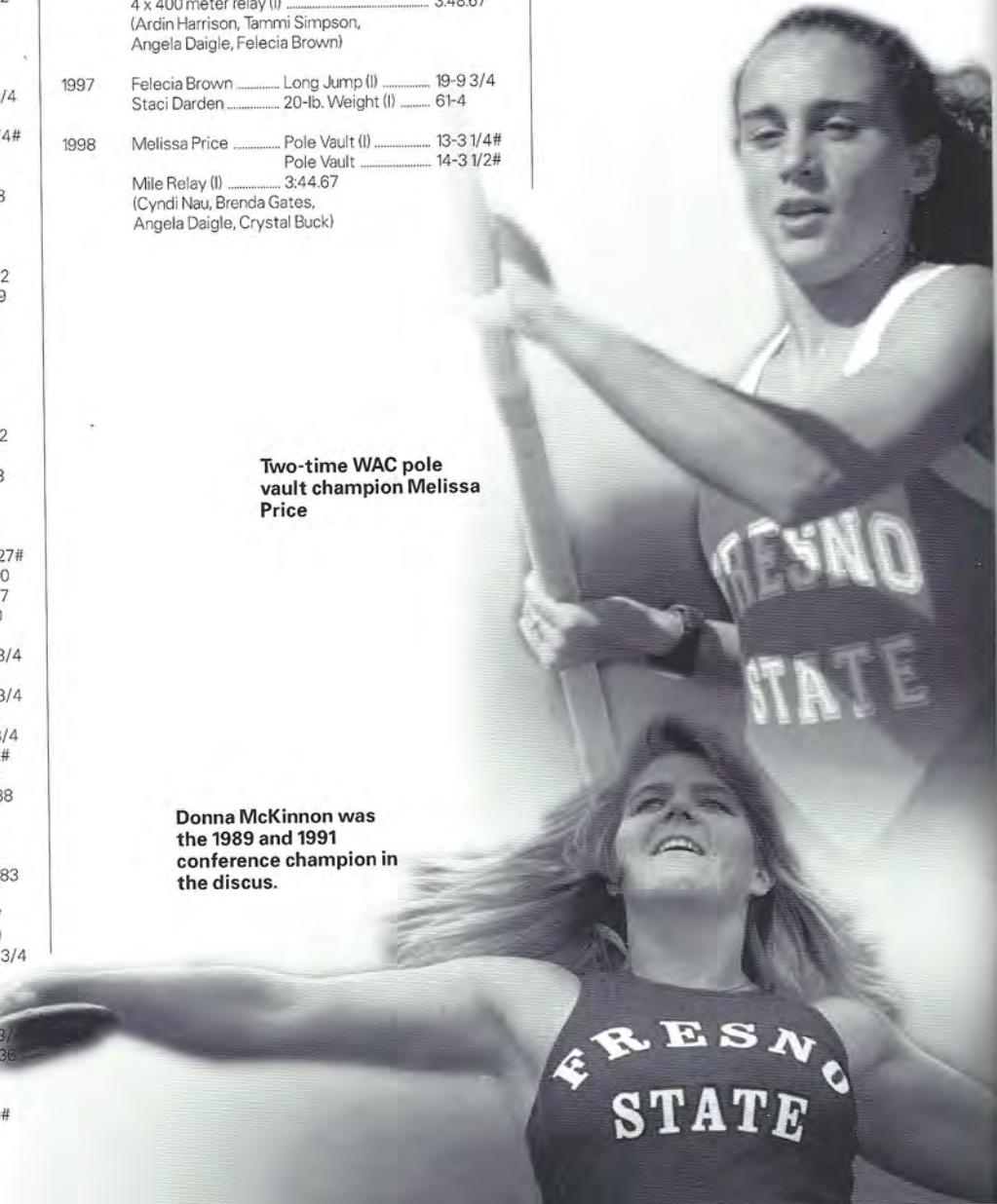

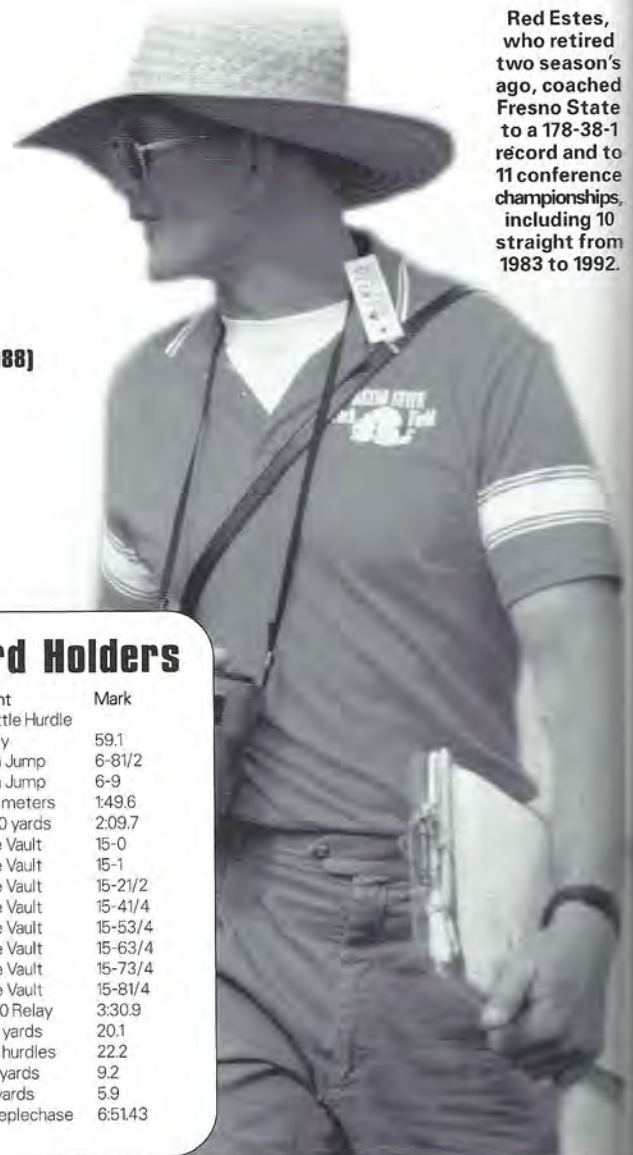

Fresno State Pole Vault History



Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam 1938-42

Career Best: 15-8 1/2

- First vaulter in the world to clear 15 feet on April 13, 1940 in the University of California's Edwards Stadium in Berkeley, Calif.
- Cleared 15 feet or better with a bamboo pole 43 times before anyone cleared it once
- Set outdoor pole vault world record of 15-7 3/4 in 1942 in Modesto and it stood for 15 years
- Set indoor pole vault world record of 15-8 1/2 in 1943 at the Chicago Relays, which stood for 16 years
- Seven-time United States TAC champion
- 1942 John L. Sullivan Award winner
- 1941 John L. Sullivan Award runner-up
- Voted in a national poll by UPI in 1955 as the greatest field athlete of all-time
- Named to several Hall of Fames, including the United States Track and Field Hall of Fame and the National Track and Field Hall of Fame

Cornelius Dutch Warmerdam named American Pole Vault of the Century

Reno, Nevada – Over 2,000 people packed the Reno/Sparks Convention Center to witness the naming of the American Pole Vault of the Century. As part of the USA Track and Field Pole Vault Summit a special ceremony was held honoring some of the greatest athletes in American History. Honored guests included American Olympians and World Record Holders including: Bob Richards, Bob Seagren, Dave Roberts, Billy Olson, Don Bragg, Earl Bell, Staci Dragila, Ron Morris, Jan Johnson, Mike Tully, Tim Bright, Don Baird and Tim Bright.

The American Vault of the Century Award was divided into four categories; Fiberglass Pole Vault of the Century, Steel Pole Vault of the Century, Bamboo Pole Vault of the Century and American Pole Vault of the Century.

Bob Seagren, the 1968 Olympic Gold Medallist and 1972 Silver Medallist was honored as the Fiberglass Pole Vault of the Century. Bob Richards, the 1952 and 1956 Olympic Gold Medallist was honored as the Steel Pole Vault of the Century.

Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam, the man who held the Pole Vault World Record for more than 15 years, was named the American Pole Vault of the Century. Due to World War II and his being a "professional" coach, he never had the opportunity to compete in the Olympics. He dominated the sport longer than any other individual, clearing 15 feet 43 times before anyone else cleared it. Amazingly, no one broke his record until the advent of the steel pole.

The 2000 USA Track and Field Pole Vault Summit proved to be a huge affair as over 1,000 pole vaulters and coaches from throughout the world attended this event. Numerous past and present Pole Vaulting greats showed up to relive memories and create new ones. Jeff Hartwig, the American Record Holder and Atlanta Olympian won the men's Super Elite Competition with a World leading jump of 19-4 1/2 (5.90m). Kelly Suttle won the women's Super Elite Competition with a jump of 13-11 3/4 (4.25m).

2001

Red Estes — Estes was the men's head track and field coach at Fresno State for 20 seasons and led his teams to an overall record of 188-38-1 before retiring in 2000. He also guided his athletes to the only Western Athletic Conference Championship in track and field history in 1994. Throughout his days as a coach, he was honored with several accolades including, 10 consecutive Big West Conference Championships from 1982-92 and in the same time span was named Big West Coach of the Year, 1995 Co-WAC Coach of the Year, 1992 Region 8 Coach of the Year and 1998 top male coach at the Cal/Nevada Championships. Overall, he has coached more than 100 all-Americans and seven individual NCAA titles. Estes began his coaching career at the University of Oregon in 1959 as co-track coach of the Ducks' freshman squad. While serving in the U.S. Army, he was a player-coach of the Council International du Sport Militaire from 1961-1963. In 1963 he moved on to become the assistant track and field coach at Springfield (Ore.) High School and then spent another season as the freshman coach at Oregon. While in college at the University of Oregon Estes threw the discus and shot put and played freshman football. He graduated in 1959 from Oregon, where he earned his B.S. degree in physical education. Estes then went on to earn his masters in 1964 from the same school. In 1969 he completed his education at the University of Northern Colorado when he received his doctorate in physical education.

2000

Henry Ellard — Ellard was a phenomenal jumper for the Bulldog track and field team in the early 1980s. He is the school record holder in the triple jump with a mark of 55-0 1/2 and is currently ninth on the career long jump list with a mark of 25-0 1/4. Ellard earned All-American honors in 1982 when he captured seventh in the triple jump at the NCAA Outdoor nationals.

Tanya Ehlert — Ehlert is now an assistant coach with Fresno State track and field, was one of the finest sprinters to wear a Bulldog uniform. As a student-athlete from 1990-94, Ehlert established herself as a great competitor. She is the school record holder in both the indoor (53.01) and outdoor (52.80) 400-meter, and is the WAC indoor record holder in the same event. She also ranks fourth in school history in the 200-meter with a time of 24.0. Ehlert was also a piece of the top Bulldog 4 x 200-meter relay (1:36.91, 1993) and the distance medley relay (11:51.32, 1992). Her solid performances resulted in four All-American honors. In 1992, she took seventh in the 400 meters at the NCAA Indoor nationals and then seventh again at the NCAA Outdoors in 1993. In her senior year, Ehlert was an All-American in the 400-meter at both the indoor (9th) and outdoor (3rd) NCAA finals.

Erkki Mustakari — Mustakari is one of many athletes in a great pole vault tradition at Fresno State. He was the first Bulldog to clear 17 feet and he held the school record of 17-4 for 16 years. He set the

Finnish National Record in 1968 by clearing a height of 17-0 1/2 and competed for Finland in the '68 Olympic games. Mustakari was a two-time All-American by placing fourth at both the 1968 and 1969 NCAA Championships. He was also a two-time CCAA champion and the PCAA champion in 1970.

Tom Pagani — Pagani, widely recognized as one of the finest throwing coaches in the United States, was head women's coach for 17 years. Pagani led the Bulldogs to Big West titles in 1987, '88, '91 and '92 and the WAC indoor crown in 1994, for which he was named the conference's Indoor Coach of the Year. He coached 39 Bulldog All-Americans and 52 conference champions. Pagani's final dual meet record was 142-35-1.

1999

Ken Dose — A 1960 graduate of Fresno State College, Ken Dose has been making immeasurable contributions to the track and field community since he started his career as a Bulldog. Dose will retire from coaching this year after having spent the last 28 years as the women's track coach at Fresno City College. During his time at Fresno City he spent 13 years as chairman of the PE/Recreation department and was instrumental in starting the women's volleyball and track programs Dose's contributions are not limited to the Fresno area as he has been a major force in the junior college track community throughout the state. He has worked for 17 years as co-meet director of the California Community College Cross Country State Championships and twice served as meet director for the California Community College Track and Field State Championships. Dose has played a large role in the continuing success of the Fresno Relays, serving as a master official for 26 years with the USA Track and Field Association, and working on the relays' games committee for 33 years. His many honors in the world of track and field include selection as team manager for the 1991 USA National Indoor Track and Field championship team in Japan, San Joaquin Valley Community College Track Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1996, USA Track and Field Convention delegate from 1988-1996, and Central Valley Conference Track and Field Coach of the Year in 1998. Dose and his wife, Paige, have four children, Taylor, Brett Caryn and Christian, and two grandchildren.

John Bender — John Bender goes down in the record books as the top shot putter in Fresno State history. A Bulldog from 1984-88, Bender still holds the school record in the shot put with a throw of 65-6 in 1987. He is also ranks fifth in the 35-pound weight throw at 63-4 3/4, and eighth in the weight pentathlon with 3,909 points. Bender was a five-time All-American during his Fresno State career, earning the honor four times in the shot put and once in the 35-pound weight throw. In addition he was a two-time PCAA champion in the shot, winning

the event in 1987 and 1988. As a senior, Bender had his best finish ever at the NCAA Championships when he finished second, helping to lead the team to a sixth-place finish.

1998

Ed Kerber — Kerber's association with Fresno State track and field goes back to his competitive days as a Bulldog in 1948. As a freshman, Kerber ran the mile for Fresno State. And that same year, Kerber got his start as an official at a Fresno High School track meet. Then in 1959, Kerber began a 39 year string of officiating at the West Coast Relays (which was only interrupted one year for heart surgery). He began his tenure as a javelin official and then eventually made his way to the finish line, where he has been Fresno State's Chief Finish Line Judge since 1986. Kerber was also the original president of the Track Backers Club in 1980, holding the position for two years. Kerber has always been a solid supporter of Fresno State Athletics, as he has been an active member of the Bulldog Foundation for over 10 years.

Cathie Wilson-Jones — Wilson-Jones admits she wasn't "that great" of a javelin thrower in college. But as an all-around athlete who also competed in the 100, 200, 400, 400 hurdles, 4x100 and 4x400 relay, she managed to earn high point honors in 1985 while being named the Most Valuable Athlete on the squad. It was after her Fresno State career that Wilson-Jones excelled. 1987 was a very eventful year for her, as she placed third at the U.S. National Championships and competed at the Pan-Am Games and the

World Championships. But the event she won't forget is the near-fatal car accident she survived that December. After suffering a broken leg and other numerous injuries, Wilson-Jones attempted a comeback. And after months of grueling rehabilitation, she was back throwing the javelin in competition. Wilson-Jones emerged once again at the 1988 U.S. Olympic Trials and then for the final time at the 1992 Olympic Trials where she placed fifth. Her collegiate best of 164-4 is still the fifth best all-time mark on the Fresno State javelin list.

1997

Erv Hunt— A former standout athlete for Fresno State in football and in track and field, Hunt has become one of the most prolific track and field coaches in the United States. Hunt was the head coach for the 1996 U.S. Olympic men's track and field team after serving stints as an assistant coach for the U.S. team at the 1992 Olympics, the 1993 World Championships, the 1989 World Cup Games, and the 1986 Freedom Games. Hunt is finishing up his 25th season as the head coach at Cal, where he owns the best winning percentage in the program's history. Hunt enjoyed success during his playing career, as well. In track and field, he ran a 14.0 in the 120-yards high hurdles at Fresno City College, the nation's top junior college mark in 1967. He later transferred to Fresno State on a football-track scholarship. He played defensive back and earned little All-America honors as the Bulldogs won two conference titles. A sixth-round pick of the Green Bay Packers (145th selection overall) in the 1970 NFL draft, Hunt played two seasons of professional football until a back injury forced an early retirement.

Nicole Carroll— Carroll won the javelin at the U.S. Olympic Trials and participated in her first Olympic Games in 1996. In 1995, she threw 205-10, the farthest by an American in four years. During her two seasons at Fresno State, Carroll earned All-America honors twice in the javelin. In 1990, she finished seventh at the NCAA Championships (161-3) to become Fresno State's first All-American in the javelin. The following season, Carroll finished sixth at the NCAA meet (164-9) despite spending most of that season sidelined with a back injury. At the time, Carroll was only the third Bulldog to be named All-American more than one time. Carroll's collegiate personal-best of 169-5 is still No. 2 all-time at Fresno State.

1996

Jeff Roberson— Roberson was only seconds shy of winning the national championship when he placed second at 1:46.64 in the 800-meter at the 1986 NAAs. Roberson was also an indoor All-American in the 500-meter dash in 1985, finishing eighth. While at Fresno State, he left his mark in a major way, topping the school's all-time 800 list in 1986 with his own 1:46.1. His time was the world's fastest of the year up to that point. In addition, he set a world indoor record in the 500-meter, clocking in at a blazing 1:01.19. As a senior, he won the PCAA crown in the 800 and the 1600 relay as a junior.

Tamara Compton-Neeley— Compton-Neeley is a two-time indoor All-American in the triple jump, as well as an outdoor winner. In 1987, Compton-Neeley placed sixth in the NCAA triple jump and ninth at the U.S. outdoors. She improved on her indoor finish in

1988, where she came away with fifth. Compton-Neeley is the Fresno State record holder in the triple jump, leaping to a school-best 41-9 3/4. The lifetime mark put her at No. 25 in the country at one time. She also possesses Fresno State's all-time best indoor triple jump mark at 42-8. Compton-Neeley is No. 2 on the school's long jump list with a career-best of 20-3 and has the 10th-best career scoring mark with 145 1/2 points.

1995

Mark Heppner— Heppner was one of the most illustrious pole vaulters in Fresno State history. Heppner established a career best of 18-2 1/2, which was the third-best mark in the history of the PCAA and second-best all time at Fresno State. In 1986, Heppner combined with Doug Fraley and Kelly Rodrigues to form one of the best vaulting trios in collegiate history. The three combined for 55 feet in height during the '86 campaign, which was the best season total ever by a threesome at the time. Heppner finished third at the 1986 PCAA Championships behind Fraley and Rodrigues as the trio swept the top three spots in the event. But Heppner beat them both at the NCAA Championships, where he placed second in the nation. He collected four PCAA championship rings in his career.

Tonya Mendonca-Olivas— Mendonca-Olivas still holds the Fresno State indoor (6-2) and outdoor (6-1 1/4) records in the high jump. Mendonca-Olivas was the only four-time All-American in Fresno State women's history until Tanya Dooley nailed down her fourth in 1994. Mendonca-Olivas won three straight outdoor All-American honors from 1985-87. She picked up an indoor All-American certificate during the 1988 season. She was fifth in the NCAA's in 1985 and tied for seventh in 1986. In 1987, she overcame a bruised heel to place eighth. In all, she qualified for seven NCAA Championships. She also was a two-time PCAA champion.

1994

Lacy Barnes— Barnes was one of the most prolific throwers in Fresno State history. She holds the Bulldog record in the discus (204-1), is third on the all-time shot list (47-2) and sixth in the javelin (164-0). Barnes was a four-time conference champion in the discus (1984-88) and won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association shot title in 1988. She was the TAC discus champion in 1989 and 1991 and was ranked No. 1 in the U.S. three times, the last time coming in 1991, when she represented the U.S. at the World Championships held in Tokyo, Japan.

Lou Futrell— Futrell finished fourth at the 1943 NCAA Championships in the 110-meter high hurdles. Started at halfback on the high-powered 1942 Bulldog football team that finished the season 9-1. After finishing his collegiate career at USC, he returned to coach football and track at Edison High.

Dot Jones— Jones was the dominant shot-putter in Fresno State history, with a collegiate best and school record mark of 54-2 3/4 coming in 1986. She was the first Bulldog women to earn indoor All-American honors by finishing fifth in the shot in 1985. Later that same season she earned outdoor All-

American honors with a fourth-place finish at NAAs. Overall, she earned three All-American honors and three conference titles in her Fresno State career. Jones was a finalist at the U.S. Olympic Trials in 1988 and '92.

Iva Wright— Wright was a pioneer of women's athletics at Fresno State, especially in track and field. Came to Fresno State as a national junior champion in both shot and discus, only to find the Bulldogs didn't have a field a women's squad. In 1973, the FS student council sponsored her at the AIAW championships, where she took fourth in the shot and third in discus. She won the AIAW title in 1974 and remains as the only female national champion in Fresno State history.

1993

Doug Fraley— Fraley is the school record holder in the pole vault (18-11) and is the youngest athlete to be inducted into Fresno States Hall of Fame. He won the vault at the 1986 NCAA Indoor Championships and then became the only Bulldog to ever win back-to-back national titles in any event by taking the indoor title in 1987. He won another title at the 1987 NCAA Outdoor Championships and ended his career with five All-American honors.

Joe Shropshire— Shropshire was the Bulldogs' 10th All-American after he finished fourth in the 440-yard dash and fourth in the 440-yard dash at the 1944 NCAA Championships. He repeated his All-American performance with a sixth-place finish in the 440 at the 1945 NCAA meet.

1992

Robert Womack

— Womack was the voice of Bulldog track and field for many years and was one of the most knowledgeable historians on the sport in the San Joaquin Valley. He worked as an announcer at the TAC Senior Nationals, the NCAA Division I and II Championships and the Big West and Pac-10 Conference Championships.

Matt Mileham — One of the most prolific throwers in school history, Mileham was an eight-time All-American in the hammer and 35 lb. weight throws. He was also a two-time Olympian for Great Britain (1984, 88). He still holds the school record in the hammer (252-8) and the 35 lb. weight (73-4 1/2).

Roger George — In 1976, George set the Fresno State decathlon mark of 7,960 (scored with 1985 tables) that still stands today. He was a three-time conference champion for the Bulldogs in the decathlon (1972-74).

Renee Ortiz — Ortiz was the first female All-American in Fresno State history. She earned the honor in the 3,000-meter. Ortiz still holds school records in 3,000 (9:22.59), 5,000-meter (16:26.40) and 10,000-meter (34:13.4).

Steve Campbell — Campbell still holds the Fresno State record for 400-meter (46.03) he set in 1977. He placed third in the 1977 NCAA Outdoor Championships, good for All-American honors. In '77, his senior year, he set school records in the 400 and as a member of the mile and sprint relay squads.

Tommy Nelson — Nelson one of Fresno State's first All-Americans. He placed sixth in the 1939 NCAA Outdoor Championships in the 100-yards to garner the award. His personal-bests were 9.6 in the 100 yards and 21.00 in the 200 yards.

1991

Mike Agostini — Agostini, a sprinter from Trinidad, still holds the second-best 200-meter mark in school history, 20.84 in 1958. Agostini set a hand-

timed world record of 20.1 in the 220-yards in Fresno back in 1956.

Bruce Farris — Farris has been a sportswriter at *The Fresno Bee* for over 40 years. He covered all of Fresno State's sports for nearly 20 years.

Sam Workman — Workman played the role his last name suggested, running everything from the 100-meter to the 440-meter to the long jump.

1990

Sid Nickolas — A four-time All-American jumper and hurdler, Nickolas held the Fresno State long jump record for nearly 20 years.

Jack Wilcox — Wilcox was a two-time All-American in the 880-yards and finished sixth at the national championships in 1957. That year, the Bulldogs finished third in the meet. His PR 1:46.1 in the 880 was the school record for 28 years and his 4:08.9 mile was the Fresno State best for 23 years.

Floyd "Pee Wee" Wilson — Wilson soared to a 24-3 3/4 long jump in 1934 to set a Fresno State record. He went on to finish third at the national championship meet that year.

Myron "Andy" Anderson — Anderson also played football at Fresno State in 1930 and '31. He is also a member of the Fresno Hall of Fame.

1989

Clinton Linder — Linder's own running career was cut short by an injury, but he has since devoted more than 42 years as a Fresno State track official.

Rosemary Rodden — Rodden was the West Coast Relays secretary for 27 years, but she began her career as an Fresno State secretary for the late Bulldog track coach J. Flint Hanner in 1948.

John Warkentin — Warkentin competed in the decathlon for more than a decade. He won the national AAU meet decathlon in 1968 and again in 1970. He scored a career-high 8,031 points in placing third in a meet against the USSR in 1977.

1988

Harold "Hal" Beatty — Beatty was a distance runner at Fresno State and later returned as a coach in 1937. He served as basketball coach, dean of men, athletic director and teacher at Fresno State.

Art Cazares — Undefeated throughout his two-year career as a Bulldog, Cazares won the 1942 NCAA two-mile championship.

Les Laing — Laing was part of Jamaica's 1,600 relay team that set a world record in the 1952 Helsinki Olympic Games, making him the only Fresno State graduate (class of 1952) to win an Olympic gold medal in track and field.

1987

Fred Barnes — Barnes was Fresno State's first NCAA pole vault champion, winning the honor in 1953. Barnes broke the school record held by the legendary Dutch Warmerdam (his coach at the time) by clearing 14-8. He went on to tie for third at the 1956 Olympic Trials, just missing a spot on the team.

Darel Newman — Newman's school record time of 10.26 in the 100-meter time stood for 32 years. He guided Fresno State to an NCAA College Division title in 1964 and went on to place fourth at the NCAA (university) meet in the 100. In 1965, Newman beat Olympic gold medalist Bob Hayes with a winning time of 5.9 seconds in a 60-yard indoor race.

Ed Ortman — *The Fresno Bee's* sports editor from 1927-65, Ortman earned a reputation as a great track and field writer. He was inducted into the Fresno Athletic Hall of Fame, as well as its boxing and Twilight League baseball halls of fame.

1986

Charles Craig — Craig played a significant part in one of Fresno State's greatest NCAA Championship showings, placing first in the triple jump in 1964 as the Bulldogs finished third overall. He also ran the second leg on Fresno State's runner-up 400-meter relay team. Craig, now a head track coach at Cal State Bakersfield, won the U.S. triple jump title in 1967.

Ed Piston — Piston was the man behind the scenes for 27 years as Bulldog sports publicist and 30 years as West Coast Relays press box headmaster.

Ancel Robinson — Robinson still shares the world record in the 220 low hurdles with a 22.2. That mark was his winning time at the 1957 NCAA Championships.

1985

J. Flint Hammer — Hammer coached several great Fresno State College teams in a 34-year career from 1927-60, and is credited with founding the West Coast Relays.

Walter Marty — Marty was Fresno State's first NCAA champion, an honor he earned as a high jumper in 1934. He also set a world record of 6-8 5/8 that year.

Francis Miller — Miller never missed officiating at the West Coast Relays in the its' first 55 years of existence (1927-82).

Ken Potter — Serious digestive tract surgery sidelined Potter one year, but he officiated at 54 of the first 55 West Coast Relays carnivals.

Elroy Robinson — Robinson won the NCAA 880-meter title in 1935 and later won two world titles and broke the 800-meter world record.

Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam — Warmerdam, the namesake of the competitive track at Fresno State University, is considered the greatest bamboo vaulter of all-time. He dominated his era like no other field event athlete before or since, and was a successful coach at Fresno State from 1961-80.

CENTER FOR EXCELLENCE

Fresno State's Director of Track and Field, Robert Fraley, has a vision for the development of a new program at Fresno State, the Center for Excellence.

The track and field Center for Excellence is a mentoring program for elite athletes, who are pursuing an advanced degree, while training to become amateurs and professional athletes. In addition, the program is directed towards those persons seeking to become track and field coaches. The kinesiology curriculum at Fresno State offers advanced studies in the fields of Sports Medicine, Exercise Science, Biomechanics, Nutrition and Sports Psychology that would aid in the educating of the prospective future coaches and elite athletes. With a joint effort between the track and field program and the Department of Kinesiology at Fresno State, in addition to the \$700,000 expansion to the Exercise Science Lab, the Center for Excellence will become a reality.

Fresno State Model for the Track and Field Center for Excellence

I. Concept: The sport of track and field is a coach driven sport.

II. Philosophy: The sport of track and field is in need of knowledgeable new coaches who can help fill the coaching positions, which go unfilled each season at many levels including elementary, high school and clubs.

The program is designed to accomplish seven main areas.

- Increase their knowledge of training principles, training concepts annual training programs, sports medicine, sports nutrition, sports science and sports psychology
- Learn how to communicate their knowledge
- Learn how to demonstrate skills
- Learn how to work with other staff members
- Learn how the legal responsibilities of coaches
- Learn how to organize and manage practice
- Learn how to care for equipment

III. Targeted athletes/students

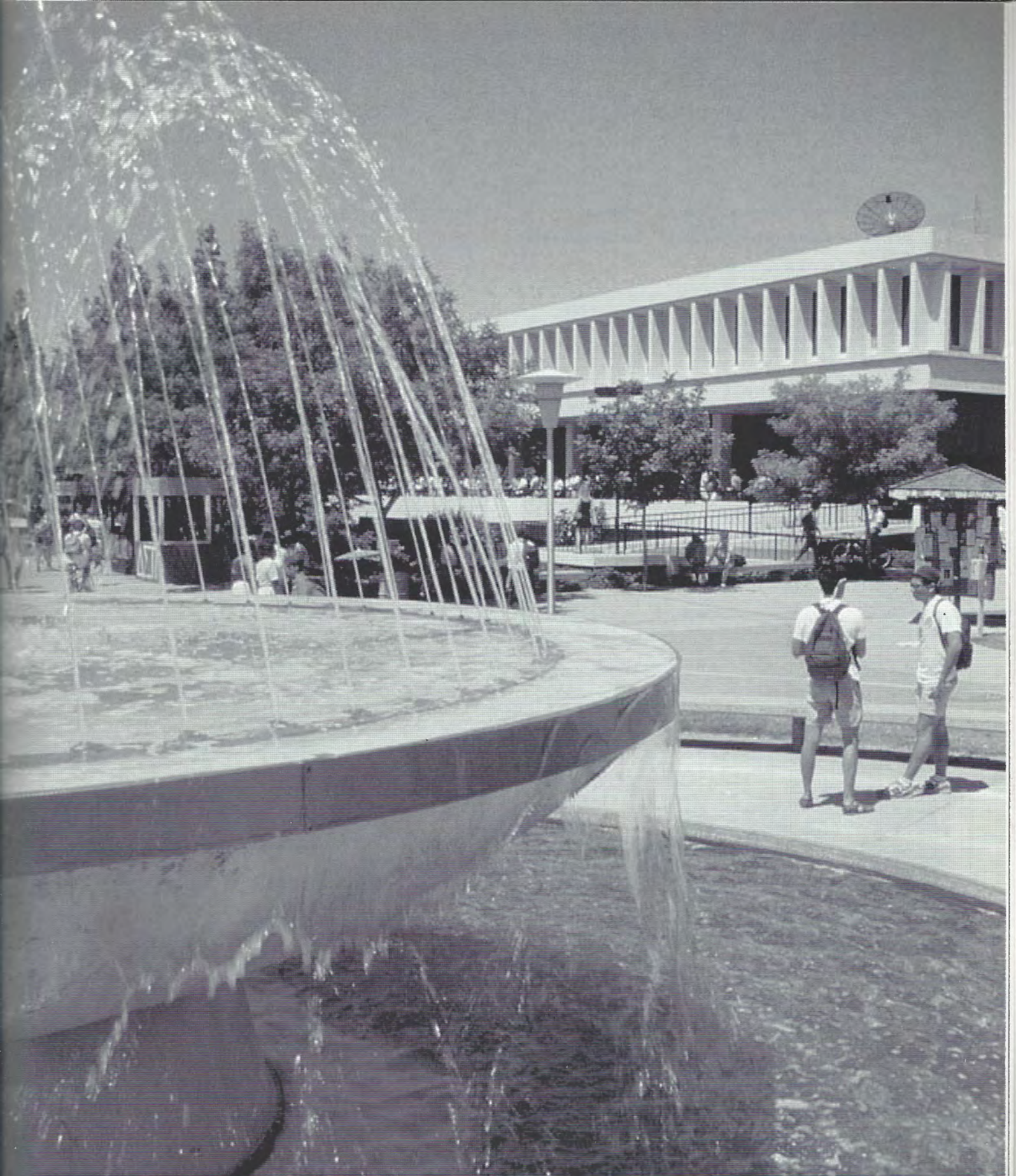
- Elite student-athletes who have finished eligibility and are seeking a graduate degree
- Continuing student-athletes working on a teaching credential and going into track and field coaching
- Those students in mid-life career changes, returning to college to become a teacher or track and field coach. The program has students who work as part-time instructors in the Kinesiology Department, students who have passed the C-Best Test and work as substitute teachers in local schools, while others are tutors on campus - all while continuing their education.

IV. Responsibilities of Students in the Program

- Be on time
- Follow directions/workouts of the mentor coaches
- Assume the role of coach in the coach-athlete relationship, per University policy
- Store equipment at the end of practice
- Assist coaches with meet and clinic preparation
- Follow closely the code of behavior set up by the athletics department, per University policy
- Follow the concept: *"Team Spirit is the magnet that draws people."*

"With more and more post-collegiate athletes continuing on to become elite-athletes, we need to find a way to help them continue in the sport of track and field while pursuing their education so that they can step into a professional career when their athletic career is over. The Center For Excellence program will do just that." — Bob Fraley

Bob Fraley has been mentoring student-athletes for the past 20 years as a track and field coach at Fresno State.

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With Pulitzer Prize winning faculty, two "named" schools resulting from multi-million-dollar gifts, and 11 endowed chairs — California State University, Fresno is earning a reputation as one of the West Coast's premier universities.

Fresno State is Central California's leading university with outstanding programs in literature, business, agriculture, and education. Fresno State offers a joint doctorate with the University of California and just received a \$4 million gift to develop an independent doctorate — the first in the 23-campus CSU system. Fresno State's Smittcamp Family Honors College admits 75 of California's top high school graduates each year with "full-ride" scholarships. Fresno State offers challenging and innovative programs in the liberal arts and sciences, in the professions, in applied fields, and in special and interdisciplinary areas.

The excellence of our faculty is documented in a variety of ways, including recognition from national and international associations. Ninety percent of the full-time tenured track faculty hold doctoral degrees in their areas of study and 23 school, departmental and professional programs have earned national accreditation. However, the most important characteristic of our faculty is their ability to care about students and their willingness to give of their time on an individual basis. Fresno State offers 57 bachelor degree programs and 40 master degree programs.

THE CAMPUS

Under a dense canopy of 4,000 trees, the campus sits at the northeast edge of Fresno, against a backdrop of the beautiful Sierra Nevada. The campus was officially designated as an arboretum in 1978. Its park-like setting creates a beautiful environment for making new friends and pursuing a quality education.

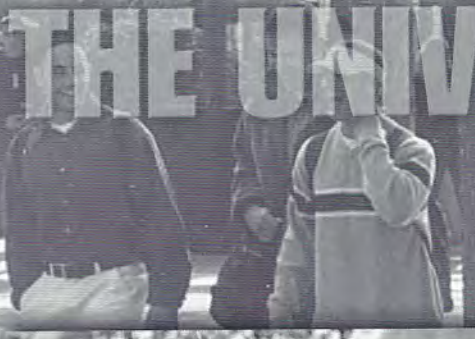
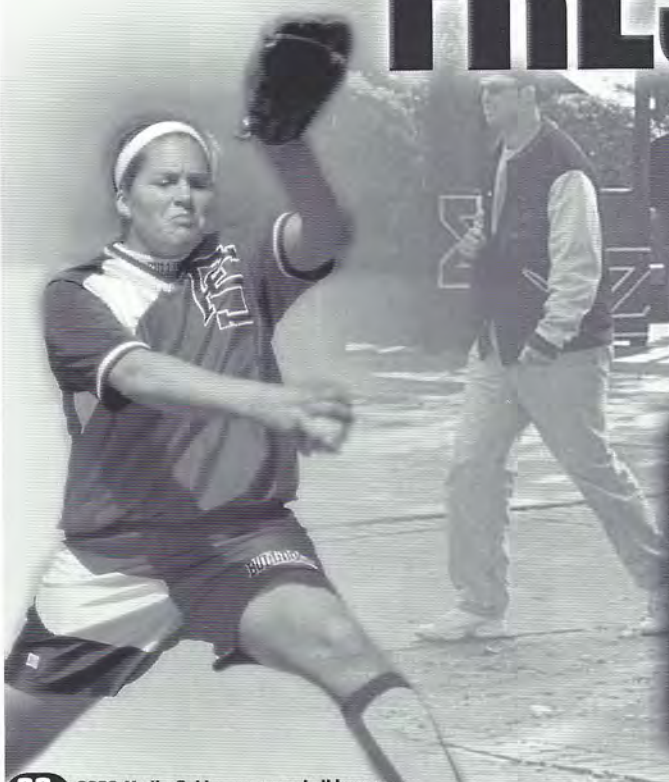
The 327-acre main campus features more than 46 traditional and modern buildings. An additional 34 structures are on the 1,083 acre University Farm, which is considered one of the most modern and best-equipped agricultural facilities in the West.

Outstanding research facilities (computer, engineering, electronics, and industrial technology laboratories) are complemented by cultural and recreational facilities. The campus has two student unions, indoor and outdoor theaters for drama and music, and swimming facilities. Fresno State boasts some of the nation's best athletic facilities — all paid for by private and corporate donors. The latest addition is the \$103 million Save Mart Center, slated for completion in 2003. The university also features a 41,031-seat football stadium with 22 skysuites, the nation's finest softball and baseball parks, and a premier tennis facility.

University Courtyard: On-campus living community

Nearly 1,000 students each semester choose to make the move into University Courtyard, the on-campus living facilities at Fresno State. \$12.2 million was spent in 1995 to renovate the University Courtyard.

One of the key advantages of living in University Courtyard is that all services are included to students for one affordable price. From necessities like meals and utilities, to luxuries like basic cable TV and access to internet/e-mail, students find very few needs unmet. Students have access to a computer lab, fitness center, 24-hour customer service desk, priority employment opportunities, recreation centers and priority registration for classes.



Fresno State Athletics Academic Services

The Athletics Academic Services Program offers assistance to student-athletes in successfully managing academics responsibilities and completing their baccalaureate degrees while maintaining eligibility.

Who We Are

The Athletics Academic Services staff includes a director, assistant director, professional academics advisors, an office manager, clerical support personnel, tutors in a variety of subject areas, and graduate interns. Each staff member is trained to deal with the special needs of student-athletes. Administrative staff and academics advisors help student-athletes meet Fresno State academics requirements as well as eligibility rules of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and the Western Athletic Conference (WAC).

Who We Serve

All prospective, current and former student-athletes are eligible for services. There are approximately 550 student-athletes currently participating in varsity sports programs. Each of these student-athletes is assigned an academic advisor who works with that individual throughout his or her collegiate career.

Smittcamp Honors College

The Smittcamp Honors College welcomed its first class of 50 freshmen in the Fall of 1999, with one student-athlete among them. When the Fall 2001 class arrives, there will be five student-athletes among the 45 selected.

Honors College students are selected because they have demonstrated superior academics, co-curricular and community service achievements during high school. They will be included in special faculty mentoring programs, honors level courses and a variety of university and community volunteer programs throughout their Fresno State careers and receive significant scholarship aid.

New Student Admission and Orientation

The staff provides pertinent information to recruits and other potential athletes. New student-athletes are assisted through admissions, orientation, evaluation, and program planning on both academic and athletic eligibility requirements.

Academic Assistance

Provide academic advising for declared and undeclared majors ... Monitor class selection, course load, attendance, and progress ... Provide study hall, tutorial assistance, and computer access and support... Teach classes on academic success strategies for new student-athletes ... Offer individual counseling and referral services for student-athletes with learning disabilities, study skill deficits, career uncertainties and personal concerns ... Encourage involvement in community activities such as Red Ribbon Week, Library Week, and the Little Heroes Program with Valley Children's Hospital.

Life Skills Development

The CHAMPS program is designed to help student-athletes learn life management principles, develop lifelong learning and leadership skills and continue a pattern of personal and interpersonal growth. Throughout their attendance at Fresno State, student-athletes are provided services which help them identify and achieve their educational, career, personal and athletic goals. Included in the CHAMPS program is a three-unit class, University 1, taught by athletic academic advisors for freshmen student-athletes. The class provides an orientation to campus resources (e.g., library tour, email accounts, general student services) and teaches effective study skills in a number of areas including time management, note taking, reading comprehension, memory skills and test taking. Life skills development topics include nutrition, sports and drugs, career exploration and goal setting.

Academic Enrichment Program (ACE)

The ACE Program is designed to meet the special academic needs of partial qualifiers, non-qualifiers and other academically at-risk student-athletes.

Summer/Winter School Assistance

Athletic Academic Services administers the winter and summer session scholarship program, which provides 223 student-athletes the opportunity to take additional courses toward graduation.

Post-Eligibility Programs

Athletic Academic Services also administers the Fifth Year Scholarship program to assist student-athletes who have completed their athletic eligibility to reach their graduation goal. Scholarship awards are given to those who have been on athletic aid, are in good academic standing and are within 36 units of completing their degrees. Numerous postgraduate scholarships are also available; these scholarship opportunities are included in the Student-Athlete Handbook provided to each student-athlete.

Kiwanis Torch of Excellence

A total of 257 student-athletes were recognized in May of 2001 for achieving a 3.0 grade point average or better during the spring and fall 2000 semesters at the department's annual Kiwanis Torch of Excellence Awards Banquet, hosted by the 16 Kiwanis Clubs of Fresno and Madera Counties. The total reflected 49 percent of Fresno State's student-athlete population and approximately 25 percent were honored for their inclusion on the Dean's List (3.5 GPA or better) as well. Last year, over 500 members of the Fresno community attended the banquet, including leaders in the Fresno business, service and athletics communities.

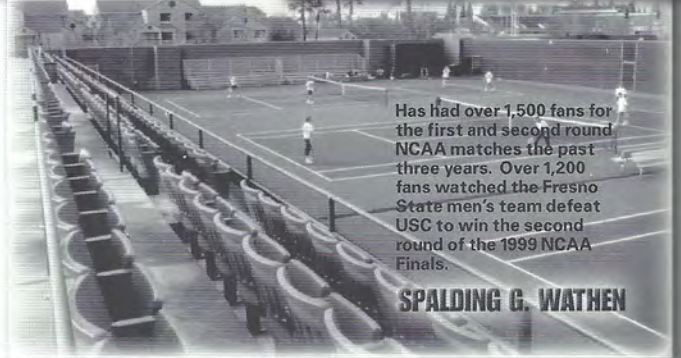

DR. JOHN D. WELTY University President

Dr. John D. Welty has been president of California State University, Fresno since July 29, 1991. He is also a professor in the School of Education & Human Development.

Fresno State enrolls more than 19,000 students and offers 57 undergraduate degrees and 40 master degree programs in addition to a joint doctorate in Educational Leadership with the University of California. The campus is located on 1,400 acres and academic programs are housed in eight colleges and schools.

During this period the university has completed a major planning effort; expanded minority enrollment; created an Honors College; revised its general education requirements; added new academic programs; institutes and facilities; introduced service learning into the curriculum and expanded community service opportunities for students; initiated faculty development efforts; improved

services for students; streamlined administrative processes; launched a major commitment to expand the use of information technology; overseen a major campus building effort which includes new buildings for Engineering; Music; Education and Science, as well as the Downing Planetarium, the Smittcamp Alumni House and the \$110 million publicly-financed Save Mart Center; established the Central California Futures Institute; entered the Western Athletic Conference; expanded intercollegiate Athletic opportunities for women; and dramatically increased private fund raising and grant and contract funding.

The university endowment has grown to more than \$60 million.

The university also has been actively involved in addressing issues in the Central California Valley.

Dr. Welty is recognized nationally as a leader in planning for the future, teacher education reform, information technology planning, substance abuse prevention, service learning and collective bargaining. He served on the Cornerstones Group, which created the CSU's strategic plan, and he has served on several advisory groups to the U.S. Departments of Education and Agriculture. He has been involved

extensively in teacher preparation reform.

He has chaired the Renaissance Group, which is a national organization of 30 universities dedicated to improved teacher education programs. He co-chaired the CSU Advisory Committee, which created CALState Teach, an innovative program designed for emergency credentialed teachers. In addition, he chaired the CSU Committee on Alcohol Policies and Programs and he has chaired three national conferences on substance abuse and prevention. He has been a leader in promoting service learning and volunteer service for students. Gov. Gray Davis appointed Dr. Welty as a commissioner for the Governor's Office on Service and Volunteerism (GOSERV).

Dr. Welty was elected to a three-year term as WASC Commissioner in 2000. He serves as vice-chair of BACCHUS-GAMMA Peer Education Network and as a board chair for American Humanics, Inc.

Locally, Dr. Welty has been a leader in establishing the Fresno Business Council, the Central Valley

Incubator, The Central Valley Higher Education Consortium and several other partnerships.

Previously, Dr. Welty served as president of Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) for seven years. Prior to assuming the

presidency of IUP, he served as vice president for student and university affairs for four years.

A native of Amboy, Illinois, Dr. Welty has served as an admissions counselor at Michigan State University, East Lansing and as assistant vice president for student affairs at Southwest State University in Marshall, Minnesota. At the State University of New York, Albany, he was director of residences, associate dean for student affairs and assistant professor of counseling and student development.

Dr. Welty received his bachelor's degree in Social Science from Western Illinois University, Macomb in 1965; his master's in College Student Personnel Services from Michigan State University in 1967; and his doctorate in Administration of Higher Education from Indiana University, Bloomington, in 1974.

Dr. Welty has co-authored a book titled *Alcohol and Other Drugs: A Guide for College Presidents and Governing Boards*; written a chapter in the recent book titled *Realizing the Educational Potential of Residence Halls* and is the author of numerous articles and papers on university students, student affairs programs, and the future of higher education.

In 2001, the California State University Student Association presented him with the President of the Year Award.

In 1999, Dr. Welty was presented the Chief Executive Leadership Award by the Council for Advancement and Support for Education and was recognized by the John Templeton Foundation for his leadership in Student Character Development in Schools and Colleges. He has also consulted with many institutions and served on the boards of several campus and community organizations.

Dr. Welty and his wife, Dr. Sharon Brown-Welty, have five children.





SCOTT JOHNSON

Athletics Director

In his 21st year as an administrator who has made significant contributions to the Fresno State Athletics Department, Scott Johnson became the 10th Director of Athletics on Jan. 7, 2002.

Johnson was named to the position by University President Dr. John D. Welty after serving as interim athletics director since July of 2001. He took the place of Dr. Allen Bohl, who resigned his post in the summer of 2001 to accept athletics director duties at the University of Kansas.

"I am very pleased to name Scott Johnson as the new athletics director," said Welty. "Scott earned this job by clearly being our top candidate in an outstanding field of individuals, and because of his many years of creative and committed service to Fresno State. Scott exemplifies what it means to be a Bulldog. He has advanced this university to a new level of recognition and achievement and I'm counting on him to build on that excellent tradition."

Having served as an associate athletics director for the past six years (1995-01) and assistant athletics director for four years (1991-95), Johnson arrived at Fresno State on August 5, 1981. He became the athletics department's media relations director and oversaw the promotion and coverage

of 18 Division I-A sports for 11 years.

As the director at Fresno State, Johnson worked NCAA basketball regional tournaments, been a media director for baseball in NCAA regional and conference tournaments, and coordinated publicity crusades for national caliber student-athletes, including Heisman Trophy campaigns for Kevin Sweeney and Trent Dilfer.

His experience in media relations led him to Fresno State after being an assistant sports information director at Oregon State for five years. At OSU, he was the media contact for men's basketball, baseball and wrestling. Winning national awards for his media guides in baseball, wrestling and track and field while with the Beavers, Johnson also served as the publicity director for the Oregon Community College Athletic Association for three years.

Prior to joining the athletics department staff at Oregon State, Johnson was the sports information director at Clackamas Community College in Oregon City for four years. A former student-athlete in basketball and baseball at Clackamas, he was honored with a national junior college award for his 1975 football media guide. For his success, Johnson was inducted into the Northwest Athletic Association of Community College's Athletic Hall of Fame on June 3, 1993.

His background in media relations has allowed Johnson to wear several hats in his tenure at Fresno State.

Currently serving as the department's liaison for the Save Mart Center project and overseeing the \$10 million personal seat license fund-raising campaign, Johnson was instrumental in the planning and development of the \$103 million project which broke ground May 8, 2001. In conjunction with project coordinator Debbie Adishian-Astone, Johnson proved invaluable in the university's contract negotiations with Pepsi and Save Mart that resulted in an initial \$40 million donation to the project.

Looking to create revenue for the athletics department, Johnson developed the Bulldog Authentic Apparel merchandise entity and has attained financial success for The Bulldog Shop. Still further, Johnson has been responsible for football scheduling and has developed the most aggressive non-conference schedules in school history with the likes of UCLA, Wisconsin, Washington, Ohio State, Oregon, Oregon State, Texas Tech and Oklahoma State.

Overseeing radio and television contracts since 1991, his radio and television background was vital in the recent



development of the WAC-ESPN television package. Fresno State will get a minimum of four football games on ESPN in 2001 with the potential for a school-record six nationally televised games. Johnson's responsibility in radio and television also included the birth of one of the most comprehensive media packages for women's sports in the Western Athletic Conference.

Johnson has been in the role as a sport supervisor for football, men's basketball and baseball as well as

overseeing the areas of marketing, media relations and athletics training. He has seen his sports enjoy postseason success, including two football bowl appearances and two trips to the NCAA Tournament in basketball the past two years as well consecutive NCAA Regional appearances by the baseball team.

With 25 years of experience on the Division I level that has spanned the areas of public relations, media relations, radio and television, fund-raising and special projects, Johnson is a 1972 graduate from the University of Oregon with a degree in journalism. He received his master's degree in sports administration from Fresno State in 2000.

Johnson, who was born in Weiser, Idaho, on July 2, 1950, and his wife Karen, who is Fresno State's Director of Housing and holds a master's degree in athletic administration from Ohio University, have two sons in Troy and Austin and a daughter, Alexis.

Diane Milutinovich Associate A.D./ Senior Woman Administrator

Diane Milutinovich, the athletics department's senior

woman administrator, is in her 21st year as an administrator and 12th year as an associate athletics director at Fresno State. Her primary responsibilities are to supervise the volleyball, men's soccer, women's soccer, women's basketball, wrestling, softball, swimming and golf programs. She also oversees the strength and conditioning area and is the Senior Women's Administrator.

A member of the Western Athletic Conference Council, Milutinovich has served as the chair of the WAC Senior Women's Administrator Committee and is currently a member of the Executive Committee.

At Fresno State, she has served as tournament director for over 30 NCAA postseason events, including 16 men's soccer matches, one soccer match, 17 softball regionals and one volleyball match.

She also initiated Fresno State's celebration of National Girls and Women in Sports Day; served as coordinator for "Kids Day," which benefits Valley Children's Hospital (VCH); and has served as a staff liaison for the Little Heroes Program, which matches Fresno State's student-athletes with VCH patients. She has been honored as one of the Central Valley's Top 10 Business/Professional Women of the Year.

Milutinovich was one of the first two women appointed to the Fresno Athletic Hall of Fame Board of Directors and one of the first three women invited to join the Rotary Club of Fresno. In 1999 she was honored with the Promises to Keep Award by the National Women's Political Caucus of Fresno County. The award was given in recognition of her work in promoting equality for women.

She is a member NACDA and the NACWAA. She has also served as a member of the NCAA Softball Committee, the NCAA Women's Committee on Committees, the NCAA Softball Rules Committee and is a former NCAA Softball Committee Division I chair. She has also served on numerous WAC, Big West, PCAA, NorPac and NorCal committees.

Milutinovich was honored with an NCAA Tenth-Year Anniversary vase for contributions to softball and to women's sports at the 1991 Division I softball College World Series banquet. She was named a "Woman of Distinction for 1993" by the Golden Valley Girl Scout Council. A 1966 graduate of Fresno High School, Milutinovich received a bachelor's degree (1970) and standard secondary teaching credential (1971) from Fresno State.



Deena Diboll Assistant A.D./ Marketing

Deena Diboll is in her 19th year as an athletics administrator at Fresno State. As assistant athletics director for marketing, Diboll has supervised the development, coordination and implementa-

tion of multi-media marketing and promotional programs for Bulldog athletics, the Bulldog merchandise licensing program and group ticket sales. In addition to her administrative responsibilities, Diboll handles corporate partnership sales, multi-year sky suite leasing and special project funding. She was the

director of marketing and development for the \$11 million football stadium expansion project in 1991, including some of the nation's first luxury suites in a collegiate football stadium.

In August 1998, Diboll was assigned to the University's new 18,000-seat, multi-purpose Event Center project on an interim basis by President Welty to assist with marketing planning and development for the project as well as luxury suite and personal seat license campaign strategies. Diboll completed her 18-month appointment in March 2000, returning to the athletic marketing helm with increased focus on corporate partner program expansion and new project development and implementation. She continues to assist with various parts of the Save Mart Center project.

Diboll served on the initial slate of officers of the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators (NACMA), serving an instrumental role in the organization's inception, growth and development. She has chaired the organization's national convention and served as its president. She was honored at the 2000 convention with NACMA's national award for Outstanding Achievement honoring her career service to the development of collegiate athletic marketing. Diboll has had numerous articles published on collegiate athletics marketing and has participated extensively in discussion panels and forums on the subject.

Bob Knudsen Assistant A.D./ Academics

Dr. Bob Knudsen, who first came to Fresno State in 1964, has been in charge of the athletics department's Academic Services Office since its inception in 1983.

As assistant athletics director for academics, Knudsen provides overall direction and leadership to the Athletics Academic Services Office and the Student Athlete Assistance Program. He also provides academic and personal counseling to student-athletes and is coordinating the Student Athlete Assistance Program.

He also oversees the sports programs of men's and women's track, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's tennis, and equestrian.

A member of the Academic Senate, Knudsen has also served the university as Activities Advisor, Assistant Dean of Students, Director of the International Student Programs, and Director of the Student Counseling Center.



Les Snyder, Jr. Assistant A.D./ Business

Les Snyder, Jr. joined the athletics staff in March of 1980 and is in his 22th year in an administrative role. Snyder came to Fresno State after serving eight years as controller/business manager in

the private sector. He has served as the general manager of the Athletics Corporation since its incorporation in 1982.

As assistant athletics director for business/finance, Snyder supervises the business office operations, athletics computer operations, athletics ticket operations and three active equipment rooms. He has successfully directed the now third decade of facility seat option sales and this year coordinated the Save Mart Center Personal Seat License Campaign.

Snyder also supervised the men's and women's track, cross country and tennis teams for a number of years and was instrumental in the successful implementation of the women's equestrian program.

Snyder is also directly responsible for facilities management, facilities scheduling, event management and special projects.



Steve Weakland Assistant A.D./ Media Relations

The newest member of the Fresno State athletics family,

Steve Weakland became the assistant athletics director for media relations in September 1999.

Having served as the sports information director at the University of Alaska Anchorage, Weakland oversaw the daily operations of that office and will serve in the same role at Fresno State. Weakland has served as the media coordinator for the Carrs Great Alaska Shootout, considered the premier holiday college basketball tournament in the nation.

He had produced many nationally award-winning publications, including several rated as "best in the nation," was the media coordinator for the 1999 NCAA Hockey Frozen Four and served on the NCAA Hockey Championship Tournament Executive Committee.

A graduate from the University of Wyoming, Weakland was an assistant in Wyoming's sports information office for six years while working with the nationally ranked Cowboy football program.

Support Services

Athletic Medicine

Fresno State's athletic training staff consists of seven full-time certified athletic trainers, 40 student trainers and a staff of seven doctors, all working to provide the best available medical treatment to more than 600 student-athletes.

Fresno State Sports Medicine, located in the North Gym and in the Duncan Building, is kept up to date on the most modern sports medicine advances. Under the direction of Paul Schechter, he and his staff of six certified athletic trainers provide year-round coverage.

Each training room is equipped with a running pool and whirlpool, electrical modalities, cardiovascular equipment, rehabilitation equipment and therapy modalities, which allows for all rehabilitation and treatment to take place on campus. Nutrition counseling and drug testing are also responsibilities of the athletic training staff.

Fresno State's athletic training program is dedicated to the prevention, treatment and rehabilitation of injuries sustained by Bulldog varsity student-athletes. The Fresno State Athletic Training staff is contemporary in their methods and constantly seeks continuing education in an effort to remain on the cutting edge.

Academic Support

At Fresno State the university strives to make sure that student and athlete are receiving equal attention. Fresno State student-athletes are urged to strive to be consistently successful in the classroom as well as to persevere to be the best in the arena of sport.

Excellence in academic and athletics is a special achievement. With nearly 30 GTE Academic All-Americans and nine NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners, Fresno State continues to be highly successful academically on the national, regional and conference level.

Establishing and developing an outstanding support program, the academic support services are located in the North Gym. It includes study spaces, a tutorial area and a computer lab outfitted with six computers and laser printers. There are also diagnostic and referral services for learning challenges and disabilities. Under the direction of Dr. Bob Knudsen, he and his staff of five full-time assistants and 16 tutors give support to all Fresno State student-athletes.

With an orientation program set up specifically for new students, the transition into college is approached with

support in all phases of academic development. Student success is encouraged through academic counseling, career exploration, planning and placement, tutorial programs and mentors. With coaches routinely informed on the progress of each student-athlete, Fresno State's academic services are strongly committed to promoting excellence in academic achievement. Culminating with a degree in hand, Bulldog student-athletes are given all the tools necessary to pursue a professional goal.



Cleo Bauer Assistant Director of Athletics Academic Services

Cleo Bauer is in her eighth year as an assistant director in the Fresno State athletic academic services department. Responsible for advising volleyball, softball, soccer, wrestling, track and field and cross country, Bauer

works with student-athletes from the time they are recruits until they graduate.

Assisting in course and major selection as well as assuring compliance with NCAA eligibility standards, Bauer also serves as the department liaison to the Student Athlete Advisory Board that addresses student-athletes concerns to involvement in community service projects. Also, she is responsible for student-athletes that attend summer school and winter sessions. In addition, she manages the fifth year scholarship program, which provides support for student-athletes completing their final semesters after finishing athletic eligibility.

Having worked closely throughout the years with the Kiwanis Clubs of Fresno and Madera Counties (District 5) and thus spearheading the Kiwanis Torch of Excellence dinner, Bauer had worked for several years at California State University, Chico as the Director of Student Development. Having served as the testing coordinator at Fresno State and as the Dean of Development at San Joaquin College of Law, Bauer has been the University Union Director at Fresno State and Director of the Student Union at Cornell University.

Strength & Conditioning

From customizing programs for teams to monitoring student-athletes in sport specific training to designing and implementing conditioning and strengthening regimens, Fresno State's strength and conditioning is there to make sure every step is taken to provide student-athletes with the finest in facilities and guidance.

Opening in the summer of 1996, the Strength and Conditioning Center is one of the newest and largest weight complexes on the West Coast. The 10,000-foot weight room facility houses a host of free weights as well as a variety of modern fitness equipment.

The spacious room is equipped with some 25,000 pounds of Olympic weights, 40 Olympic bars, eight Olympic benches, four incline benches, two military benches, four glute/hamstring and reverse hyperextension machines, eight Olympic power racks and 50 pairs of dumbbells.

With a long list of Bulldog athletes having been voted as a NCSA All-American, the strength and conditioning program at Fresno State is ergonomically designed for the greatest efficiency and safety.



Ed Nordenschild Strength & Conditioning Head Coach

Ed Nordenschild returns for his third year as Fresno State's head strength and conditioning coach. His responsibilities include overseeing the weight room, its personnel and the strength and conditioning programs of Fresno State's Olympic sports.

Nordenschild came to Fresno State from the University of Texas, where he was the assistant strength and conditioning coach. While there, he was responsible for the Longhorns softball, swimming, track and rowing programs. In softball, he helped build the UT program from its inception in 1995 to a Women's College World Series appearance in 1998. He also was successful in working with the track and field program, helping them to indoor and outdoor NCAA titles in 1998. He graduated from the University of Texas-Arlington in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies. He later earned a master's degree in exercise physiology from the University of Texas in 1995. A member of the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) and the American College of Sports Medicine, Nordenschild is certified with the NSCA and the United States Weightlifting Federation.

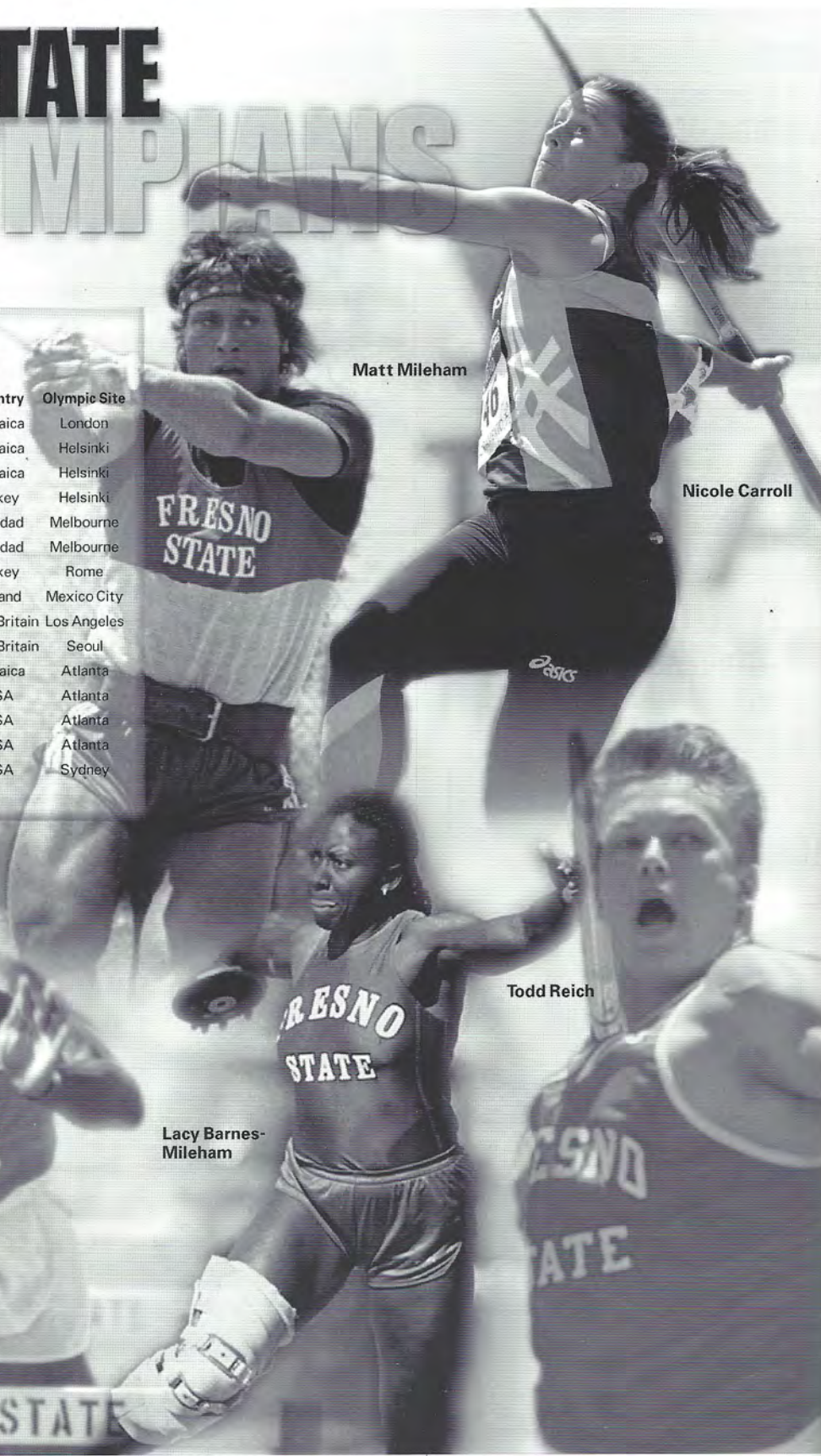
