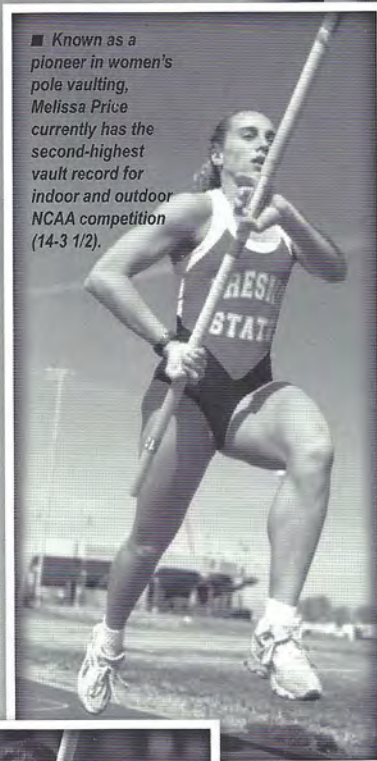
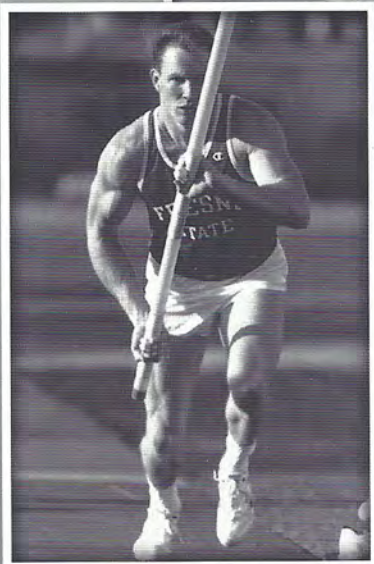


# Fresno State's POLE VAULT TRADITION

Fresno State has established a rich tradition in the pole vault that spans five and a half decades. It all began more than 60 years ago in 1940 when Fresno State College pole vaulter Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam shocked the track world by clearing 15 feet with a bamboo pole surpassing the then pole vaulting world record of 14-11 set in 1937. Warmerdam continued to dominate the event clearing 15 feet 43 times before any other vaulter could clear the height once. Warmerdam's outdoor best of 15-7 3/4 stood as the world record for 15 years before Bob Gutowski broke it with an aluminum pole in 1957. Warmerdam set the Bulldog standard in 1940 and twenty years later Erkki Mustakari was keeping it alive becoming the first Bulldog in Fresno State history to clear 17 feet. Doug Fraley, a Fresno State product of the 80's, continued the pole vaulting tradition becoming a three-time NCAA champion. Now, women's pole vaulting is emerging as yet another dominating branch of the already distinguished program with Melissa Price winning the 1999 NCAA championship title. In all the excellence, 17 Fresno State vaulters have soared 17 feet or better, with four of those having broken 18 feet. The Bulldog vaulting corps was never better than in 1986 when it featured Fraley, Mark Heppner and Kelly Rodrigues. Heppner and Fraley both finished second and third, respectively, at the NCAA Championships while the trio captured the top three spots at the PCAA Championships. The 1-2-3 conference sweep was mirrored in 1990 with Todd Sprague, Jim Drath and Jeff Coppock, and again in 1992 with Jim Drath, Derek Oliver and David Cox winning the top three pole vault spots at the Big West Championships.

In 2000, former Bulldog Jim Davis set a new school and WAC record by clearing 19-0 1/4 for first place at the WAC Outdoor Championships in El Paso, Texas, May 17-20. He was also named the meet's Outstanding Performer, in addition to his three individual championships at the outdoor meets and one indoor meet. In 2001-02, Mark Unzueta cleared 16-6 1/4 twice to claim both the WAC Indoor and Outdoor Championship crowns. Last season, Russell Weaver captured his third straight outdoor conference pole vault crown while Lexine Lesser established a personal-best en route to winning her first career WAC Outdoor title.

# Fresno State's Track & Field RICH IN TRADITION

## A COMMITMENT TO SUCCESS

The Fresno State track and field team boasts a total of 153 all-Americans named throughout the program's history. 18 women have earned all-America status for outdoor competition and 12 for indoor competition. 35 Bulldog men have earned all-America accolades for indoor competition and 88 have been honored for outdoor competition.

Over the past 18 years, the women's track and field team has produced 83 outdoor conference champions and 11 indoor champions, including two-time indoor pole vaulting champion Melissa Price. All 94 titles were earned under Red Estes and Bob Fraley.

Fresno State adopted women's track and field in 1983 and since the program has earned 5 outdoor conference championships and one indoor championship in 1994, including the first WAC Outdoor Championship in 2002.

## LEGENDARY COACHES

Former track and field head coach Red Estes and current Director of Track and Field Bob Fraley have led the Fresno State men's and women's track and field teams to 12 conference championships. The two legendary coaches have guided 252 Fresno State men and women to indoor and outdoor conference champion titles, produced 99 indoor and outdoor all-Americans and have seen several school records fall. Estes was named Big West coach of the Year nine times in a ten year span and Co-WAC Coach of the Year in 1995. In 1992 Estes was awarded with Region 8 Coach of the Year honors and WAC Coach of the Year in 2000. Fraley has also accumulated an abundance of accolades being named Women's coach of the Year after leading the women to their first indoor WAC championship in 1994 and being named Region 8 Indoor Coach of the Year five times.

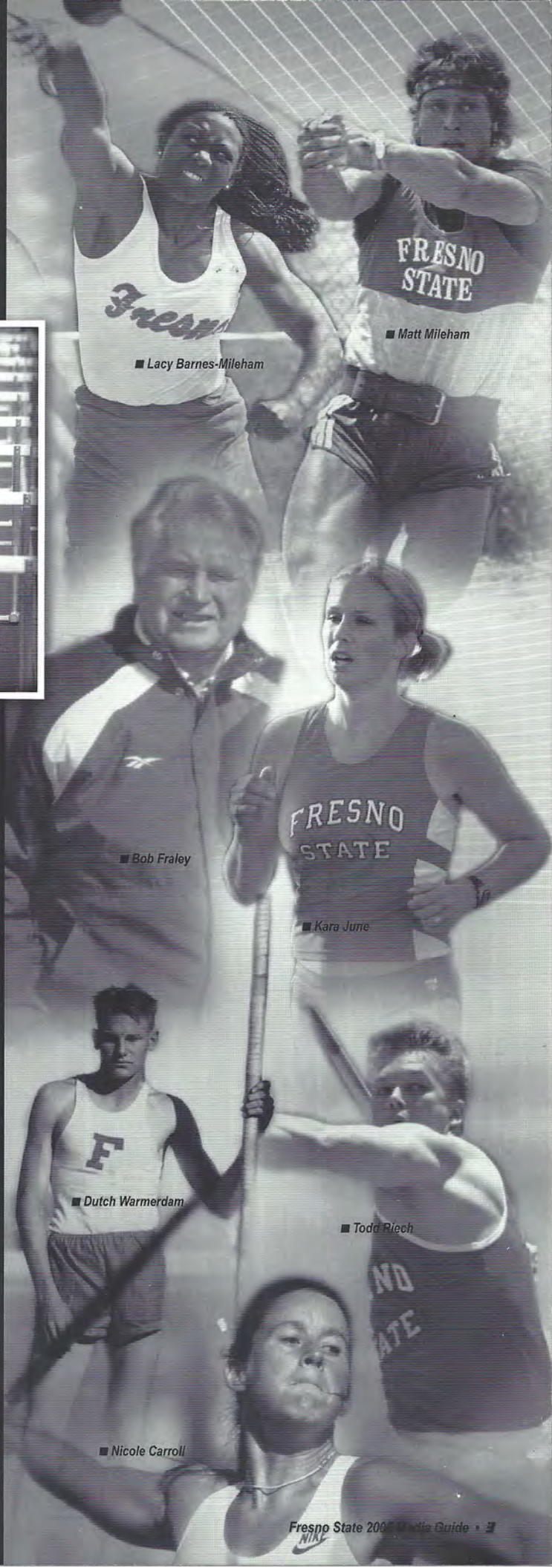
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## OLYMPIC PRESENCE

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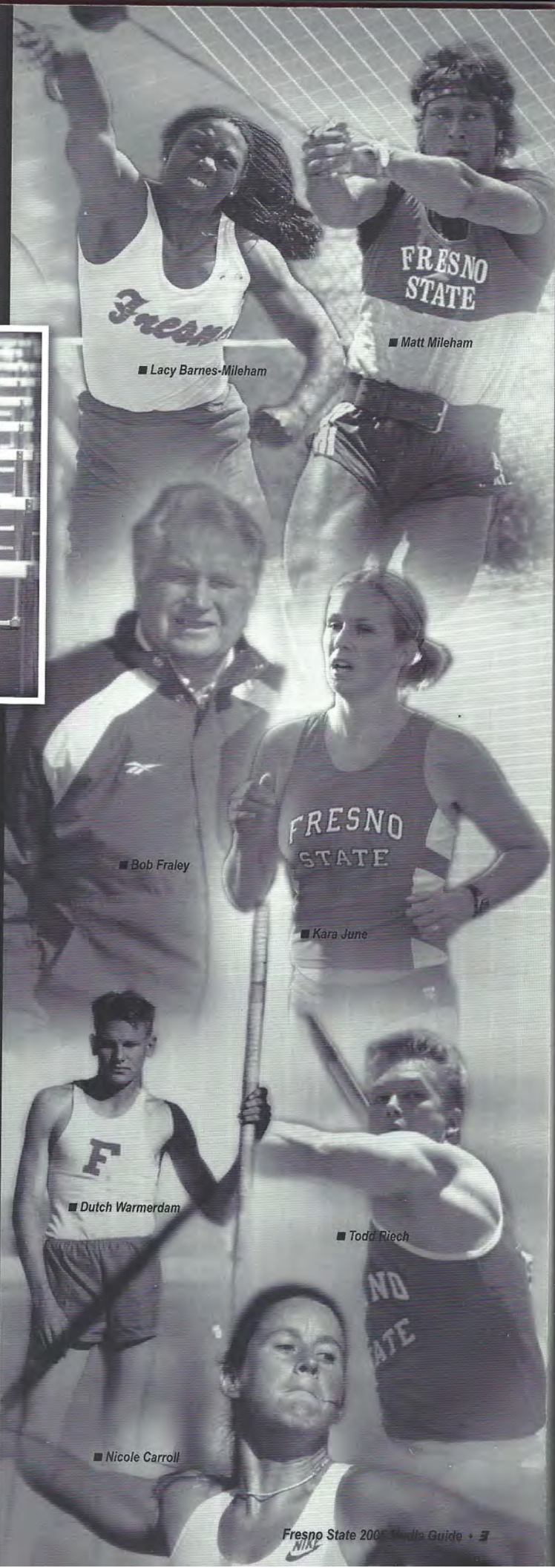
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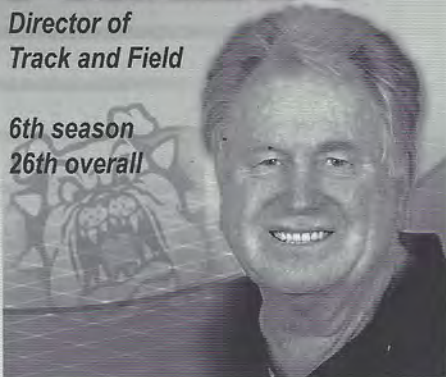


# FRESNO STATE COACHING STAFF

## BOB FRALEY

Director of Track and Field

6th season  
26th overall



Bob Fraley, now in his 26th season and sixth as the Director of Track and Field, is a proven coach at the high school, college and international levels. Over the last 20 years, Fraley has consistently produced highly-competitive squads, as well as many international-caliber athletes. And in 2001, Fraley began a new era of coaching an entire track and field squad as the director of track and field.

Since taking over the reigns, the Fresno State track and field program has established itself as one of the premier squads in the West both in competition and in the classroom. In addition, Fraley's teams have been annually recognized for their community service efforts while claiming the campus philanthropy honor multiple times under his direction.

The 2005 campaign served as a fitting example of how both the men's and women's clubs have excelled under Fraley's guidance. The men's team finished second at the Cal-Nevada Championships and capped a late-season surge with an impressive runner-up finish at the WAC Outdoor Championships. Individually, pole vaulter Russell Weaver won another gold medal at the conference meet and advanced to NCAA Championships while sprinter Chris Berrian's record-setting season included WAC titles in the 100- and 200-meters and his first NCAA Championships appearance.

The women were equally strong, taking first place at the Cal-Nevada Championships while notching third-place finishes at the WAC Indoor and Outdoor Championships. Mallory Webb followed up a freshman All-American campaign with a return visit to NCAA Championships while Katie Christianson won gold in the heptathlon at WAC Outdoor Championships, qualified for NCAA Championships and was named to the Academic All-District VII team.

One year earlier, Fraley's coaching accomplishments were highlighted nationally when he was named USA Track & Field's 2003 Nike Coach of the Year in December 2003 at the organization's annual meeting in Greensboro, North Carolina.

"I feel very honored and thankful to be selected, but I'm more shocked than anything," Fraley said at the time.

"USA Track & Field has always been supportive of my activities to try to improve the sport and they've given me a platform to do a lot of things."

That would be the first of two accolades for the Bulldog's legendary skipper, who later was awarded the 2003 United States Olympic Committee's Developmental Coach of the Year honor on May 2, 2004 at the organization's recognition dinner at the Cheyenne Mountain Resort in Colorado Springs.

Said Fraley when asked about the prestigious honor: "To be included among that group of coaches at the banquet was just an incredible feeling. I am extremely proud that the Olympic Committee would select me for this award."

Fraley played a pivotal role in rejuvenating the pole vault in the United States when in 1989 he created the Pole Vault Summit, now held in Reno, Nevada. Featuring competitions and an exchange of knowledge about pole vaulting, the event attracts more than 2,000 male and female athletes, from teenagers to Olympic gold medalists.

As a result of his contributions, Fraley was recently inducted into the Pole Vault Hall of Fame. Credited nationwide with spearheading the development of the pole vault, Fraley joined Dave Roberts (former world-record holder) and Mike Tulley (silver medalist at 1984 Olympic Games) as Hall of Fame inductees during a Jan. 26



banquet ceremony at the 2006 Pole Vault Summit.

His work has reaped dividends: in the last three years alone, Team USA men's pole vaulters have won the gold and silver medals at both the 2000 Olympic Games and 2001 IAAF World Indoor Championships, as well as the bronze medal at the 2001 World Outdoor Championships.

In 2003, his contributions reached a new level when he donated his salary to the school's track program in order to prevent it from being cut due to budgetary reasons.

Fraley has guided athletes to 41 All-American honors, and three NCAA titles by his son, Doug, in the pole vault. Athletes have achieved heights and distances competitive with the finest in the country, and the world, under his direction. He guided the men's and women's teams to third- and second-place finishes, respectively, in Fresno State's first indoor conference meet at the WAC Championships in 1993. In his first season as director, Fraley guided his squads to a perfect 8-0 record, with the men's and women's squads each winning three multi-team-meets.

Fraley, a 1960 graduate of Fresno State, has been named the Region 8 Head Indoor Coach of the Year five times and is the President of Division I Track Coaches, as well as the chairman of pole vault development in the United States. He has a great deal of experience on the national level. The Athletics Congress appointed him to be an assistant coach on the U.S. Junior National team in 1986. He also coached the top U.S. juniors at the Pan American Junior Games in a dual meet with Romania,

and at the Inaugural World Junior Games in Athens, Greece, that year.

Fraley earned his first coaching accolade as director of track and field when he was named WAC Women's Coach of the Year after guiding the 2002 squad to its first WAC Outdoor Championship crown in school history.

The 1994 season was especially successful for Fraley and his athletes, as he assisted in leading the Fresno State women to their first indoor WAC championship and was named the men's Outdoor Coach of the Year for his part in guiding the Bulldogs to their first outdoor WAC title. The Bulldogs finished second in both indoors and outdoors in 1996.

With all of the success Fraley has had indoors, his greatest contribution has come coaching the highly successful Fresno State pole vault, jump and sprint corps. Fraley has produced some of the finest athletes in the conference and the nation in his specialties.

In the pole vault, Doug Fraley skied 18-11 and 13 other Fraley-coached vaulters have gone 17 feet plus, including David Cox's 18-6 1/2 effort in 1996. He has coached two 26-foot long jumpers and seven triple jumpers who have posted bests of 52-feet-or-better, including U.S. Junior National champion and four-time All-American Reggie Jackson, who soared a career-best 54-9 3/4. Cox earned his sixth All-America honor under Fraley during the outdoor 1996 season, as he placed second at the NCAA meet at 18-2. More recently, Fraley guided former Bulldog standout and All-American Jim Davis to an out-

standing 19-0 1/4 in 2000. The vault was record-breaking as it stands as the WAC Championship record.

The women under his tutelage have also done well. Over the past 17 years, the women's team has produced 83 outdoor conference champions and 11 indoor champions including 1999's two-time indoor pole vaulting champion Melissa Price. Tamara Compton leaped to personal bests of 20-3 (long jump) and 41-1 (triple jump) under Fraley's direction.

In the last two years alone, Fraley has helped guide eight different pole vaulters to NCAA Regional appearances, three of whom have qualified for NCAA Championships twice.

Before joining the Fresno State staff, Fraley won 13 league track titles in 15 seasons at Lemoore (Calif.) High School, losing only two dual meets during that time.

A 1956 graduate of Laton High School, Fraley competed in football, basketball and track. Fraley was born on Nov. 30, 1937, and he and his wife, Elaine, have three children: Tammi, Jill and Doug.

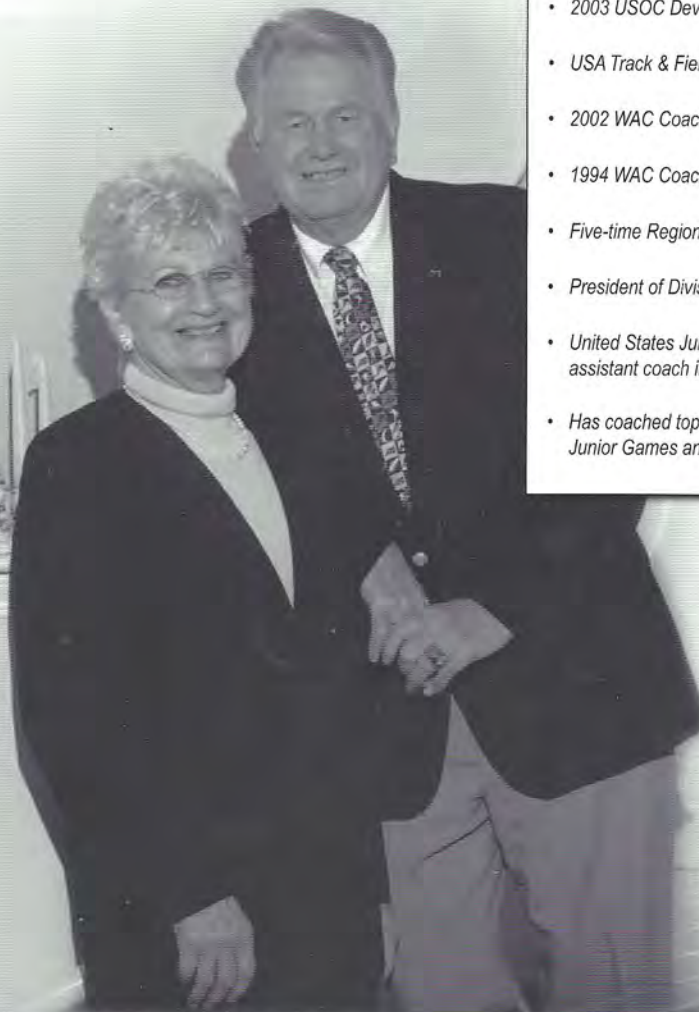

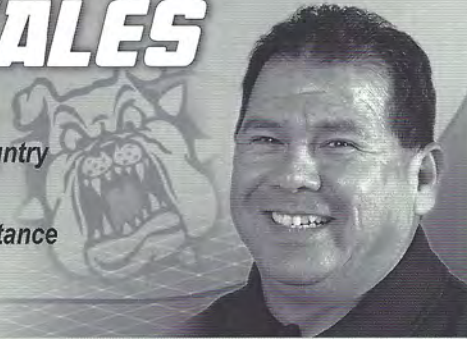




# JOE GONZALES

Joe Gonzales returns for his sixth year as an assistant coach on the track and field staff and handles the men's distance events and 400-intermediate hurdles.

In addition, Gonzales in in his first season as the head coach of the women's cross country team.

Gonzales has been instrumental in the development of Ryan Moore, who enters the 2006 campaign as the favorite to capture gold at the conference meet and once again advance to NCAA Regionals. Moore, who has now appeared in the postseason in each of his first two seasons, qualified for NCAA Regionals last year in the 400-meter hurdles and as a member of the 4x400-meter relay squad. While he would eventually scratch from the competition due to injury, he claimed the title at the conference meet. In addition, he started the outdoor season off with a bang, establishing a personal-best at the Brutus Hamilton Invitational, clocking in at 51.30.

Several of his athletes were consistently ranked among the top distance runners in the conference in 2003, including Alex Mason, who was awarded an NCAA Regional berth in the 800-meter run. Other notable athletes who performed well under Gonzales' direction in 2003 were Phil Ogilvie (personal and team bests in the 1,500 and 3,000-meter races) and Ian Mason (team-high marks in the 5,000 and 10,000-meter races as a rookie).

Prior to entering his coaching career at Fresno State, Gonzales served as a coach at Exeter Union High School in Exeter, Calif.

Gonzales began his coaching career at Exeter, where he started as a volunteer assistant for the cross country team in 1990. In 1995, he became the head cross country coach for both boys and girls. Gonzales then served as the head track and field coach at Exeter from 1998-2000.

In his 10 years at Exeter, Gonzales led the girls' cross country team to five league championships, and one section championship. He guided the boys' cross country team to two league titles and the girls' track and field team to two league titles. In addition, both teams were runner-up finishers in section competition, while the boys cross country team captured its first league title.

Gonzales graduated from Exeter Union and went on to College of the Sequoias before graduating from Fresno State with a degree in Liberal Studies.

Chris Baptista enters his first year as an assistant coach with the Bulldog track and field program.

He will work with the men's and women's sprint, jumps crew in addition to the men's and women's hurdles.

Baptista comes to Fresno State after serving the previous three seasons as an assistant coach at Tulsa. During his tenure with the Golden Hurricane, Baptista served as the program's recruiting coordinator and worked with sprints/hurdles in addition to jumps and multi-events.

Over the past seven years Baptista has been a part of six conference championship teams, has produced two NCAA Division I All-Americans, two Olympic Trials

qualifiers, 27 individual conference champions and 64 all-conference performers in the areas of sprints, jumps and hurdles.

Baptista made an immediate impact at Tulsa, coaching the school's first female sprint All-American, five individual WAC champions and 18 NCAA Regional qualifiers- all in his first three seasons.

Prior to arriving at Tulsa, Baptista, originally from Caruthers, Calif., served two years as the head men's and women's track coach at Shasta College and three years as an assistant coach at Troy State. He earned a bachelor's degree in physical education with a minor in health education from UAB in 1997.

Pagel is currently coaching 2004 Olympian Kim Kriner, American record holder in the women's javelin. Just recently, Pagel was named to the coaching staff of the World Indoor Championships.

Pagel obtained her bachelor's degree in physical education with an emphasis in sports medicine from San Diego State in 1985. She later earned an M.A. in athletic administration from Kent State in 1998.

# FRESNO STATE WOMEN'S TEAM



## WOMEN RELY ON VETERAN LEADERS, EMERGING UNDERCLASSMEN

The Fresno State women's track and field squad was impressive last year, registering first place efforts at the Cal-Nevada Championships while notching third-place finishes at the WAC Indoor and Outdoor Championships. However, the Bulldogs will miss the services of Katie Christianson, who in her senior season won gold in the heptathlon at the WAC Outdoor Championships, qualified for NCAA Championships and was named to the Academic

All-District VII team. A blend of veteran performers and up-and-coming newcomers highlight the women's squad, which should again challenge for the conference title at both meets.

### Jumps

The jumps are well-stocked with a variety of strong returnees. In the triple

jump, senior **Regina Ollison**

qualified for NCAA Regionals in her first year with the 'Dogs, tallying a season-high mark of 38-7.75. She registered a career-best 40-10.25 to finish at WAC Championships, leading the Bulldogs in that category. Her season-best leap in the long jump was 16-6, achieved at the Stanislaus Open.

One of the team's most versatile competitors, senior **Winnie Fletcher** enters her final season as the club's top candidate in the long jump with a career-best of 19-0.75. She also ran a season-best 12.59 in the 100-meters to take third among the team and participated at WAC Championships.

Sophomores **Lauren Archie** and **Leshay Dorsey** are also back for second seasons. Newcomers expected to contribute as well are transfer **Jamiya White** in the long jump and **Devon Tracy** in the high jump.

### Pole Vault

Even though Fresno State will no longer boast the consistent duo of Lexine Lesser and Annie Malaythong, Fraley remains excited about his team's potential in the pole vault. The coaching staff points to junior **Samantha Modeste** and senior **Stacy Hunt** as this year's top contenders. Hunt had emerged as the squad's top vaulter during the early portion of the indoor season.

Modeste owns the top mark among returnees at 12-0, although her career-best stands at 12-4. Hunt was close behind last year at 10-6, however she is expected to eclipse the mark easily by mid-season.

Fraley states the conference pole vaulting competition has increased greatly and a mark of 12-0 might become a necessity heading into the conference meet.

The coaching staff also raves about freshman **Theresa Wiebe**, the Canadian junior champion who is entering her first collegiate season.

### Sprints/Distance

Sprinters to watch include the following: sophomores **Renee Winston** and **Christina Lopez** and freshman **Reyna White**. While the latter has yet to showcase her talents, Winston and Lopez will do their best to fill the voids left by **Crystal**

**Phillips** and **Katie Christianson**.

Winston ran a 57.53 in the 400-meters at the Fresno Relays, representing the team's top mark in that event. Lopez led the Bulldogs in the 200-meters, notching a season-best time of 24.45 while placing second on the depth chart in

the 100-meters at 12.02.

Senior **Sunny Arada** and junior **Brittney Gilbert** provide additional depth.

Junior **Andrea Buckner**, a cross country standout who also had an outstanding outdoor season in 2005, captured the steeplechase title at the Cal-Nevada Championships and established a personal-best while taking gold at WAC Championships.

### Hurdles

Sophomore **Erica McCoy** returns for her second season and owns the squad's top time in the 400-meter hurdles. At the Fresno Relays, McCoy ran a 1:03.81 to claim high honors.

Henson possesses the top returning time in the 100-meter hurdles, as she clocked in with a

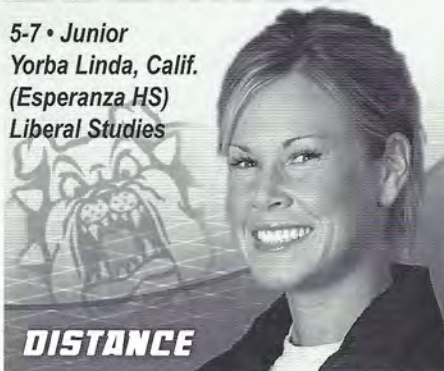

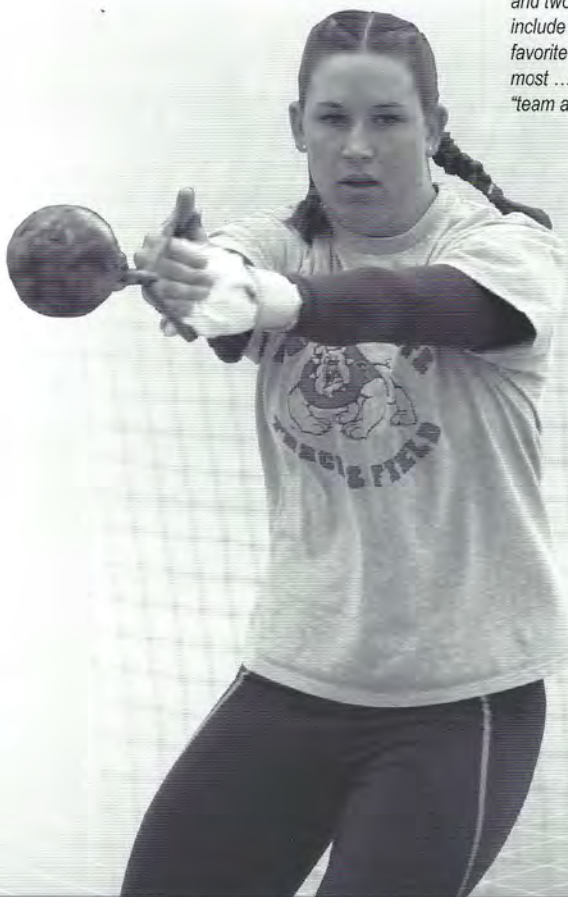

## FRESNO STATE MEN LOOK TO DUPLICATE 2005 SUCCESS

The 2005 campaign served as a fitting example of how the men's track and field squad has established itself as one of the up-and-coming programs in the region. Fresno State finished second at the Cal-Nevada Championships and capped a late-season surge with an impressive runner-up finish at the WAC Outdoor Championships.

With a talented arsenal of returnees and newcomers, this season's

squad should have little trouble improving last year's showing.

### Jumps

Head coach Bob Fraley cites three athletes to keep an eye on among the jumpers. In addition to owning the Bulldog's top mark in the long jump at 23-10.50, senior **Alex Jones** also recorded the third-best time

in the 100-meters at 11.02. Jones

remains a serious threat to contend for a WAC title in the long jump, as he finished fourth overall while scoring five points in the event last year with a leap of 23-0.50.

Joining him are a couple sophomores-**DeAnte Brown** and **Kyle Montgomery**-who both should benefit from last year's experience. Brown nearly missed out on a berth to NCAA Regionals, falling just shy of the qualifying mark in the triple jump. His season-best in the event was 23-10.50, which he achieved at the Cal-Nevada Championships. Montgomery's leap of 47-8.75 in the triple jump placed him second on the depth chart while he also tallied a season-best 22-1.25 in the long jump.

### Pole Vault

Traditionally one of Fresno State's strongest events, the Bulldogs will take a wait-and-see approach in 2006 after losing three-time WAC champion Russell Weaver and NCAA Regional-bound Leif McMurry to graduation.

The best bet to replace those two standouts is senior **Adam Andresen**, who should continue to improve in his final season as a Bulldog. Andresen, who reached NCAA Regionals as a sophomore, recorded his season-best in a meet against CS Northridge, Cal Poly, Sacramento State

and UC Santa Barbara when he reached 15-7. He has gone over the 16-0 mark in his career and was part of a 1-2-3 Bulldog finish at WAC Championships, placing second with a vault of 15-1.

Another option to shine this year is sophomore **Ryan Rupcich**, who should continue to improve his mark with a season under his belt.

### Sprints/Distance

The sprints crew will be spearheaded by senior **Jesse Smith** and sophomore **Kenny Moon**, each of whom have appeared at NCAA Regionals during their careers.

In the case of Smith, there was only one sprinter on the roster with better times last year- WAC champion and NCAA Championships participant **Chris Berrian**.

That being said, Smith fell just shy of the NCAA Regional qualifying mark in the 100-meters when he clocked in at a season-best 10.59. His time of 21.46 in the 200-meters was a career-best. Smith was also a member of the 4x100-meter relay squad that competed at NCAA Regionals.

In just his rookie season, **Moon**

displayed his unlimited potential every time he stepped on the track. He participated on two relay teams (4x100, 4x400) that competed at NCAA Regionals and saved his best effort for WAC Championships, where he clocked

in with a personal-best time of 47.69 to take third at WAC Championships. His time of 21.91 in the 200-meters was good enough to rank third on the squad.

### Hurdles

Junior **Ryan Moore** is the hands-down choice to capture gold at the conference meet and once again advance to NCAA Regionals. Moore, who has now appeared in the

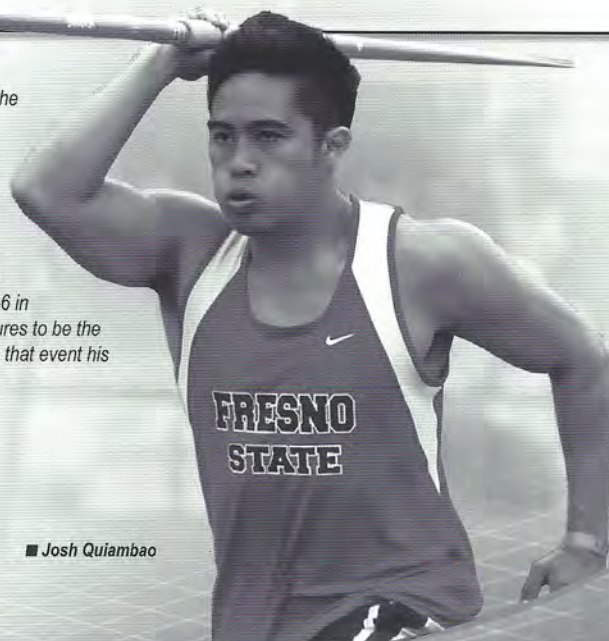

## MEN'S TEAM: 2005 IN REVIEW

The men's squad opened up the 2005 outdoor season with back-to-back meets at Turlock and Chico, both of which were part of the Northern California Collegiate series. First-place finishes seemed to be the norm for the Bulldogs at both meets. In Turlock, newcomers Kenny Moon, Alex Jones and Kyle Montgomery all captured event titles, while Chris Berrian, Ian Mason and Dave Endler all won events at Chico.

One week later, Fresno State battled intermittent rain and windy conditions at the Cal Poly Invitational, a non-scoring team event held in San Luis Obispo. The men's team was led by two event-winners: Sean Marzolf in the 800-meter run and Kyle Montgomery in the triple jump.

Fresno State hosted its first outdoor meet of the season on Mar. 23, at Mt. San Antonio College and Cal State Bakersfield made appearances at Warmerdam Field. Despite the wet and windy conditions, the result turned out to be a Bulldog sweep as Fresno State totaled 165.5 points to finish ahead of Mt. SAC (108.5) and CSUB (77). The Bulldogs recorded nine first place finishes on the afternoon, led by six in running events alone. Chris Berrian earned top honors in both the 100-meters (10.3) and 200-meters (21.0) while the Bulldog's 4x100 relay team took first with a time of 41.00. Alex Jones notched a personal-best 23-8.25 (7.22m) to win the long jump and Dave Endler tallied an NCAA Regional qualifying mark in the discus with a toss of 173-3 (52.82m).

The 77th annual edition of the Fresno Relays was next up on the schedule as the calendar turned to April. A number of individual accomplishments, along with a sweep of men's and women's titles by Buchanan High School, highlighted Saturday's competition at Warmerdam Field. The intercollegiate meet was a non-scoring event, featuring participants from Fresno State, Cal State Bakersfield, Chico State, Cal State Stanislaus and Fresno Pacific. The Bulldogs recorded first-place finishes in 16 events, with four occurring on the men's side.

Ryan Moore (400-meter hurdles) and Alex Jones (long jump) collected first-place finishes while Russell Weaver tied for first in the pole vault, then proceeded to better that mark later in the day. In the elite division pole vault competition, Weaver reached 17-4.5 (5.30m) to take third and qualify for NCAA Regionals.

Fresno State next traveled to Berkeley, Calif., to compete in the Brutus Hamilton Invitational, a new event on the schedule designed to pit the Bulldogs against some quality national competition.

The most notable effort came from Ryan Moore. Already an NCAA Regional qualifier at that point, Moore took first place in a tough 400-meter hurdle field with a personal-best 51.30. Other impressive efforts at the Brutus Hamilton Invitational included the following: Russell Weaver taking third in the pole vault by reaching 16-6.75 (5.05m), Sean Marzolf crossing the line at 1:52.57 to finish third in the 800-meters and Ian Mason running a career-best 14:52.58 in the 5000-meter run, wrapping up the event in sixth. D.J. Haynes threw a distance of 158-5 (48.28m) in the discus, signaling another personal-best.

The Mt. San Antonio College Relays took place Apr. 15-17 and lived up to its reputation. It was here that Russell Weaver reached his pinnacle in the pole vault, reaching a personal-best 17-6.50 (5.35m). While Weaver peaked with a career-high, teammate Chris Berrian was just beginning his late-season surge in the sprints. Berrian ran a then-personal-best 20.89 in the 200-meters, finishing sixth overall and first in his section. Also, Roy

Phelps took third in the pole vault when he matched his personal-best of 16-0.75 (4.90m) while D.J. Haynes recorded a first-place finish in the shot put with a career-best 52-5.50 (15.99m).

Fresno State's final home meet of the season—the Cal-Nevada Championships—was one of the year's highlights. The Bulldogs enjoyed a successful competition, tallying 146.5 points for a runner-up finish behind champion Cal State Northridge. Chris Berrian was named Outstanding Track Performer for the two-day event after claiming titles in the 100-meters (10.73) and 200-meters (20.90). Berrian also ran the third leg of the first-place 4x100-meter relay squad (Kenny Moon, Jesse Smith, Rico Morales), which clocked in at 40.41 to qualify for NCAA Regionals. The Bulldog's other relay squad—the 4x400-meter team of Morales, Juan Valdez, Moon and Ryan Moore—also came in first with a time of 3:13.55.

Moon was also second overall in the 400-meter run, crossing the line with a personal-best 47.78. Moore captured the title in the 400-meter hurdles with a time of 51.41. In the field events, Russell Weaver made 16-6.75 (5.05m) to win the pole vault. Dave Endler bettered his NCAA Regional qualifying mark in the discus with a toss of 173-5 (52.86m) while DeAnte Brown notched a personal-best 49-1.50 (14.97m) in the triple jump.

One week later, Fresno State completed a sweep in a five-way scoring meet in San Luis Obispo against host Cal Poly, Cal State Northridge, UC Santa Barbara and Sacramento State. The men totaled five six first-place finishes and individual achievements were as follows: Chris Berrian running 10.27 in the 100-meters to qualify for NCAA Regionals and racing to a wind-aided 20.47 (20.89) in the 200-meters, Leif McMurry qualifying for NCAA Regionals as he finished second in the pole vault at 16-6.75 (5.05m) and Dave Endler setting a personal-best with a toss of 174-6 (53.21m) to win the discus.

Fresno State continued its late-season surge with a runner-up finish at the WAC Championships, registering 186.50 points behind champion UTEP. The Bulldogs held a large lead after the opening day before the Miners came on strong. Among the Bulldog highlights were the following: Russell Weaver winning his third consecutive pole vaulting title, the 4x400-meter relay squad of Rico Morales, Juan Valdez, Kenny Moon and Ryan Moore qualifying for NCAA Regionals

with a time of 3:09.37 and Chris Berrian winning gold in the 100- and 200-meters.

Nine student-athletes represented Fresno State at the NCAA West Regionals in Eugene, Ore. Chris Berrian participated in both the 100- and 200-meter races, qualifying for NCAA Championships in the 200-meters after he ran 21.01 in the finals to place third overall. He finished eighth in the 100-meters at 10.75. Russell Weaver was one of two Bulldogs competing in the pole vault, as he reached 16-1.25 (4.91m) to take seventh. The 4x100-meter relay team of Alex Jones, Jesse Smith, Kenny Moon and Rico Morales took seventh with a time of 41.83, while the 4x400-meter squad of Morales, Juan Valdez, Moon and Ryan Moore placed ninth at 3:16.03. David Endler finished 16th in the prelims of the discus, throwing 169-8 (51.72m). Moore was a scratch in the 400-meter hurdles due to a hamstring injury.

At the NCAA Championships, Russell Weaver fell just short in his bid to become Fresno State's first male All-American since 2001. Weaver, who advanced to the finals after reaching 16-10.75 (5.15m) in the prelims, remained at that same height in the finals. After earning one of 12 automatic berths into the semifinals of the 200-meters, Chris Berrian clocked in with a personal-best 20.65 to finish 13th overall and four places out of a trip to the final.

### 2005 POSTSEASON

Nine student-athletes represented Fresno State at the NCAA West Regionals in Eugene, Ore. Chris Berrian participated in both the 100- and 200-meter races, qualifying for NCAA Championships in the 200-meters after he ran 21.01 in the finals to place third overall. He finished eighth in the 100-meters at 10.75. Russell Weaver was one of two Bulldogs competing in the pole vault, as he reached 16-1.25 (4.91m) to take seventh. The 4x100-meter relay team of Alex Jones, Jesse Smith, Kenny Moon and Rico Morales took seventh with a time of 41.83, while the 4x400-meter squad of Morales, Juan Valdez, Moon and Ryan Moore placed ninth at 3:16.03. David Endler finished 16th in the prelims of the discus, throwing 169-8 (51.72m). Moore was a scratch in the 400-meter hurdles due to a hamstring injury.

## WOMEN'S TEAM: 2005 IN REVIEW

The women's team kicked off the outdoor season in style, registering 11 first-place finishes, two of which occurred in the 4x100 and 4x400-meter relays. The Bulldogs displayed their depth in the throwing events, with Mallory Webb winning the javelin at 142-5, Katie Richardson leading all entrants in the discus at 151-3.50 and La' Sha Hill claiming the shot put title at 45-11. Lexine Lesser was the winner in the pole vault, soaring to 11-6. In addition, Winnie Fletcher took home titles in two different events, winning the 100-meter dash with a time of 12.59 and the long jump at 17-11. Christina Lopez (200-meters), Zinzi Evans (1500-meters) and Lauren Archie (high jump) also were event winners.

Similar results were produced one week later at the non-scoring Cal Poly Invitational, as La' Sha Hill was an event winner in two events (discus and shot put) while other Bulldog first-place finishers included Jamie Farley (hammer), Mallory Webb (javelin), Andrea Buckner (3000-meter steeplechase) and Christina Lopez (200-meters).

With the 77th annual Fresno Relays quickly approaching, Fresno State hosted a tri-meet with Cal State Bakersfield and Mt. San Antonio College and posted 165.5 points for the victory. Mt. San Antonio College took second with 117.5 while Cal State Bakersfield checked in third at 56. Nine first place efforts occurred on the women's side, led by Zinzi Evans (800-meters), Valeria Delgado (1500-meters) and Andrea Buckner (5000-meters) all capturing titles. Lexine Lesser matched her season-high with a victory in the pole vault at 12-6 (3.81m) while Katie Christianson recorded a personal-best in the long jump at 19-6.25 (5.95m). Mallory Webb bettered her NCAA Regional qualifying mark with a toss of 160-4 (48.88m) in the javelin.

At the Fresno Relays, the Bulldogs notched first-place finishes in 16 events with 12 of those coming on the women's side. Christina Lopez led the field in the 100-and 200-meter runs, Katie Christianson was a multiple-event winner (100-meter hurdles and long jump) and Mallory Webb threw a 144-0 (43.90m) to win the javelin.

Looking ahead to the Brutus Hamilton Invitational, Fresno State sent a group of athletes determined to break through with career-bests and NCAA qualifying marks. One such example was Andrea Buckner, who finished third overall in the 3000-meter steeplechase by running a personal-best 10:46.76, shaving more than a second off her previous top time.

The Mt. San Antonio College Relays were next up on the schedule, and the Bulldogs only had to reflect on a standout individual performance from last year's meet for motivation. In 2004, Kara June locked up an NCAA Championships bid when she ran a personal-best 10:15.22 at the Mt. SAC Relays.

The first day of competition offered favorable results for Fresno State, as Annie Malaythong and La' Sha Hill recorded NCAA Regional qualifying marks. Malaythong joined Lexine Lesser as automatic qualifiers in the pole vault, taking second with a

season-high mark of 12-5.50 (3.80m) in the 15-participant event. Hill also recorded a runner-up finish, throwing a personal-best distance of 158-2 (48.21m) in the discus. In other action, Katie Richardson continued to inch closer to an NCAA Regional berth in the discus while Jamie Farley established a new best in the hammer at 168-0 (51.22m). Christina Lopez improved her season-high times in both the 100-and 200-meter runs, with her 12.02 in the 100-meters turning out to be a career-best.

With the men's team placing second at the Cal-Nevada Championships, the women were able to top that accomplishment. Fresno State registered 125.5 points, edging out Cal State Northridge and UNLV (both at 123) for the team title. The Bulldogs recorded only four first-place finishes in the competition but displayed their depth as multiple athletes were contributing scorers in almost every event. Andrea Buckner earned first-place honors in the 3000-meter steeplechase (10:39.21) and 5000-meters (17:20.49). Zinzi Evans ran a 2:10.14 in the 800-meters to claim the crown in that race while Katie Christianson leaped to 19-3.50 (5.88m) in the long jump to capture the title. Lexine Lesser reached 12-5.50 (3.80m) in the pole vault, good for a second-place finish while Annie Malaythong (11-8/3.56m) tied for fifth.

Once again looking to keep pace with the men's success, the women's squad matched their counterparts by finishing 4-0 in a five-way meet at San Luis Obispo

against host Cal Poly, Cal State Northridge, Sacramento State and UC Santa Barbara. The 'Dogs locked up three first-place finishes: Andrea Buckner ran a 10:01.55 to lead the field in the 3000-meter run, Zinzi Evans captured the title in the 800-meters when she crossed the line at 2:12.39 and Mallory Webb took first in the javelin by throwing a distance of 151-0 (46.05m).

Following an appearance in the Modesto Relays, Fresno State looked to continue its momentum at the conference meet in Tulsa. And the Bulldogs did not disappoint, putting the finishing touches on a strong season with a third place finish at the WAC Outdoor Championships. The Bulldogs netted 99.50 points, finishing behind champion Louisiana Tech and runner-up Rice. Fresno State stood in second place after one day of competition, mainly due to Katie Christianson winning gold in the pentathlon. Also, Lexine Lesser established a personal-best of 13-1.50 (4.00m) to win her second career pole vault title.

Nine Bulldogs qualified for postseason competition, which began with the NCAA West Regionals in Eugene, Ore. Mallory Webb threw a season-best 160-9 (49.00m) in the javelin to earn a berth at NCAA Championships, while Katie Christianson did the same in her postseason debut after recording a leap of 20-3 (6.17m) in the long jump. Pole vaulters Lexine Lesser and Annie Malaythong failed to extend their seasons, as Lesser took 12th at 12-6 (3.81m) and Malaythong was tied for 17th at 12-0 (3.66m). Other Bulldogs in action included the following: Katie Richardson throwing 138-8 (42.26m) in the discus, Aspen Marshall tossing 46-6 (14.17m) in the shot put, Regina Ollison leaping to 38-7.75 (11.78m) in the triple jump and Andrea Buckner crossing the line at 10:47.70 in the steeplechase.

Both Bulldogs advancing to NCAA Championships were eliminated on the opening day of competition. Mallory Webb, who finished seventh nationally in 2004 to earn All-America honors as a freshman, finished 17th overall in the prelims of the javelin. Webb's second of three throws (150-3/45.79m) turned out to be her best effort on the evening. Katie Christianson's impressive season also came to an end in the long jump prelims. In the qualifying round, Christianson finished 23rd overall and 12th in her flight when she reached 19-5.25 (5.92m) on her third and final attempt.

World Records. These two words and the Bob Mathias Fresno Relays have become synonymous for well over a half decade. In what has become an annual rite of spring in the San Joaquin Valley, the West's most visible meet has long attracted some of the world's finest athletes onto the hallowed ground at Ratcliffe Stadium until continuing its success at Warmerdam Field. Along with its predecessor, the West Coast Relays, the Bob Mathias Fresno Relays has had 40 world records broken or tied in the 77-year history of the meet. The greatest athletes of the valley — Bob Mathias, Dutch Warmerdam, Rafer Johnson, Tommie Smith and Lee Evans — began competing in high school at the West Coast Relays.

The meet has also seen the spawning of some top stars outside of track and field circles.

Baseball great Jackie Robinson, football stars O.J. Simpson, Ollie Matson, Henry Ellard, Willie Gault and Ron Brown and basketball's Bill Russell received some of their first claims to fame at Ratcliffe Stadium.

But the Bob Mathias Fresno Relays is not just for the world class athlete. Since its inception in 1927, the meet has included grammar school, high school and junior college events, tying the valley and the local community into one of the most successful track and field meets in the nation. A fan can watch and cheer for the local athlete, and at the same time view some of the finest athletes the world has seen. This diversity is what makes the meet so unique, and why the tradition has carried on and grown for so many years.

## FRESNO STATE'S RUN FOR THE DREAM

World records. Personal-bests. An opportunity to watch track and field Olympians and up-and-coming stars compete at their highest level. All of those could be witnessed at the Save Mart Center, the site of Fresno State's inaugural Run For The Dream indoor track meet back on Jan. 16. The historical event was witnessed by an enthusiastic crowd of 5,806, as fans were treated to a 12-hour celebration of a sport that is one of the most tradition-rich in the Valley. The meet was created to honor the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., while presenting the community with an opportunity to honor track and field stars of the past along with those of the present and future.

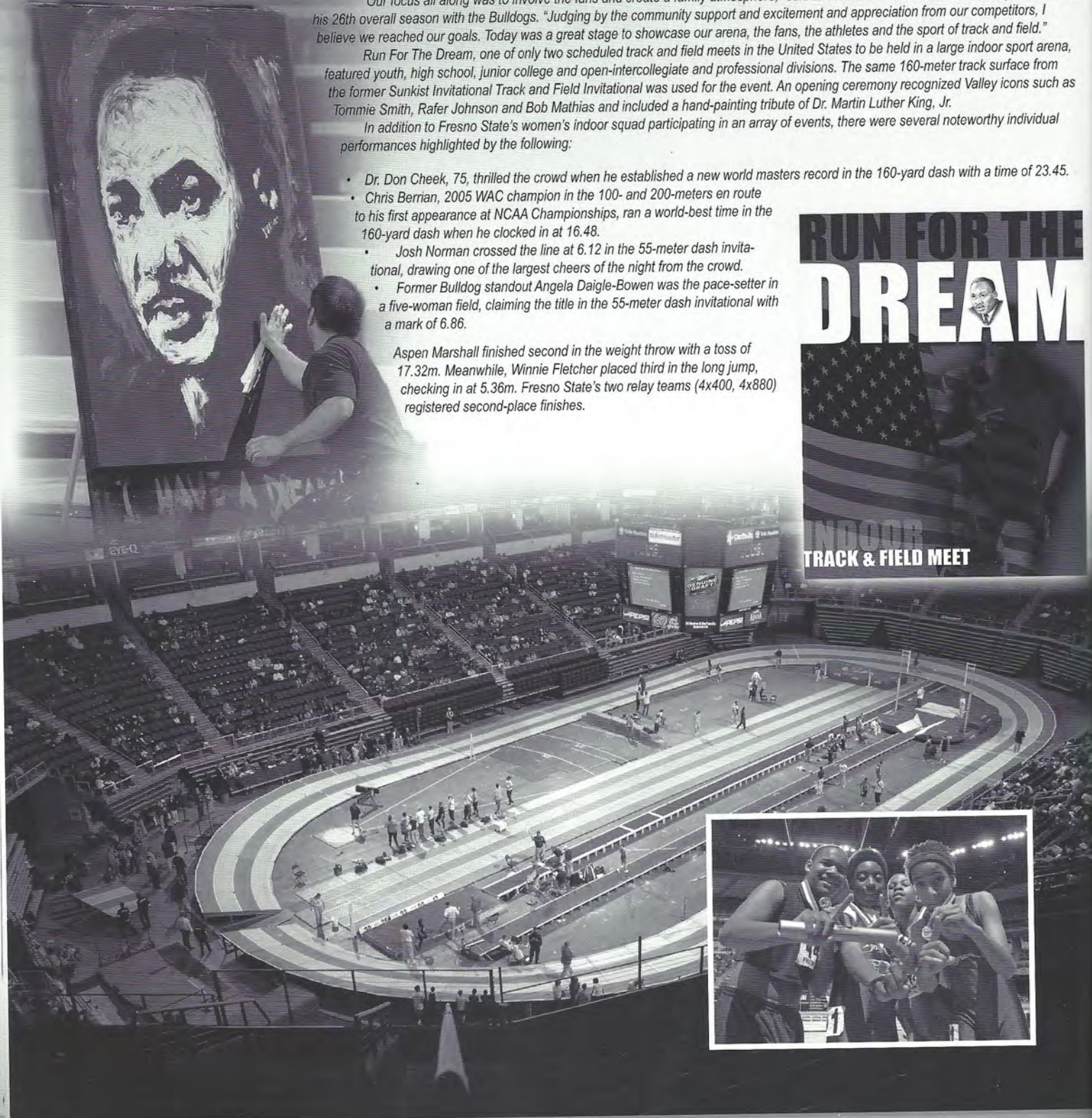
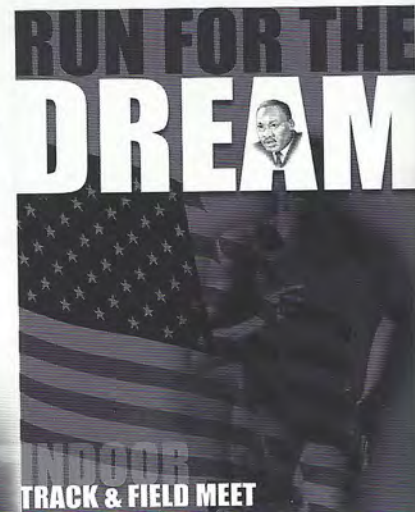
"Our focus all along was to involve the fans and create a family atmosphere," said director of track and field Bob Fraley, who enters his 26th overall season with the Bulldogs. "Judging by the community support and excitement and appreciation from our competitors, I believe we reached our goals. Today was a great stage to showcase our arena, the fans, the athletes and the sport of track and field."

Run For The Dream, one of only two scheduled track and field meets in the United States to be held in a large indoor sport arena, featured youth, high school, junior college and open-intercollegiate and professional divisions. The same 160-meter track surface from the former Sunkist Invitational Track and Field Invitational was used for the event. An opening ceremony recognized Valley icons such as Tommie Smith, Rafer Johnson and Bob Mathias and included a hand-painting tribute of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

In addition to Fresno State's women's indoor squad participating in an array of events, there were several noteworthy individual performances highlighted by the following:

- Dr. Don Cheek, 75, thrilled the crowd when he established a new world masters record in the 160-yard dash with a time of 23.45.
- Chris Berrian, 2005 WAC champion in the 100- and 200-meters en route to his first appearance at NCAA Championships, ran a world-best time in the 160-yard dash when he clocked in at 16.48.
- Josh Norman crossed the line at 6.12 in the 55-meter dash invitational, drawing one of the largest cheers of the night from the crowd.
- Former Bulldog standout Angela Daigle-Bowen was the pace-setter in a five-woman field, claiming the title in the 55-meter dash invitational with a mark of 6.86.

Aspen Marshall finished second in the weight throw with a toss of 17.32m. Meanwhile, Winnie Fletcher placed third in the long jump, checking in at 5.36m. Fresno State's two relay teams (4x400, 4x880) registered second-place finishes.

# FRESNO STATE'S POLE VAULTING LEGACY CORNELIUS "DUTCH" WARMERDAM

- First vaulter in the world to clear 15 feet on April 13, 1940 in the University of California's Edwards Stadium in Berkeley, Calif.
- Cleared 15 feet or better with a bamboo pole 43 times before anyone cleared it once
- Set outdoor pole vault world record of 15-7 3/4 in 1942 in Modesto and it stood for 15 years
- Set indoor pole vault world record of 15-8 1/2 in 1943 at the Chicago Relays, which stood for 16 years
- Seven-time United States TAC champion
- 1942 John L. Sullivan Award winner
- 1941 John L. Sullivan Award runner-up
- Voted in a national poll by UPI in 1955 as the greatest field athlete of all-time
- Named to the United States Track and Field Hall of Fame and the National Track and Field Hall of Fame
- 1955 Greatest Field Athlete, united Press Poll
- Named "American Pole Vaulter of the Century" by United States Track and Field in 2000
- Named "Fresno State's Greatest Athlete of the 20th Century" in 2001

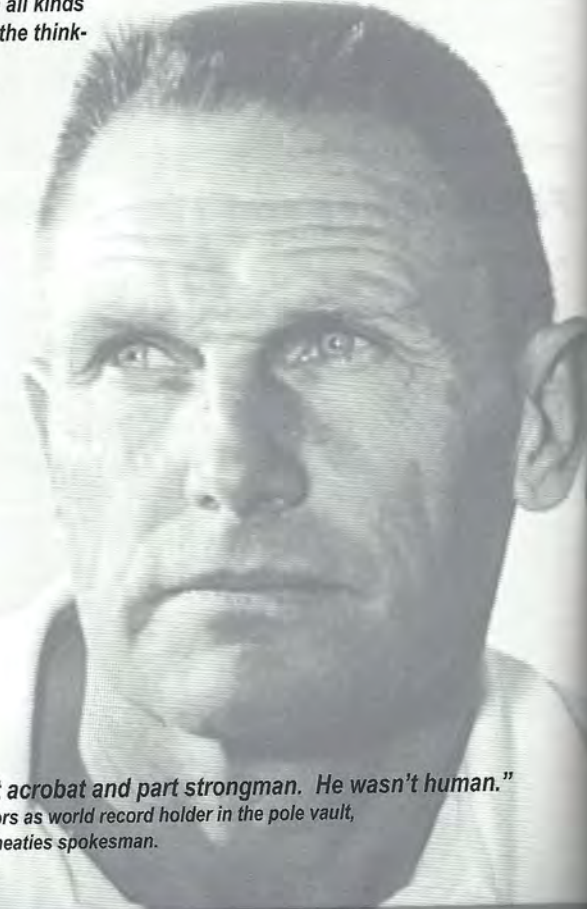

### ERKKI MUSTAKARI (1968-70)

## FRESNO STATE TRACK HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### 2005

**Terry Bowen** — Terry Bowen was an All-American in 1994, as he placed fourth overall in the 100-meters at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. He owns the best 100-meter time in the history of the Fresno Relays and his time of 10.16 in the 100-meters ranks as the best mark in program history. Bowen continued to make his mark in the school record books, also ranking second in the 200-meters when he clocked in at 20.68 during the 1994 campaign.

**Felicia Brown** — Felicia Brown earned two conference titles in 1996, winning the triple jump (41-6.50) during the indoor season and the heptathlon (5,486 points-program record) in the outdoor season. She was the 1997 WAC Indoor champion in the long jump (19-9.75) and a member of WAC Indoor champion 4x400-meter relay squad. Bowen garnered All-America status in 1996 for a sixth-place finish in the heptathlon at NCAA Outdoor Championships.

**Staci Darden** — Staci Darden was the 1997 WAC Indoor champion in the 20-lb. weight throw (61-4). A two-time All-American (1996, 1998), she placed sixth both times in the weight throw at NCAA Indoor Championships. Her throw of 191-11 in the hammer at the 1998 Fresno Relays still stands as an event record and the best in school history. The all-time leading scorer in program history with 349 points, her toss of 64-4.25 in the weight throw during the 1998 campaign is a Fresno State indoor record.

**Dan McNamara** — Dan McNamara owns the school's best mark in the high jump, recording a leap of 7-2.25 during the 1982 season. McNamara served as an assistant coach for the Bulldog track and field program from 2003-04, overseeing jumps and sprints and directing student-athletes to personal-best efforts on both the men's and women's side. He is currently head track coach at Bullard High School. Having coached for over 20 years at the high school and collegiate levels, McNamara has mentored hundreds of Valley jumpers.

**Pat Ogle** — Pat Ogle is the Executive Director of The Bulldog Foundation (BDF), chief fundraising organization at Fresno State. Under his leadership, the BDF has raised millions of dollars to provide scholarships for all of Fresno State's athletics programs. Ogle has been a key supporter of track and field program with coverage in the Bulldog Sports Magazine, Fresno State's seasonal publication showcasing athletic highlights.

### 2004

**Robert Foster** — Robert Foster, a seven-time WAC champion and two-time All-American, was an NCAA titlist in the 55-meter hurdles (indoor) and 110-meter hurdles (outdoor) in 1994. He also competed in the hurdles at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, Georgia. Foster was the Bulldog's scoring leader in 1993 and 1994 and posted career-bests of 13.53 in the 110-meter hurdles and 7.11 in the 55-meter hurdles, both of which are modern-day WAC and Fresno State records.

**Melissa Price** — Widely considered a pioneer for female vaulters in the United States, Price became Fresno State's first female individual champion after winning the NCAA Indoor pole vault title in 1998. A four-time

WAC champion and three-time All-American, Price also captured the 1999 NCAA Indoor title. She currently holds Fresno State's female pole vault record at 14-3.50 and took second at the 1997 USTF Championships.

### 2003

**David Cox** — David Cox, a six-time All-American, was one of the most impressive pole vaulters in Bulldog history. He is one of only four athletes in school history to clear the 18-foot barrier and a three-time WAC indoor champion and two-time WAC outdoor champion. In addition, he placed second at the 1996 NCAA Outdoor Championships with a 18-2 1/4 leap.

**Todd Reich** — The other Fresno State athlete included among this year's inductees is Todd Reich, who owns the best javelin mark in school history at 266-9, achieved in 1994. Reich is a two-time Olympian (1996 and 2000), three-time All-American (1991, 1992 and 1994) and a two-time champion in the javelin at the United States National Championships.

**George Ilg** — George Ilg joined the Fresno State faculty in 1948 as an instructor and was influential in the development of the School of Agriculture. He is credited with founding the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) and also served as vice president of the NCAA.

**Les Snyder, Jr.** — Les Snyder, Jr., served as Fresno State's assistant athletics director for business/finance and a member of the athletics staff for over 20 years. In addition to volunteering his time as a track and field official, Snyder served as a committee member and business manager of the Fresno Relays. He also served eight years as controller/business manager in the private sector.

### 2002

**Dave Casper** — Casper set the Fresno State records in both the 880 yards and 440 yards with times of 1:49.50 and 52.5. Casper won both the California Coastal Athletic Association Championship in the 880 and was the state champion in 1955. Upon his graduation from Fresno State, he went on to coach track and field for the U.S. Army at the WhiteSand Proving Grounds in N.M.

**Merle Martin** — After enrolling at Fresno State in 1946, Merle Martin went on to set a legacy in the hurdle events. Throughout his four years as a runner, he won both the high and low hurdles at the California Coastal Athletic Association Championships. Martin qualified for the NCAA and AAU Championships all four years as well and in 1949, secured a third place championship in the low hurdles at the AAU championships. After becoming the first Fresno State student to graduate with a masters degree in business, he went on to teach at Fresno High School.

**Bob Stout** — In 1948, Bob Stout entered the hallways of Fresno State and left four years later having left a with a National Championship, an Olympic Tryout and a large role in the establishment of the cross country program. The NCAA Champion earned his medal in 1951 when he finished fifth in the two-mile run (an event no longer held), therefore, making him an All-American. One year later he became a member of the San Francisco Olympic Club

and went on to qualify in the 5,000 meters. As time went on he taught for the Fresno Unified School District from 1952-87, where he coached cross country and track at Roosevelt High School.

**Dick Vierra** — Highlighting the events on Dick Vierra's list of accomplishments was placing fourth in the 10,000 meters at the 1948 NCAA Championships. He is the only man or woman in Fresno State history to win the event and the first of two men to win a distance event and become an All-American.

### 2001

**Red Estes** — Estes was the men's head track and field coach at Fresno State for 20 seasons and led his teams to an overall record of 188-38-1 before retiring in 2000. Throughout his days as a coach, he was honored with several accolades including: 10 consecutive Big West Conference Championships from 1982-92 and in the same time span was named Big West Coach of the Year, 1995 Co-WAC Coach of the Year, 1992 Region 8 Coach of the Year and 1998 top male coach at the Cal/Nevada Championships. Overall, he has coached more than 100 all-Americans and seven individual NCAA titles. Estes began his coaching career at Oregon in 1959. While serving in the U.S. Army, he was a player-coach of the Council International du Sport Militaire from 1961-1963. In 1963 he moved on to become the assistant track and field coach at Springfield (Ore.) High School and then spent another season as the freshman coach at Oregon. While in college at Oregon, he threw the discus and shot put and played freshman football. He graduated in 1959 from Oregon, where he earned his B.S. degree in physical education.

### 2000

**Henry Ellard** — Ellard was a phenomenal jumper for the Bulldog track and field team in the early 1980s. He is the school record holder in the triple jump with a mark of 55-0 1/2 and is currently ninth on the career long jump list with a mark of 25-0 1/4. Ellard earned All-American honors in 1982 when he captured seventh in the triple jump at the NCAA Outdoor nationals.

**Tanya Ehlert** — Ehlert is the school record holder in both the indoor (53.01) and outdoor (52.80) 400 meters, and is the WAC indoor record holder in the same event. She also ranks fourth in school history in the 200 meters with a time of 24.0. Ehlert was also a piece of the top Bulldog 4 x 200 meter relay (1:36.91, 1993) and the distance medley relay (11:51.32, 1992). Her solid performances resulted in four All-American honors. In her senior year, Ehlert was an All-American in the 400 meters at both the indoor (9th) and outdoor (3rd) NCAA finals.

**Erkki Mustakari** — Mustakari is one of many athletes in a great pole vault tradition at Fresno State. He was the first Bulldog to clear 17 feet and he held the school record of 17-4 for 16 years. He set the Finnish National Record in 1968 by clearing a height of 17-0 1/2 and competed for Finland in the 1968 Olympic games. Mustakari was a two-time All-American by placing fourth at both the 1968 and 1969 NCAA Championships. He was also a two-time CCAA champion and the PCAA champion in 1970.

**Tom Pagani** — Pagani, widely recognized as one of the finest throwing

coaches in the United States, was head women's coach for 17 years. Pagani led the Bulldogs to Big West titles in 1987, '88, '91 and '92 and the WAC indoor crown in 1994, for which he was named the conference's Indoor Coach of the Year. He coached 39 Bulldog all-Americans and 52 conference champions. Pagani's final dual-meet record was 142-35-1.

## 1999

**Ken Dose** – A 1960 graduate of Fresno State, Dose retired from coaching after having spent the last 28 years as the women's track coach at Fresno City College. During his time at Fresno City he spent 13 years as chairman of the PE/Recreation department and was instrumental in starting the women's volleyball and track programs. He has worked for 17 years as co-meet director of the California Community College Cross Country State Championships and twice served as meet director for the California Community College Track and Field State Championships. Dose has played a large role in the continuing success of the Fresno Relays, serving as a master official for 26 years with the USA Track and Field Association. His many honors include selection as team manager for the 1991 USA National Indoor Track and Field championship team in Japan, San Joaquin Valley Community College Track Coach of the Year in 1990 and 1996, USA Track and Field Convention delegate from 1988-1996, and Central Valley Conference Track and Field Coach of the Year in 1998.

**John Bender** – John Bender goes down in the record books as the top shot putter in Fresno State history. A Bulldog from 1984-88, Bender still holds the school record in the shot put with a throw of 65-6 in 1987. Bender was a five-time all-American during his Fresno State career, earning the honor four times in the shot put and once in the 35-pound weight throw. In addition he was a two-time PCAA champion in the shot, winning the event in 1987 and 1988. As a senior, Bender had his best finish ever at the NCAA Championships when he finished second.

## 1998

**Ed Kerber** – Kerber's association with Fresno State track and field goes back to his competitive days as a Bulldog in 1948. As a freshman, Kerber ran the mile for Fresno State. And that same year, Kerber got his start as an official at a Fresno High School track meet. In 1959, Kerber began a 39 year string of officiating at the West Coast Relays (which was only interrupted one year for heart surgery). He began his tenure as a javelin official and then eventually made his way to the finish line, where he has been Fresno State's Chief Finish Line Judge since 1986. Kerber was also the original president of the Track Backers Club in 1980, holding the position for two years.

**Cathie Wilson-Jones** – Wilson-Jones competed in the 100, 200, 400, 400 hurdles, 4x100 and 4x400 relay, earning high point honors in 1985 while being named the Most Valuable Athlete on the squad. It was after her Fresno State career that Wilson-Jones excelled. The most eventful year was 1987, when she placed third at the U.S. National Championships and competed at the Pan-Am Games and the World Championships. But the event she won't forget is the near-fatal car accident she survived that December. After suffering a broken leg and other numerous injuries, Wilson-Jones attempted a comeback. And after months of grueling rehabilitation, she was back throwing the javelin in competition. Wilson-Jones emerged once again at the 1988 U.S. Olympic Trials and

then for the final time at the 1992 Olympic Trials where she placed fifth.

## 1997

**Erv Hunt** – A former standout athlete for Fresno State in football and in track and field, Hunt was the head coach for the 1996 U.S. Olympic men's track and field team after serving stints as an assistant coach for the U.S. team at the 1992 Olympics, the 1993 World Championships, the 1989 World Cup Games, and the 1986 Freedom Games. Hunt enjoyed success during his playing career, as well. In track and field, he ran a 14.0 in the 120-yard high hurdles at Fresno City College, the nation's top junior college mark in 1967. He later transferred to Fresno State on a football-track scholarship. A sixth-round pick of the Green Bay Packers (145th selection overall) in the 1970 NFL draft, Hunt played two seasons of professional football until a back injury forced an early retirement.

**Nicole Carroll** – Carroll won the javelin at the U.S. Olympic Trials and participated in her first Olympic Games in 1996. In 1995, she threw 205-10, the farthest by an American in four years. During her two seasons at Fresno State, Carroll earned All-America honors twice in the javelin. In 1990, she finished seventh at the NCAA Championships (161-3) to become Fresno State's first all-American in the javelin. The following season, Carroll finished sixth at the NCAA meet (164-9) despite spending most of that season sidelined with a back injury. Carroll's collegiate personal-best of 169-5 is still No. 2 all-time at Fresno State.

## 1996

**Jeff Roberson** – Roberson was only seconds shy of winning the national championship when he placed second at 1:46.64 in the 800 meters at the 1986 NAAs. Roberson was also an indoor All-American in the 500-meter dash in 1985, finishing eighth. While at Fresno State, he topped the school's all-time 800 list in 1986 with his own 1:46.1. His time was the world's fastest of the year up to that point. In addition, he set a world indoor record in the 500 meters, clocking in at a blazing 1:01.19. As a senior, he won the PCAA crown in the 800 and the 1600 relay as a junior.

**Tamara Compton-Neeley** – Compton-Neeley is a two-time indoor all-American in the triple jump, as well as an outdoor winner. In 1987, Compton-Neeley placed sixth in the NCAA triple jump and ninth at the U.S. outdoors. She improved on her indoor finish in 1988, when she came away with fifth. Compton-Neeley is the Fresno State record holder in the triple jump, leaping to a school-best 41-9 3/4. She also possesses Fresno State's all-time best indoor triple jump mark at 42-8. Compton-Neeley is No. 2 on the school's long jump list with a career-best of 20-3.

## 1995

**Mark Heppner** – Heppner established a career best of 18-2 1/2, which was the third-best mark in the history of the PCAA and second-best all time at Fresno State. In 1986, Heppner combined with Doug Fraley and Kelly Rodrigues to form one of the best vaulting trios in collegiate history, combining for 55 feet in height during the 1986 campaign. Heppner finished third at the 1986 PCAA Championships behind Fraley and Rodrigues as the trio swept the top three spots in the event. But Heppner beat them both at the NCAA Championships,

where he placed second in the nation. He collected four PCAA championship rings in his career.

**Tonya Mendonca-Olivas** – Mendonca-Olivas still holds the Fresno State indoor (6-2) and outdoor (6-1 1/4) records in the high jump. Mendonca-Olivas was the only four-time all-American in Fresno State women's history until Tanya Dooley nailed down her fourth in 1994. Mendonca-Olivas won three straight outdoor all-American honors from 1985-87. She picked up an indoor all-American certificate during the 1988 season. In all, she qualified for seven NCAA Championships. She also was a two-time PCAA champion.

## 1994

**Lacy Barnes** – Barnes holds the Bulldog record in the discus (204-1), is third on the all-time shot list (47-2) and sixth in the javelin (164-0). Barnes was a four-time conference champion in the discus (1984-88) and won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association shot title in 1988. She was the TAC discus champion in 1989 and 1991 and was ranked No. 1 in the U.S. three times, the last time coming in 1991, when she represented the U.S. at the World Championships held in Tokyo, Japan.

**Lou Futrell** – Futrell finished fourth at the 1943 NCAA Championships in the 110-meter high hurdles. Started at halfback on the high-powered 1942 Bulldog football team that finished the season 9-1.

**Dot Jones** – Jones was the dominant shot-putter in Fresno State history, with a collegiate best and school record mark of 54-2 3/4 coming in 1986. She was the first Bulldog women to earn indoor all-American honors by finishing fifth in the shot in 1985. Later that same season she earned outdoor all-American honors with a fourth-place finish at NAAs. Overall, she earned three All-American honors and three conference titles. Jones was a finalist at the U.S. Olympic Trials in 1988 and 1992.

**Iva Wright** – Wright came to Fresno State as a national junior champion in both shot and discus, only to find the Bulldogs didn't have a field women's squad. In 1973, the FS student council sponsored her at the AIAW championships, where she took fourth in the shot and third in discus. She won the AIAW title in 1974 and remains as the only female national champion in Fresno State history.

## 1993

**Doug Fraley** – Fraley is the school record holder in the pole vault (18-11) and is the youngest athlete to be inducted into Fresno State's Hall of Fame. He won the vault at the 1986 NCAA Indoor Championships and then became the only Bulldog to ever win back-to-back national titles in any event by taking the indoor title in 1987. He won the 1987 NCAA Outdoor Championships and ended his career with five all-American honors.

**Joe Shropshire** – Shropshire was the Bulldogs' 10th all-American after he finished fourth in the 440-yard dash and fourth in the 440-yard dash at the 1944 NCAA Championships. He repeated his all-American performance with a sixth-place finish in the 440 at the 1945 NCAA meet.

## 1992

**Robert Womack** – Womack has been the voice of Bulldog track and field since 1965 and is one of the most



knowledgeable historians on the sport in the San Joaquin Valley. He has worked as an announcer at the TAC Senior Nationals, the NCAA Division I and II Championships and the Big West and Pac-10 Conference Championships.

**Matt Mileham** — One of the most prolific throwers in school history, Mileham was an eight-time all-American in the hammer and 35 lb. weight throws. He was also a two-time Olympian for Great Britain (1984, 88). He still holds the school record in the hammer (252-8) and the 35 lb. weight (73-4 1/2).

**Roger George** — In 1976, George set the Fresno State decathlon mark of 7,960 (scored with 1985 tables) that still stands today. He was a three-time conference champion for the Bulldogs in the decathlon (1972-74).

**Renee Ortiz** — Ortiz was the first female all-American in Fresno State history. She earned the honor in the 3,000 meters. Ortiz still holds school records in 3,000 meters (9:22.59), 5,000 meters (16:26.40) and 10,000 meters (34:13.4).

**Steve Campbell** — Campbell still holds the Fresno State record for 400 meters (46.03) he set in 1977. He placed third in the 1977 NCAA Outdoor Championships, good for all-American honors. In '77, his senior year, he set school records in the 400 and as a member of the mile and sprint relay squads.

**Tommy Nelson** — Nelson one of Fresno State's first all-Americans. He placed sixth in the 1939 NCAA Outdoor Championships in the 100 yards to garner the award. His personal-bests were 9.6 in the 100 yards and 21.00 in the 200 yards.

## 1991

**Mike Agostini** — Agostini, a sprinter from Trinidad, still holds the second-best 200 meters mark in school history, 20.84 in 1958. Agostini set a hand-timed world record of 20.1 in the 220 yards in Fresno back in 1956.

**Bruce Farris** — Farris has been a sportswriter at The Fresno Bee for over 40 years. He covered all of Fresno State's sports for nearly 20 years.

**Sam Workman** — Workman played the role his last name suggested, running everything from the 100 to the 440 to the long jump.

## 1990

**Sid Nickolas** — A four-time all-American jumper and hurdler, Nickolas held the Fresno State long jump record for nearly 20 years.

**Jack Wilcox** — Wilcox was a two-time all-American in the 880 yards and finished sixth at the national championships in 1957. That year, the Bulldogs finished third in the meet. His PR 1:46.1 in the 880 was the school record for 28 years and his 4:08.9 mile was the Fresno State best for 23 years.

**Floyd "Pee Wee" Wilson** — Wilson soared to a 24-3 3/4 long jump in 1934 to set a Fresno State record. He went on to finish third at the national championship meet that year.

**Myron "Andy" Anderson** — Anderson also played football at Fresno State in 1930 and 1931. He is also a member of the Fresno Hall of Fame.

## 1989

**Clinton Linder** — Linder's own running career was cut short by an injury, but he has since devoted more than 42 years as a Fresno State track official.

**Rosemary Rodden** — Rodden was the West Coast Relays secretary for 27 years, but she began her career as an Fresno State secretary for the late Bulldog track coach J. Flint Hanner in 1948.

**John Warkentin** — Warkentin competed in the decathlon for more than a decade. He won the national AAU meet decathlon in 1968 and again in 1970. He scored a career-high 8,031 points in placing third in a meet against the USSR in 1977.

## 1988

**Harold "Hal" Beatty** — Beatty was a distance runner at Fresno State and later returned as a coach in 1937. He served as basketball coach, dean of men, athletic director and teacher at Fresno State.

**Art Cazares** — Undefeated throughout his two-year career as a Bulldog, Cazares won the 1942 NCAA two-mile championship.

**Les Laing** — Laing was part of Jamaica's 1,600 meter relay team that set a world record in the 1952 Helsinki Olympic Games, making him the only Fresno State graduate (class of 1952) to win an Olympic gold medal in track and field.

## 1987

**Fred Barnes** — Barnes was Fresno State's first NCAA pole vault champion, winning the honor in 1953. Barnes broke the school record held by the legendary Dutch Warmerdam (his coach at the time) by clearing 14-8. He went on to tie for third at the 1956 Olympic Trials, just missing a spot on the team.

**Darel Newman** — Newman's school record time of 10.26 in the 100-meters time stood for 32 years. He guided Fresno State to an NCAA College Division title in 1964 and went on to place fourth at the NCAA (university) meet in the 100. In 1965, Newman beat Olympic gold medalist Bob Hayes with a winning time of 5.9 seconds in a 60-yard indoor race.

**Ed Ortman** — The Fresno Bee's sports editor from 1927-65, Ortman earned a reputation as a great track and field writer. He was inducted into the Fresno Athletic Hall of Fame, as well as its boxing and Twilight League baseball halls of fame.

## 1986

**Charles Craig** — Craig played a significant part in one of Fresno State's greatest NCAA Championship showings, placing first in the triple jump in 1964 as the Bulldogs finished third overall. He also ran the second leg on Fresno State's runner-up 400 meter relay team. Craig, now a head track coach at Cal State Bakersfield, won the U.S. triple jump title in 1967.

**Ed Piston** — Piston was the man behind the scenes for 27 years as Bulldog sports publicist and 30 years as West Coast Relays press box headmaster.

**Ancel Robinson** — Robinson still shares the world record in the 220 low hurdles with a 22.2. That mark was his winning time at the 1957 NCAA Championships.

## 1985

**J. Flint Hammer** — Hammer coached several great Fresno State College teams in a 34-year career from 1927-60, and is credited with founding the West Coast Relays.

**Walter Marty** — Marty was Fresno State's first NCAA champion, an honor he earned as a high jumper in 1934. He also set a world record of 6-8 5/8 that year.

**Francis Miller** — Miller never missed officiating at the West Coast Relays in the its first 55 years of existence (1927-82).

**Ken Potter** — Serious digestive tract surgery sidelined Potter one year, but he officiated at 54 of the first 55 West Coast Relays carnivals.

**Elroy Robinson** — Robinson won the NCAA 880 title in 1935 and later won two world titles and broke the 800 meter world record.

**Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam** — Warmerdam, the namesake of competitive track at Fresno State, is considered the greatest bamboo vaulter of all-time. He dominated his era like no other field event athlete before or since, and was a successful coach at Fresno State from 1961-80.

## 2005 IN REVIEW: ONE RACE AT A TIME

When first-year head coach Joe Gonzales took over the Fresno State cross country program, the only goal to accomplish was to get better with each passing race.

The Bulldogs did just that as they won a regular-season invitational title before capping their season off with their eighth NCAA Western Region appearance in 11 years and a fifth place showing at the 2005 Western Athletic Conference Championship.

After finishing as the Bulldogs top runner in all seven races a year ago, junior Andrea Buckner continued her leadership form by finishing first for Fresno State in all seven meets in 2005. Advancing to the NCAA Western Region for the third straight year, she placed 67th overall out of 199 runners with a time of 22:09.2 -- just six seconds off her personal-best mark set at the 2004 NCAA Western Region. At the WAC Championship, Buckner finished eighth with a time of 18:12.9 to earn second team all-conference honors. At UC Riverside Invite, Buckner ran the school's 18th-fastest 5K time of 18:11.2 after capturing her first career invitational win at the Stanislaus invite with a 6K time of 22:30.

Junior Zinzi Evans and freshman Roxanne Sellick, who both ran in their first NCAA meet in 2005, gave Fresno State a formidable scoring trio. Evans finished second for the Bulldogs in five races while Sellick finished second twice. In addition, each finished as one of the 'Dogs top three runners in all seven meets.

In the 2-mile Watermelon Run to open the season, Sellick captured the meet crown with a time of 11:25 - five seconds off the school's freshman record and the 15th best all-time run on the Bulldogs' 2-mile list. At the 2005 NCAA Western Region she set the school's 11th-best all-time 6K mark (23:21) after posting a personal-best 5K time of 19:02.1 at the 2005 WAC Championship. Evans set a career-best 6K time of 23:17 - a mark that ranks No. 8 all-time at Fresno State - at the 2005 NCAA Western Region after clocking a personal-best 5K mark (18:32.6) at the UC Riverside Invitational.

Complementing the 'Dogs top trio were sophomores Marina Santana and Patty Torres and junior Valeria Delgado.

At the 2005 WAC Cross Country Championship, Santana broke the 20-minute barrier for the third time overall in her career when she clocked a 5K season-best time of 19:48.7. She finished as one of the 'Dogs top five runners in six of seven races. Torres also finished among the top five runners for the Bulldogs in six meets. Highlighting her season was a career-best 5K run of 20:25.8 at the Cal Poly Invite. Both set personal-best and Top 25 6K marks at the 2005 NCAA Western Region. Santana sits No. 18 all-time with a mark of 24:15 while Torres is ranked 19th after posting a time of 24:26. After competing in only two races last year, Delgado ran a season-best 5K mark of 20:09.3 at the UC Riverside Invitational.

While Gonzales made his debut as the women's head coach, he also directed the Bulldog men's cross country team for three years. In those three seasons he guided the program to three consecutive top five conference finishes while coaching five All-WAC selections. Now, with a top five finish for the women's program and an all-conference pick in Buckner, Gonzales has directed the cross country programs to four consecutive top five finishes while coaching six cross country All-WAC performers.

## ALL-AMERICA CITY

### THE COMMUNITY

Fresno's metropolitan area has a population of more than 460,000 and yet it maintains a friendly "big town" feeling. Cultural events are numerous and feature such groups as the Fresno Philharmonic Orchestra, the Fresno Arts Center, the Fresno Metropolitan Museum and several live theater organizations. The popular Tower District located downtown (surrounding the Tower Theatre which is now used for concerts) offers many pubs, restaurants, espresso cafes and small jazz clubs that add to Fresno's night life. The community is proud of Fresno State and enthusiastically supports many of the university's programs, whether they are sports, the arts, academic competitions or other special events.

### RECREATION

Fresno is the only place in the nation within an easy drive of three national parks — Yosemite, Sequoia and Kings Canyon. Therefore, it isn't surprising that much of Fresno State's recreational and social life centers around the outdoors. Fresno is also centrally located within the state, making drives to San Francisco, Santa Cruz, Monterey or Los Angeles easy. Fresno is only three hours south of San Francisco, two hours east of Santa Cruz and Monterey and four hours from the city of Los Angeles.

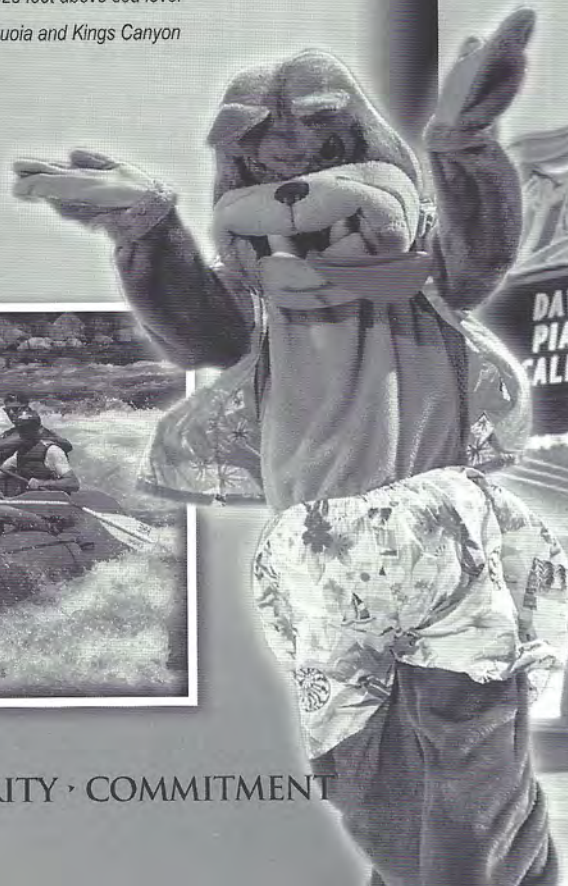
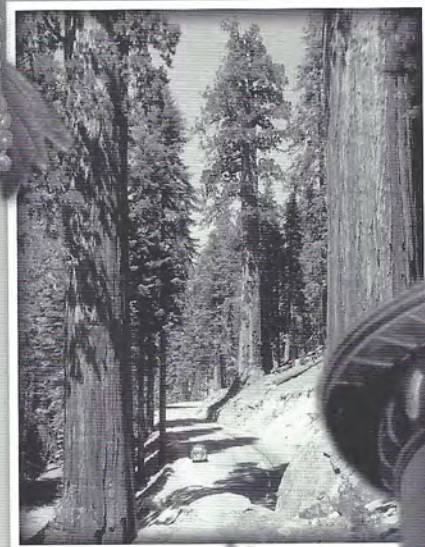
Boating, fishing, water skiing and windsurfing at one of the six nearby lakes are popular activities during the spring and summer. Winter recreation includes downhill skiing and cross-country skiing at nearby Sierra Summit or Badger Pass in the beautiful Sierra Mountains.

All year round, nature lovers and outdoor sports enthusiasts can choose from a variety of parks to visit while in Fresno. One favorite haven is Lost Lake Park. Only 24 miles northeast of Fresno, Lost Lake boasts a 70-acre primitive nature study area and a 38-acre lake. Recently, a part of the park was filled with 70,000 tons of sand to create seven volleyball courts.

In addition to an extensive intramural program, on-campus recreation includes a series of current films, drama productions and concerts ranging from rock to jazz to classical. The annual Vintage Days celebration and a number of university receptions, winetastings, art festivals and the University Lecture Series are among the many events open to the public. Informal meeting places such as the University Student Union and the Satellite Student Union are visited by students throughout the day and evening.

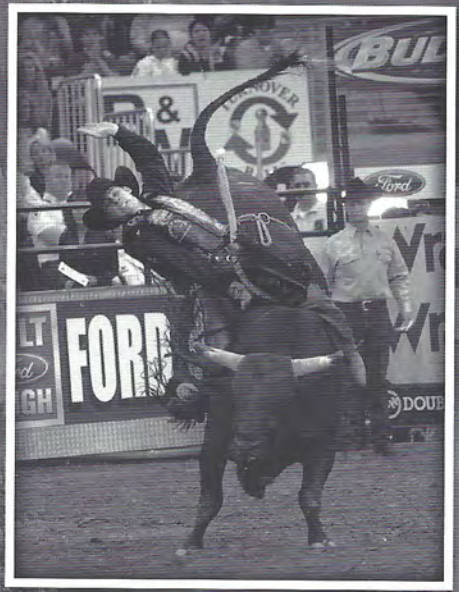
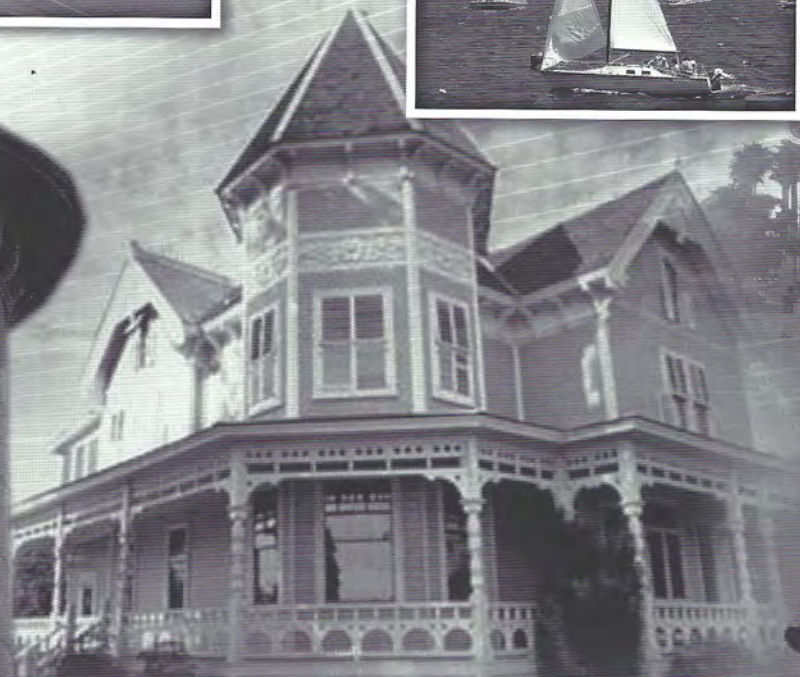

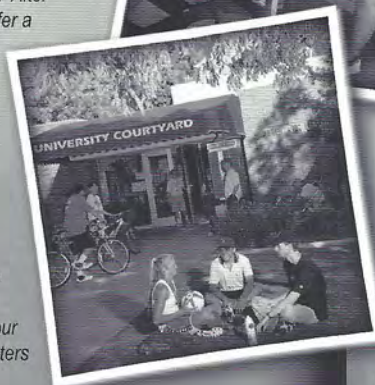
## WHAT MAKES US UNIQUE?

- 1.** We're a campus community that treasures scholarship and creative thinking. Our five-year-old Smittcamp Family Honors College is one of the most comprehensive academic honors programs at any university in California. Only the best students from across California can meet the rigorous intellectual and creative requirements for the college.
- 2.** Fresno State operates the only commercial winery at any university in the country. The University's enology program has won many of the nation's most prized awards --beating many of the best Northern California wines.
- 3.** Fresno State is home to the \$103 million Save Mart Center. A second phase of the project (currently under construction) will add a center for business innovation and a student recreational center.
- 4.** Fresno State boasts some of the best sports programs for both women and men in California, with all major sports facilities paid for entirely with private gifts. Our booster group, the vaunted "Red Wave," is one of the largest in the country.
- 5.** The complete spectrum of education is represented on campus --from a nationally-ranked preschool to doctoral work. The campus includes University High School, which uses music as the inspiration for its curriculum. We proudly continue today as one of California's top campuses for the preparation of new teachers.
- 6.** Fresno State is the California campus most associated with the Sierra Nevada. Students can leave the campus and in one hour can be skiing or hiking at 7,000 feet in Kings Canyon or Sequoia National Parks. Yosemite National Park is just under two hours away. The campus conducts research in Sierra and range-land conservation, alpine biology, ecology, anthropology and numerous other disciplines.
- 7.** Research is booming at Fresno State where faculty members are attracting a growing amount of studies, supported by 13 endowed chairs who endorse top-flight research and teaching. Some of our professors have teamed up with a leading international software company to help develop a new computer-based system to identify criminals. The range of funded projects makes Fresno State's University Grants and Research Office one of the largest in California. The office set a record for attracting grants in 2003, reaching \$48 million, an increase of 25 percent in one year and a quadrupling of awards over the past five years.
- 8.** Students at Fresno State overwhelmingly approved the Legacy 2000 referendum, paving the way for construction of a huge on-campus recreational center adjacent to the Save Mart Center.
- 9.** Alumni from Fresno State are setting the pace throughout the country and the state. Among California State University campuses we can boast that our alumni are among the most influential thinkers, business people, artists, explorers and leaders in the U.S..
- 10.** Our students truly make Fresno State unique. Central California is one of the most culturally diverse regions in the world. More than 120 different languages are spoken by our residents, capturing the attention of The New York Times, which chronicled the unique environment at Fresno State that fosters success for students from all backgrounds.

## UNIVERSITY COURTYARD: An on-campus living community

Nearly 1,000 students each semester choose to make the move into University Courtyard, the on-campus living facilities at Fresno State. After spending \$12.2 million in 1995 to renovate, the accommodations offer a combination of suite styles for students to choose from. Students can choose from one of nine buildings in either community style living or residence suites. The Courtyard also offers students the Residence Life Program, which was created to offer students opportunities to cultivate lasting friendships, develop exciting new interests, enjoy a wide range of social activities, keep their minds and bodies in shape and experience cultural diversity.

One of the key advantages of living in University Courtyard is that all services are included to students for one affordable price. From necessities like meals and utilities, to luxuries like basic cable TV and access to internet/e-mail, students find very few needs unmet. Students have access to a computer lab, fitness center, 24-hour customer service, priority employment opportunities, recreation centers and priority registration for classes.



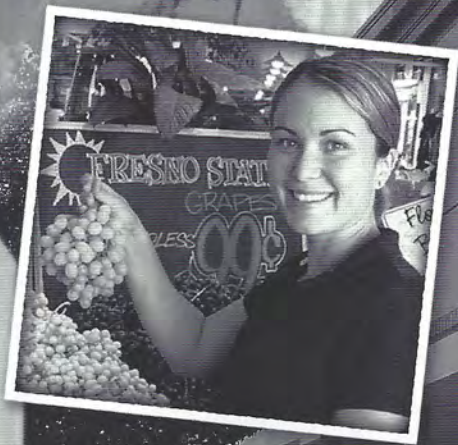

# Fresno State's ACADEMIC SUCCESS

## STUDENT-ATHLETE SERVICES

The goal of the Fresno State Student-Athlete Services (SAS) office is to help student-athletes successfully manage academic responsibilities and complete their baccalaureate degrees while they maintain athletic eligibility.

## WHO WE ARE AND WHO WE SERVE

The SAS staff includes a director, professional academics advisors, a learning specialist, graduate interns and tutors in a variety of subject areas. Each staff member is trained to deal with the special needs of student-athletes and works with all prospective, current and former student-athletes. Each student-athlete is assigned an academic advisor who works with that individual throughout his or her collegiate career.

## NEW STUDENT ADMISSION AND ORIENTATION

Student-athletes' relationships begin with the SAS staff as a recruit. All academic advisors provide helpful information to recruits and other potential athletes. New student-athletes are assisted through admissions, orientation, evaluation, and program planning on both academic and athletic eligibility requirements.

## ACADEMIC ASSISTANCE

The Fresno State Student-Athlete Services Office provides academic assistance through the following specialized services:

- Academic advising for declared and undeclared majors
- Monitoring class selection, course load, attendance, and progress
- Study hall, tutorial assistance, and computer access and support
- Classes on academic success strategies for new student-athletes
- Individual counseling and referral services for student-athletes with learning disabilities, study skills deficits, career uncertainties and personal concerns
- Encouragement toward involvement in community activities such as Red Ribbon Week and the Little Heroes Program with Valley Children's Hospital of Central California

## LIFE SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

The CHAMPS program is designed to help student-athletes learn life management principles, develop lifelong learning and leadership skills and continue a pattern of personal and interpersonal growth. Throughout their enrollment at Fresno State, student-athletes are provided services which help them identify and achieve their educational, career, personal and athletic goals. Included in the CHAMPS program is a three-unit class for freshmen called University 1. The class provides an orientation to campus resources and teaches effective study skills in a number of areas including time management, note taking, reading comprehension, memory skills and test taking.

## ACADEMIC COUNSELING AND ENRICHMENT PROGRAM (ACE)

The ACE Program is designed to meet the special academic needs of student-athletes with more specific learning challenges. Coordinated by the department's Learning Assistance Specialist, participants in the program are provided with specialized tutorial assistance and study skills development in addition to weekly accountability meetings, workshops on various life skills issues, assistance with accommodations and personal counseling.

## SUMMER SCHOOL ASSISTANCE

Student-Athlete Services administers the summer session scholarship program, which allows our student-athletes the opportunity to take additional courses toward graduation and accelerate their degree completion.

## POST-ELIGIBILITY PROGRAMS

Student-Athlete Services also oversees the Fifth-Year Scholarship program designed to assist student-athletes who have completed their athletic eligibility in reaching their graduation goal. Scholarship awards are given to those who have been on athletic aid, are in good academic standing and are within 30 units of completing their degrees.

## KIWANIS TORCH OF EXCELLENCE BANQUET

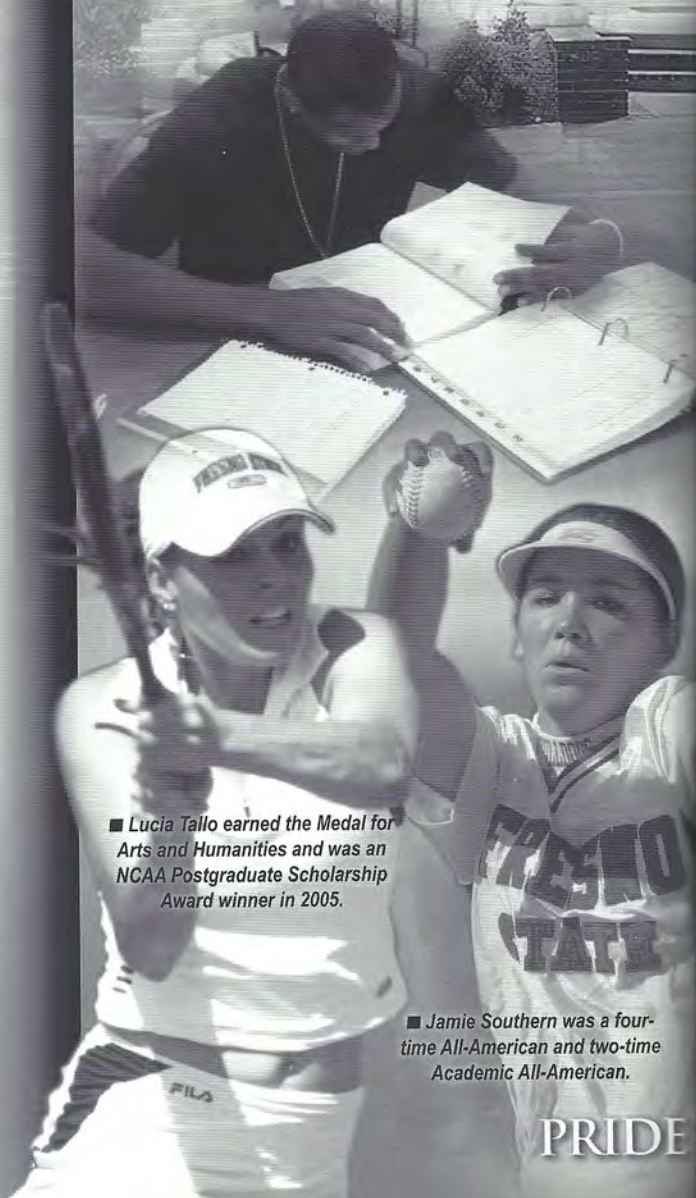
A total of 280 student-athletes were recognized in May 2005 for achieving a 3.0 grade point average or better during the spring and fall 2004 semesters at the department's annual Kiwanis Torch of Excellence Awards Banquet. The total reflected 55 percent of Fresno State's student-athlete population - the highest percentage ever. Last year, over 500 students and members of the Fresno community attended the banquet, including leaders in the Fresno business, service and athletics communities.

## Smittcamp Family Honors College

Through 2005, 16 student-athletes have entered the university through the Smittcamp Family Honors Program. Honors College students are selected because they have demonstrated superior academic, co-curricular and community service achievements throughout their high school careers. They are included in special faculty mentoring programs, honors level courses and a variety of university and community volunteer programs throughout their Fresno State careers and receive significant scholarship aid.

## **RICCHIUTI ACADEMIC CENTER**

The construction of the Ricchiuti Academic Center and Duncan Building were completed in December 2004.

The Ricchiuti Academic Center, nearly 6,000 square feet, provides study tables, tutorial and computer labs, plus new coaching offices for the women's soccer team. The computer lab has 40 computers.

The Duncan Building expansion houses new coaching offices, meeting and conference rooms, an audio/visual control room, a new Bulldog locker room and a theatre-style auditorium.

The combined \$5 million project will enhance Fresno State's athletic facilities for academics and the Bulldog football program.

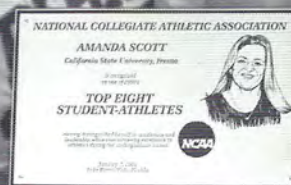

## DR. JOHN D. WELTY University President

Dr. John D. Welty has been president of California State University, Fresno since July 29, 1991. He is also a professor in the Kremen School of Education & Human Development. Fresno State enrolls more than 22,000 students and offers 59 undergraduate degrees and 40 master degree programs in addition to a joint doctorate in Educational Leadership with the University of California. The campus is located on 1,500 acres and academic programs are housed in eight colleges and schools. Since 1991 the University has completed a major planning effort, expanded minority enrollment, created an Honors College, revised its general education requirements, added new academic programs and institutes, constructed \$182.3 million in facilities including the new Save Mart Center, introduced service learning into the curriculum and expanded community service opportunities for students, initiated faculty development efforts, improved services for students, streamlined administrative processes, launched a major commitment to expand the use of information technology, entered the Western Athletic Conference, expanded intercollegiate Athletic opportunities and facilities for women, and dramatically increased private fund raising and grant and contract funding. The university has been actively involved in addressing issues in Central California and engaging itself with the entire region.



Dr. Welty is recognized nationally as a leader in planning for the future, administrator and teacher preparation reform, information technology planning, substance abuse prevention, and service learning and intercollegiate athletics. He served on the Cornerstones Group which created the CSU's strategic plan and he has served on several advisory groups to the U.S. Departments of Education and Agriculture. He has been involved extensively in teacher and educational leader preparation reform. He is past-chair of the Renaissance Group which is a national organization of over 30 Universities dedicated to improved teacher education programs. He co-chaired the CSU's effort to create CALState Teach, an innovative program designed for emergency credentialed teachers and chaired a CSU group on preparing educational leaders. He serves as Chair of the CSU Gender Equity Monitoring Committee. In addition, he has chaired three national conferences on substance abuse and prevention and chaired a CSU effort to review alcohol policies and programs. He has been a leader in promoting service learning and volunteer service for students. He serves as a Commissioner for the California Service Corps. He was elected to serve as WASC Commissioner in 2000 and as WASC Commission Chair in 2004. He chaired the American Humanics, Inc. Board for four years. He currently serves as Chair of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He currently serves on the NCAA Board Executive Committee, Chairs the WAC Board of Directors and was recently appointed to serve on a special NCAA Task Force on the Future of Intercollegiate Athletics. Locally, Dr. Welty has been a leader in establishing the Fresno Business Council, the Central Valley Business

Incubator, the Central Valley Higher Education Consortium, the Collaborative Regional Initiative, the Regional Jobs Initiative, the Kenneth L. Maddy Institute and several other partnerships.

Previously, Dr. Welty served as President of Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) for seven years. Prior to assuming the presidency of IUP, he served as Vice President for Student and University Affairs for four years.

A native of Amboy, Illinois, Dr. Welty has served as an Admissions Counselor at Michigan State University, East Lansing, and as Assistant Vice President for Student Affairs at Southwest State University in Marshall, Minnesota. At the State University of New York, Albany, he was Director of Residences, Associate Dean for Student Affairs, and Assistant Professor of Counseling and Student Development.

Dr. Welty received his bachelor's degree in Social Science from Western Illinois University, Macomb in 1965; his master's in College Student Personnel Services from Michigan State University in 1967; and his doctorate in Administration of Higher Education from Indiana University, Bloomington, in 1974.

Dr. Welty has co-authored a book titled *Alcohol and Other Drugs: A Guide for College Presidents and Governing Boards*; written a chapter in the book titled *Realizing the Educational Potential of Residence Halls*, and is the author of numerous articles and papers on University Students, Student Affairs Programs, and the Future of Higher Education. In 1999, Dr. Welty was presented the Chief Executive Leadership Award by the Council for Advancement and Support for Education and was recognized by the John Templeton Foundation for his leadership in Student Character Development in Schools and Colleges. In 2001 he was recognized by the California State Student Association as President of the year. In 2003 he received the Fresno Business Council's Excellence in Public Service Award. He has also consulted with many institutions and served on the boards of several campus and community organizations.

Dr. Welty and his wife, Dr. Sharon Brown-Welty, have five children and two grandchildren.

## THOMAS C. BOEH Director of Athletics

With a proven track record for leadership, academic and athletics achievement, Thomas C. Boeh enters his first year as the Director of Athletics at Fresno State.

Boeh spent the last 10 years as the Director of Athletics at Ohio University, where he led the program to unprecedented levels in numerous categories. He was named the Fresno State Director of Athletics on May 13, 2005.

Among his notable accomplishments include receiving the General Robert R. Neyland Athletics Director Award for his outstanding achievements at Ohio. He was presented the award during the All-America Football Foundation banquet at the Chicago Athletic Club on July 23, 2001.

Boeh directed the Ohio University program, a 20-sport, NCAA I-A athletics program with 104 staff members, 565 student-athletes and \$14 million in annual expenditures.



Boeh's athletics program at Ohio University were highly regarded. In 2001, *The Sporting News* ranked Ohio's department 32nd among the 115 NCAA I-A institutions. It was the highest ranking of any non-BCS program. The ranking included evaluations for competitive success, fan support, integrity and equity. Ohio earned an "A" rating in graduation rates and NCAA compliance. While perennially ranking as a national leader in student-athlete graduation achievement. In 2004, the Ohio program posted an eight-year high graduation rate of 73 percent.

Under Boeh's leadership, Ohio was extremely aggressive in its efforts to achieve gender equity and compliance with Title IX. Since 1995, three women's sports programs were initiated: golf, soccer and lacrosse.

In 2004, *The Chronicle of Higher Education* reported that Ohio University ranked second nationally among all NCAA I-A institutions relative to the equity of expenditures for men's and women's sports programs.

Additionally, numerous women's facilities were constructed, sports budgets were restructured to reflect equity among men's and women's programs and operating and decision-making procedures have been reorganized to establish what Boeh refers to as an "authentic gender-neutral environment."

The most visible changes at the Athens, Ohio, campus in the past 10 years have come in grounds and facilities. Ohio University's athletics facilities have undergone major renovation and are recognized as being among the best in the Midwest. The ambitious "Victory with Honor" campaign resulted in the completion of 41 state-of-the-art facilities utilized by Bobcat student-athletes.

During Boeh's tenure at Ohio University, his teams achieved conference championships in men's basketball, baseball, women's cross country, field hockey, soccer, swimming and diving, volleyball and wrestling.

Fundraising efforts saw unprecedented and steady growth. Annual fundraising totals rose more than 500 percent since 1995. Ohio University concluded its Bicentennial Capital Campaign by exceeding its \$10 million departmental goal.

Boeh served a term as the Mid-American Conference (MAC) representative to the NCAA Management Council, and at the time of his hiring at Fresno State, served as the chair of the MAC Athletics Directors' Group and was one of three members of the MAC Executive Council.

Prior to his tenure at Ohio, Boeh served as Associate Director of Athletics for External Affairs at Northwestern University, overseeing areas such as development, marketing, ticket operations, sports publications, media services, game management and broadcasting properties. Boeh also led the popular "Expect Victory" campaign for Northwestern's first multimedia marketing plan, which included significant procurement of corporate support as well as print and electronic advertising.

Preceding Northwestern, Boeh spent four years at the University of Maine, first as the Associate Director of Athletics for External Affairs and then was promoted to Senior Associate Director of Athletics for Administration and Development.

Boeh also spent time in a variety of roles with the Big Ten Television Network, The University of Illinois and his alma mater, Loras College, in Dubuque, Iowa.

The 47-year-old Chicago-area native received a bachelor of arts degree in physical education at Loras College, with a minor in history in 1981, and a master of science degree in athletic administration from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana in 1988.



## BETSY MOSHER

Senior Associate Athletics Director/SWA

As one of the newest senior administrators to join the Fresno State Athletics Department, Betsy Mosher began her duties as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Administration and Program Integrity/Senior Woman Administrator on Oct. 6, 2005.

Mosher comes to Fresno State after spending the last three years (2002-05) as the Associate Athletic Director for Athletic Administration and Compliance Services at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst.



With an extensive background that includes prominent leadership positions at three NCAA Division I institutions as well as with the Big 10 Office and the NCAA, Mosher's duties at Fresno State will include the supervision of nine Bulldogs' athletic programs (baseball, golf, tennis, cross country, soccer and track and field) as well as oversight of the department's NCAA and Western Athletic Conference compliance programs, student-athlete services, and the athletic training department. Mosher will serve as the SWA for conference and NCAA representation.

At UMass she was a member of the athletics department senior management team and was responsible for the formulation of the department's strategic plan. Assisting with a campus response to a second round NCAA self study, Mosher oversaw the department's compliance program, including the formulation of a systems manual and an upgrade of the recruitment monitoring system. Additionally, Mosher oversaw the admission process for student-athletes as well as served as a department liaison for personnel actions during a six month transition period.

Mosher, who supervised women's tennis, baseball and cross country and track and field at Massachusetts, was a liaison to the Athletic Council's Subcommittees for Compliance and for Vision. An NCAA Peer Reviewer she was named to the NCAA Academic, Eligibility and Compliance Cabinet in July 2005.

Prior to UMass, Mosher spent six years (1996-2002) as the Senior Associate Athletic Director for Administration and Compliance/SWA at Arizona State University. A member of ASU's athletic senior management team, she oversaw the school's compliance, academic and student services as well as the personnel areas. She also supervised the sports of volleyball, softball, soccer and wrestling while working closely with the women's basketball program.

Mosher served as a liaison to Arizona State's general counsel, the school's Intercollegiate Athletics Board, the Pacific-10 Conference and the NCAA. Representing the Sun Devils on numerous Pac-10 and NCAA committees, she was the 1999-2000 vice president of the Pac-10 council and former NCAA softball committee member. Mosher also assisted with the second round certification process at ASU and served as the OCR liaison.

Prior to Arizona State, Mosher spent seven years (1989-96) at Northwestern. With five years as an assistant athletics director and two as an associate athletics director for intercollegiate services, she also served as the department's SWA. Her primary duties for the Wildcats included oversight of compliance, academic services and athletics admissions as well as supervision of the baseball, women's basketball, tennis and swimming programs. She was chair of the Big 10 Women's Administrator's Group and the Conference's Rules and Legislation Committee. Prior to Northwestern, Mosher was a legislative assistant at the Big 10 Conference office (1988-89) and also served as an NCAA compliance representative (1986-88).

Prior to her move into administration, Mosher was the head women's basketball and softball coach at California State (Pa.) from 1980-85 before beginning her collegiate athletics career as the women's basketball coach at Wisconsin-Whitewater (1977-79).

Receiving her Bachelor of Science degree in education from Illinois State in 1972, a Master of Arts degree in physical education from Northern Colorado in 1976, and a Director's Degree from Indiana University (1986), Mosher also was selected to attend the NACWAA Institute for Athletics Executive in the summer of 2002. Mosher is a current member of NACDA and NACWAA.

## PAUL LADWIG

Associate Athletics Director / Broadcasting and External Relations

As the newest member of the Fresno State Athletics Department Executive Staff, Paul Ladwig comes to Fresno State after serving as the Assistant Athletics Director for Creative Services at Ohio University for 10 months.



His duties at Fresno State will include overseeing the marketing office, the ticket office, the Bulldog Shop, the media relations office and video services in addition to serving as the department's liaison to Bulldog Sports Properties.

In his role as an assistant athletic director at Ohio, he was charged with ensuring an effective, consistent and progressive approach from game-day activities to marketing to image enhancement. Recently, Ohio saw a record-breaking sellout crowd at Peden Stadium when the Bobcats defeated Pittsburgh on ESPN in their home opener.

Innovative, Ladwig was instrumental in creating the Ohio Sports Network, the refinement of Ohio University's web presence and the production of programming for public television. From Network Television in Los Angeles to the slopes of the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano, Japan to documentary work in Southeast Asia, the department grew by leaps and bounds under his direction.

Serving as the Executive Director for University Communications and Marketing at Ohio from 2000-05, Ladwig helped create new opportunities and promotional efforts to enhance the university's message. Overseeing a staff of 20 employees, he built a staff of video, web site, satellite and news operations from the ground up.

Ladwig served an integral part in building support and recognition for Bobcats' athletics. Joining the Ohio Media Services staff in 1993, he was the media services director from 1996-99. As the senior radio-television producer, he directed the content and image of Ohio University's outreach video production. Ladwig then went on to oversee video and broadcast image of the institution that resulted in new creative avenues for exposure.

Also teaching classes on live and studio television production at Ohio, Ladwig created the first national hands-on student learning center for live sports broadcasting.

Prior to working at Ohio University, Ladwig had a successful 15-year career in television news and commercial production. A former news manager for KPNX-TV in Phoenix, he also worked at WFMY-TV in Greensboro, North Carolina, as a news assignment manager for nine years. From 1987-88, Ladwig was the field producer/photographer for PM Magazine after being a chief photographer/editor (1984-87) and sports photographer/editor (1981-84).

Ladwig received an associate degree from The Broadcast Center (St. Louis) in 1979.

## GREG WALAITIS

Associate A.D. / Development

Greg Walaitis joined the Bulldogs in June 2004. Walaitis came to Fresno State with more than 14 years of administrative experience in sports marketing, management, development, corporate sponsorship sales and new business development.



Walaitis is the first associate athletics director for development in school history and will be responsible for overseeing all the fundraising activities for Fresno State Athletics. He will lead and manage all athletics boosters clubs in fundraising and constituent relations. He also will work on securing major gifts from individuals, corporations and foundations.

In June 2003, Walaitis became the director of marketing

partnerships for the Phoenix International Raceway. He previously was director of business development for NASCAR Images in Charlotte, N.C., where he was responsible for reorganizing a sales staff by implementing new sales and new business development strategies. He built relationships with NASCAR sponsors, advertising agencies for NASCAR that produced television shows and licensing rights.

Walaitis worked for 12 years in the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics at Arizona State University in Tempe, rising to the position of assistant athletics director for corporate sales and marketing, a position he held for five years.

While at Arizona State, he coordinated the advertising, season ticket sales and game-day promotion for all sports. He assisted with a variety of fundraising events, including \$30 million facility improvements to Sun Devil Stadium and other facilities. He assisted in the creation of the Wings of Gold and Slam Dunk Club groups, designed to support women's athletics and men's basketball respectively. He was a member of the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl Committee and assisted with the game management for Super Bowl XXX. He created a partnership with the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl to sponsor an annual holiday basketball tournament. He and managed 39 corporate accounts, seeing them grow from \$1 million annually to an excess of \$4 million.

Walaitis holds a bachelor of science degree in exercise science/sports administration and a master's of education in education administration and supervision, both from Arizona State University.

Walaitis and his wife, Karen, have two young children, Megan and Derek.

## DESIREE REED-FRANCOIS

Associate A.D. / Compliance and Student-Athlete Services

Desiree Reed-Francois was named Fresno State's Associate Athletics Director for Compliance and Student-Athlete Services in September 2003.



She came to Fresno State from Santa Clara, where she was responsible for the administration of compliance, student services, legal affairs, the Athletics Advisory Board, and she supervised three sports. She oversaw the Academic Affairs division, which produced an NCAA Top Eight Award winner, and worked to develop appeal hearing procedures, a gender equity plan and an academic resource policy. Reed-Francois developed staff seminars, and assisted with the Stanford University Sports Law Summit.

Before joining the Santa Clara staff, Reed-Francois was the director of compliance at San Jose State from 1999-02, where she was responsible for developing their compliance department. She implemented a comprehensive rules education plan for the coaches, staff and student-athletes.

Reed-Francois worked as a litigation attorney for two years from 1998-99. Prior to litigating, she served as a compliance assistant at the University of California. In 1995, she was a legal associate for the Los Angeles/Oakland Raiders, working with the NFLMC in handling collective bargaining grievances during the club's relocation. This position led to a promotion to the National Football League Management Council where she spent one year as a legal associate in their New York City offices.

A 1994 graduate of UCLA, she was a member of the Bruins' rowing team. She earned a juris doctorate from the University of Arizona in 1997, and is a member of the California State Bar.

Reed-Francois is a member of the Stanford University Sports Law Symposium Committee, the NCAA Committee on Initial Eligibility and the State Bar of California Committee on Ethnic Minorities. A recent selection to the NCAA's Leadership Institute, Reed-Francois has been a guest speaker at several Bay Area universities, including the Stanford Law School. She also taught Sports Law at both Lincoln Law School and Santa Clara University.

Reed-Francois and her husband, Joshua (who works for Grubb & Ellis in Fresno), have a son, Jackson.

# Fresno State's Championship FACILITIES

## 1. BULLDOG STADIUM

Bulldog Stadium has served as the home of Fresno State football since 1980. The facility has established itself as one of the most difficult places to win for visiting teams. Considered one of the most complete stadiums in the WAC, the stadium seats 41,031 and features 22 sky suites. In 2001, the Bulldogs set a school attendance record with an average of 42,802 fans per game and has recorded 52 sellouts. Last year, Bulldog Stadium was voted one of the 25 best college football stadiums by CBSSportsline.com.

## 2. SAVE MART CENTER

The Save Mart Center is home court for the men's and women's basketball teams. The \$100 million plus facility opened in November 2003 with a seating capacity of 16,116. It contains 32 private suites, a club level concourse, team locker rooms and athletics training facilities. With its size, scope, unique architectural features and state-of-the-art video, sound and telecom systems, the center will serve as the major provider of entertainment and sporting events for decades. Forbes Magazine named the Save Mart Center the largest collegiate 'named' sports entertainment and cultural center in the U.S.

## 3. THE RICCHIUTI ACADEMIC CENTER

The Ricchiuti Academic Center provides study tables, tutorial and computer labs, plus new coaching offices for the women's soccer team. The center will benefit every student-athlete on campus for years to come. The Duncan Building expansion includes new coaching offices, team meeting rooms, a new Bulldog locker room and a theater-style auditorium.

## 4. SPALDING G. WATHEN TENNIS CENTER

The Spalding G. Wathen Tennis Center is one of the premier college tennis facilities in the western United States and has become a key fixture in the recent success of the Fresno State men's and women's tennis teams. Host to numerous NCAA and conference postseason tournaments, the Wathen Center boasts approximately 400 luxury chair-back seats atop the platform face the complexes six main courts, making for easy viewing of all six courts while a dual match is in progress.

## 5. WARMERDAM FIELD

Home to the men's and women's track and field programs, Warmerdam Field, which seats 1,000, has been playing host to Fresno State home meets since 1976. The nine-lane, 400-meter on-campus facility is named after Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam, the former Fresno State head coach and world record holder in the pole vault.

## 6. STUDENT HORSE CENTER

Home to the Fresno State equestrian program, the Student Horse Center features a 120-by-250 foot arena in addition to three barns capable of housing up to 80 student, university and privately owned horses. The equestrian team also has access to a 28,000 square foot animal science pavilion for practice or performance in inclement weather.

## 7. FRESNO GOLF COURSES

With the wide array of golf courses in close proximity to the Fresno State campus, Bulldog golfers have the opportunity to refine their skills at some of Fresno's finest clubs: San Joaquin CC—hosted the NCAA Championship final, the WAC Championships, the Women's Trans National and the U.S. Mid-Amateur; Sunnyside CC—hosted the 1981 U.S. Junior Amateur and the California State Junior Championship; Fort Washington CC—hosted two PGA Tour qualifiers and the final Ben Hogan PGA Tour event.

## 8. BULLDOG DIAMOND

Regarded as one of the finest softball facilities in the country, Bulldog Diamond boasts a seating capacity of 5,767 and a home field record of 646-147-1. The stadium features 1,688 permanent seat-back chairs that include 388 box seats, sunken dugouts, lights, concessions stands, restrooms, practice areas, enclosed batting cages and press box. The Bulldogs have set NCAA single-season attendance mark four times and single-date five times while being the national average attendance leader 13 of the past 15 years. Bulldog Diamond has been the site of 19 of 24 NCAA Regional Championships.

## 9. STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING CENTER

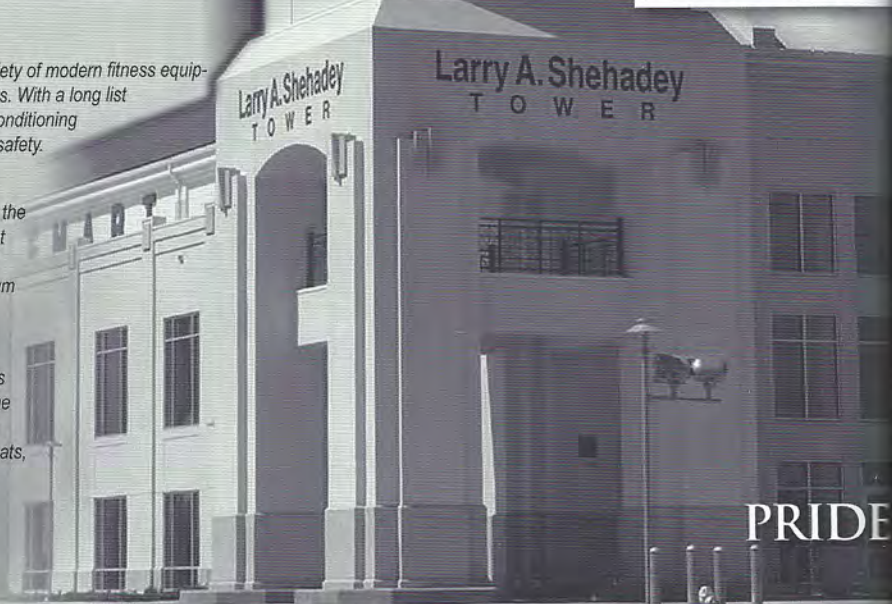
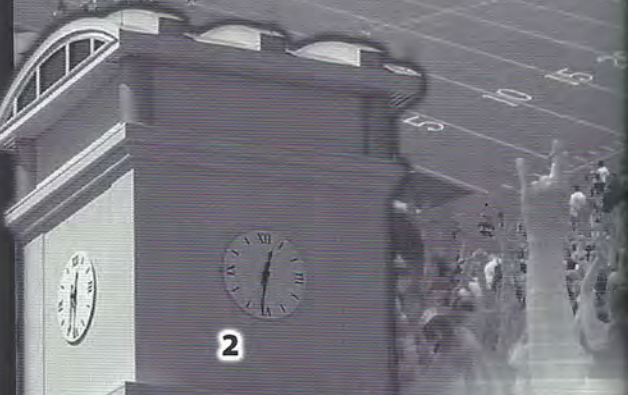
The 10,000-foot weight room facility houses a host of free weights as well as a variety of modern fitness equipment. The spacious room is equipped with some 25,000 pounds of Olympic weights. With a long list of Bulldog athletes having been voted as a NCSA All-American, the strength and conditioning program at Fresno State is ergonomically designed for the greatest efficiency and safety.

## 10. NORTH GYM

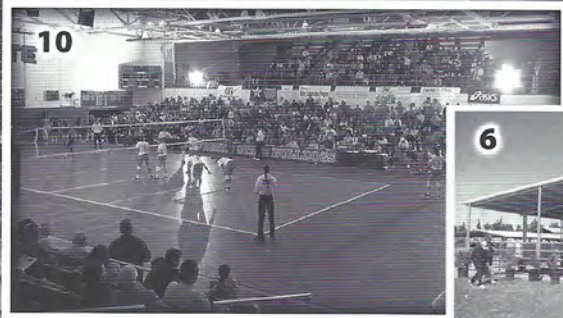
With a seating capacity for 1,401 fans, the North Gymnasium is the home court for the women's volleyball and wrestling teams. Nine years ago, the North Gym underwent a \$2 million facelift. The changes included the installation of 364 chair-back seats, air conditioning, two electronic digital scoreboards and the addition of the North Gym Annex which boasts women's locker and conference rooms.

## 11. BEIDEN FIELD

Fresno State's 5,575-seat Pete Beiden Field is one of the premier college ballparks in the country. It has hosted eight NCAA Regionals since 1979 and is home to some of college baseball's largest and most enthusiastic crowds. The facility was built in 1966, redesigned in 1983 and expanded in 2004. It features 3,575 theater-style seats, a spacious press box, two expansive clubhouses, new restrooms and concession stands, coaching staff offices, new indoor batting cages and a bullpen facility.

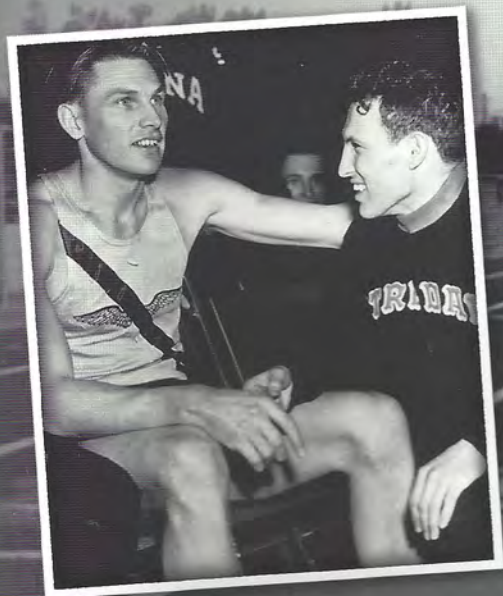
# Fresno State's **WARMERDAM FIELD**

Warmerdam Field has been playing host to Fresno State home meets since its construction in 1976. The nine-lane, 400-meter on-campus facility is named after Cornelius "Dutch" Warmerdam, the former Fresno State head coach and world record holder in the pole vault.

Warmerdam was the first vaulter to clear 15 feet, a height once considered insurmountable. A seven-time United States AAU pole vault champion, Warmerdam held the world pole vault record for 17 years (1940-57) while using a bamboo pole in a sawdust pit. Warmerdam competed at Fresno State in the 1930s and later served as head coach for 20 years before retiring in 1980.

The track was resurfaced in 1989 by nationally-regarded Balsom America Track Co. The new surface consists of a 60 percent polyurethane base mixed with 40 percent EPDM rubber. The EPDM rubber (pure resilient rubber) and polyurethane (the most resilient substance manufactured) combine to form a very responsive and fast surface which should enhance performances. Balsom also produced the surface at Brigham Young University, the host site of the 1989 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Warmerdam Field seats 1,000 fans and all timing is done by Accutrack. The first-ever dual meet held at Warmerdam was on April 23, 1977, when Fresno State hosted California.

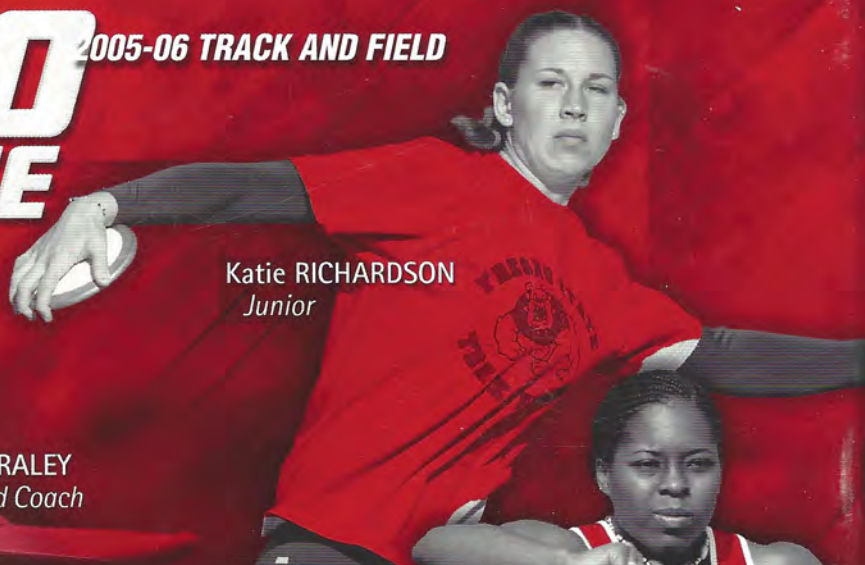

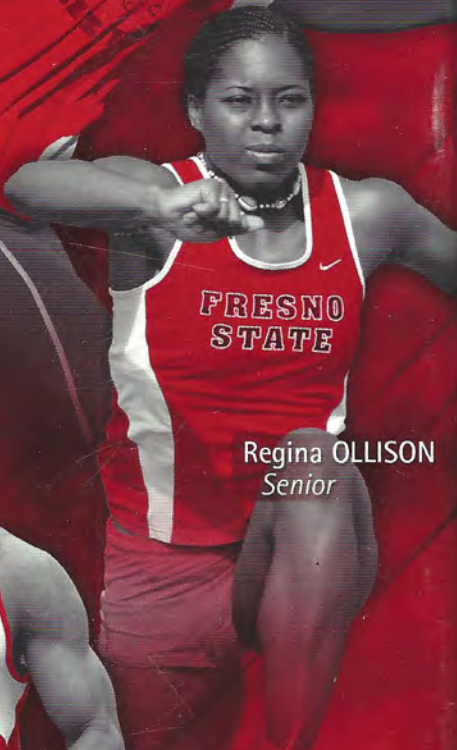
